Opinion

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Thrive Renewables (Boardinghouse) Limited is a private company, limited by shares. It is domiciled and incorporated in the UK and registered in England & Wales.

The company's registered number and office address can be found on the company information page.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

These financial statements are separate financial statements. The company is exempt from the preparation and delivery of consolidated financial statements under the terms of section 400 of the Companies Act 2006, because it is included in the group financial statements of Thrive Renewables plc. The group financial statements of Thrive Renewables plc are available to the public and can be obtained from the registered office. The registered office address of the parent company preparing consolidated financial statements is Thrive Renewables plc, Deanery Road, Bristol, BS1 5AS.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 101 "Reduced Disclosure Framework" and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of derivative financial assets and financial liabilities measured at fair value through profit and loss.

The particular accounting policies adopted, which have been applied consistently throughout the current and the prior financial year, are described below.

The Company has adopted IFRS 16, 'Leases' from 1 January 2019. There was no material impact to the company on this adoption.

There are no other amendments to accounting standards, or IFRIC interpretations that are effective for the year ended 31 December 2019 which have had a material impact on the company.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

Financial assets

On initial recognition, financial assets are classified as either fair value through profit or loss or amortised cost.

Debtors

Debtors includes trade receivables, loans and other receivables. Debtors that have fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as 'amortised costs. Debtors are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment. Interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate, except for short-term receivables when the recognition of interest would be immaterial.

Impairment of financial assets

The Company assesses on a forward looking basis the Expected Credit Losses (ECLs) associated with its financial assets. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk, and takes into account any collateral the Company holds that would mitigate such losses.

Financial assets, other than those at fair value through profit and loss, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each balance sheet date. Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flow of the investment have been affected.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets.

Financial liabilities and equity

Debt and equity instruments are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangement.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the company are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities "at fair value through profit and loss" or "other financial liabilities".

Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities, including borrowings, are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs.

Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using effective interest method, with interest expense recognised on an effective yield basis.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments through the expected life of the financial liability, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Taxation

Current taxes are based on the results shown in the financial statements and are calculated according to local tax rules, using tax rates enacted or substantially enacted by the balance sheet date.

Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

Going concern

The financial statements adopt the going concern basis on the grounds that the directors believe the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

As of the date of this report, we are in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Whilst it is challenging to be conclusive on the exposure faced at such a dynamic and unpredictable time, we are working hard to protect the safety of the team, our contractors and wider stakeholders and to operate responsibly adhering to government guidance. As the company's main activity is that of a holding company no impact is expected.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Going concern - continued

As the pandemic commenced in 2020 this represents a non adjusting post balance sheet event with regards to the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less impairment.

3. JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Company's accounting policies, which are described in note 2 above, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Impairment of investments in subsidiaries

Determining whether the company's investments in subsidiaries have been impaired requires estimations of the investments' values in use. The value in use calculations require the entity to estimate the future cash flows expected to arise from the investments and suitable discount rates in order to calculate present values. The carrying amount of investments in subsidiaries at the balance sheet date was £4,923,222 (2018: £4,923,222) with no evidence of impairment and no loss recognised in 2019 (2018: £Nil).

4. RESULT BEFORE TAXATION

The company's audit fee for the year of £500 (2018: £Nil) which is incorporated into the Thrive Renewables plc company audit fee.

Fees payable to the company's auditors for non-audit services to the company are not required to be disclosed because these are disclosed in the consolidated financial statements of Thrive Renewables plc.

5. TAX ON RESULT

No liability to UK corporation tax arose for the year ended 31 December 2019 nor for the year ended 31 December 2018.
