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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

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The church is established to "advance the Christian religion" in accordance with the Evangelical Alliance statement of Faith.

The church vision statement is to reach and influence the world for Jesus by building large Christ centered, Gospel driven, Spirit filled, Bible believing churches that empower people to become leaders, winners and influencers in every sphere of life to the glory of God.

The church seeks to work this out through the following strategy:

- To regularly see souls saved and lives transformed
- To mature together as people of the Bible, of the Spirit, of prayer and worship
- To be a people of community. We believe this is most effectively worked out through small groups
- To be a church that blesses the community beyond the members of the church
- To plant churches into London and beyond

The church uses criteria such as attendance at services and small group meetings, attendance at training programmes, number of visitors etc. to measure outcomes against the church objectives.

Public benefit

The charity's trustees have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission. In planning the activities for the year, the trustees ensure that this is in line with this guidance.

The majority of the Church's events and activities are available free of charge to the members of the community and are widely publicised in the local papers and on local buses and billboards. Events are also widely publicised via social media and members of Jubilee are encouraged to invite family, friends, neighbours and colleagues. When a charge has to be made, every effort is made to ensure it is accessible to anyone who wishes to attend with a certain percentage of tickets being issued as complimentary (free) tickets to ensure finance will not be a barrier to potential attendees. Members of the Church are also encouraged to buy tickets for those members of the community that are unable to afford one.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

This year, God by His grace has once more brought about growth in every area of church life, and across all sites and we celebrate knowing that behind every number there is a real person.

It is a joy to be able to make the following statements, that:

Together we are growing in PRAYER as evidenced by the increasing number of regular attendees at the regular Friday evening prayer meetings and our sixth successful '21 days of prayer and fasting' in January 2020.

Together we are growing in WORSHIP as evidenced by our Sunday Services and Anointing Services.

Together we are growing in MISSION as evidenced by regular salvation responses in church and our outworking activities in the community.

Together we are growing as a FAMILY as evidenced by times of fellowship and the increasing number of small groups that meet weekly across the church.

Together we are growing in blessing those BEYOND OURSELVES as evidenced by the various social action projects that continue to be sustained and grow both locally and overseas.

Selected highlights of our achievements this year include:

Sunday Services

This year, average attendance at our Sunday services increased by about 9.6% across the 3 sites, coming up to March 2020. With the advent of Covid 19, and the move to online service in March, the first online service on 22nd March 2020, saw an attendance of over 1500 people, as members transitioned easily across the platform. This growth in number is mirrored across all areas of church with the Youth ministry moving to 2 screens by the end of February 2020.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The coming together of all the sites for the annual Giving / International Sunday in May 2019 and the Crossover 2020 event on 31st December 2019 held at the Lea Valley Athletic Centre both saw a record number of attendees.

The teaching series through the year from the 5-part series on "Friendship" in April and culminating with the 8-part series on "Bridging the Gap" through the grace of God, served to prepare and ground the church for the Pandemic that was to come, although this was not known at the time. The "Friendship series taught on making Godly friendships, being a good friend as well as being our brother's keeper. This was followed by the 6-part series on "Knowing Jesus"; 8-part series on "Breaking Cycles" which included talks on overcoming anxiety, overcoming hopelessness and overcoming mental strongholds all real challenges people faced in the current pandemic. The 5-part series on "SENT" opened with "a heart for the lost" and closed with the "Importance of Kindness" on the 1st Sunday in December 2019. Other key series include the short 3-part series on "Hearing God's Voice" which talked about hearing and learning to listen to God's voice and "how to handle the Word". Teachings on "handling loss" and "understanding suffering" both part of the 6-part series in January 2020 on "Under the Influence" and the series on "Bridging the Gap" in March 2020, both spoke directly into helping people live through the challenges that came later with the Pandemic.

This year, the church was also blessed by talks by Terry Virgo and Ram Babu, who were guest speakers at our Manifold Presence service in January 2020. Other guest speakers through the year include R T Kendall and Bishop Ulmer.

With the onset of the pandemic in March 2020, all services transitioned online. The last life service on 15th March helped to prepare members for the possibility of a virtual service. The transition to an online platform was a seamless one for the different groups to include the children ministry due the experience gained from filming and broadcasting other services and events in the life of the church. Services like the weekly Friday prayer meetings and small groups also transitioned online and saw an almost 100% increase. These numbers have remained high going into the 2021 New Year.

All sites of the Church; Jubilee Enfield, Jubilee Woodgreen; Jubilee Ilford continue to grow and flourish through the grace of God.

Small Groups

Small Groups meet weekly across various homes and locations around London, Hertfordshire and Ilford. Small groups are the building blocks of the Church, and are where people connect and belong, cultivate meaningful friendships and grow in Christ together. We believe our Small Groups to be the backbone of the church and people are best served and discipled through the small groups. This year saw attendance increase by over 100% with the advent of the Pandemic and the transition to an online platform in March 2020.

A high percentage of the Small Groups come together based on the geographical location, to ensure easy access for every member; There are also small groups based on shared interest e.g the "Cycling Group" and strategic groups like the Evangelism group set up to encourage a culture of Evangelism.

Other Small Groups reflect stage of life, including; Youth small groups, 20's Plus and the Mums and Little Ones.

All the Small groups successfully transitioned online from the first week of the Pandemic.

Next Generation

Young Adults: Kingdom Culture Young Adults Conference at Centre Parcs in September 2019 was a huge success with about 260 delegates attending, an increase of just over 8%. Once again it was all organised and front led by the Young Adults. This year had Simon Holly as guest speaker.

Youth: The Church aims to ensure that Sundays are beneficial to all family members. Each site runs Children and Youth Sunday services, with the Enfield site also offering mid-week Youth Small Group and socials, which aim to help our youth to develop strong friendships within church, giving them the opportunity to grow through life with like-minded peers. Our Youth Services are kept interactive, instructional and impactful – helping those who attend, to face the issues affecting young people today. The Youth ministry continues to thrive and grow with the Enfield site going to 2 screens in February 2020.

Children: The Children ministry caters for children from age 1 to 11 under 3 different groups – Jubilee Tots (Age 1 to 2 years); Jubilee Stars (age 3 to 4 years) and Jubilee Champions, the largest group catering for primary aged children (Age 4 to 11 years). The rebranding of Jubilee Champions in January 2019 and the introduction of "Service Hosts" and the Hi-Voltage praise crew led to an increase of about 29% over the year.

Women's Ministry

The Women's ministry under the leadership of Pastor Kemi Koleoso continues to grow. Courage Conference 2019 was very successful with over a thousand women attending. This represents a growth of over 25% on the previous year. Guest speakers included Bianca Olthoff and Cynthia Garett and Melinda Henderson. Many lives were impacted and changed as person after person was empowered and set free.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities Men's Stronger Ministry

The men's ministry continues to grow and flourish. This year saw the launch of the first ever Stronger Men's away conference in June 2019 with about 143 going away together to spend the weekend learning and seeking God. This is likely to become an annual event in the life of the church.

Events and Conferences

International Giving Day and Crossover 2019

The church's annual International Giving Day in May 2019 and the Crossover Service (Jan 2020) were the biggest ever.

Members from across the 3 sites joined by their friends and visitor came together at Lea Valley Athletics Stadium and celebrated the goodness of God to his people and all that He is doing amongst us. Many people gave a response to the gospel at the crossover service.

Newday Conference 2019

Attendance at the New Day Youth conference at 241, was the highest number to date. This is a 22% increase on last year's figure of 197. The Church continues to resource and invest in this from paying for the 4 man team of cooks for the week to subsidising and paying for Youths whose financial situations would otherwise make it impossible for them to attend, as the conference is making a significant difference in the life of Youths across our nation.

Manifest Presence 2020

The January 2020 Manifest Presence weekend conference with Rambabu and Terry Virgo as guest speakers was very successful. Over 800 people attended the Saturday program. Once again God's presence was evident and we had reports of various people being healed by prayer.

Summer 2019

The summer time this year was one of sharing fellowship together as a family as well as doing activities that bless the community. The Ilford and Woodgreen sites enjoyed family times together with various activities and events held for the church family.

The annual community Summer BBQ was very well attended despite being held at the new venue of Lee Valley stadium as the church had outgrown the previous location. Free food and drinks were provided for all.

Other

The School of Worship and the Marriage Course continue to do well. We started a new course called Foundations, which helps people learn about the basics of the Christian faith.

December 2019 also saw a repeat of the very successful Winter Ball event for our Young Adult group. This was very well attended and loved by all.

Social Action at Jubilee,

Mission is at the heartbeat of the Church and our vision is to help those beyond ourselves wherever we identify a need. The following projects took place in the course of the financial year:

Foodbank

The North Enfield Foodbank, run by Jubilee Church, continues to operate every week from Jubilee Central.

People continue to give generously to the food collection boxes located in various supermarkets. Large amounts of food are also donated from Schools and other Churches. A total of 104,419kg of food was donated. This year over ten thousand people (5831 adults and 4172 children) were fed, which is an increase of about 42% on last year's figure (7046). 1842 people were fed in March 2020 as a result of the pandemic. This is an increase of 142% compared to March 2019. Top 5 reasons for referrals this year were low income which made up over 28% of all referrals, followed by benefit delays at 14%; with debt at 11% compared to last year when the top reasons for referral were low income, benefit delays and benefit changes in that order.

The outbreak of the pandemic in March 2020 and the subsequent lockdown later that month, led to an unprecedented need for the services of the Foodbank with a 142% increase in March 2020. We also saw an outpouring of volunteers to match the level of service needed. We are very thankful to God for the generosity of people that donated food and volunteering services to support those of our community that needed the services. This year, we also took on about 277 referrals from Haringey council to help support the covid effort.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Enfield Community Money Advice Centre

The money advice service started in February 2018 with 3 trained advisers, increasing to 4 from April 2019. It is open to clients every Tuesday and Thursday from 11.30am to 3.00pm and offer debt advice, budgeting and general advice with a view to make referrals as and when needed.

The Centre continues to grow from strength to strength. This year, we assisted a total of 26 people referred to us from various services like the Foodbank, organisations within the London Borough of Enfield, and other debt support agencies like StepChange and Christian Against Poverty (CAP). With the advent of the pandemic, the services were temporarily suspended while a plan was put together for an online transition.

Befriends

The Befriends service continues to be a valued part of the Social Community action provided by Jubilee Church. The service is provided by a team of volunteers who are assigned to specific local residential and nursing homes. The team associated with each home takes time to build one to one friendship with the elderly residents through regular visits and communication. Visiting the homes means volunteers don't just form relationships with residents but also with the staff and visiting family members too and there are often opportunities to invite them along to Jubilee especially when big events such as Crossover and International Day are coming up. The service had to be suspended in March 2020 due to the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Christmas Lunch on Us

Christmas Lunch on us service ran for the second year in December 2019. A total of about 50 homeless people were hosted to a 3 course Christmas meal. The event took place at Jubilee Central on Christmas day 2019. It was very successful and the feedback from all attendees (volunteers and guests) was very positive and everyone had a good time.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position Income

Income is recognised once the charity has an entitlement to the fund, it is probable that it will be received and it can be reliably measured.

Total consolidated income increased from £2.65mil to £3.07mil which is an increase of about 16%. This can be attributed to an increase in commitment and generosity of members in Tithes and Offerings, as well as the increased growth in number.

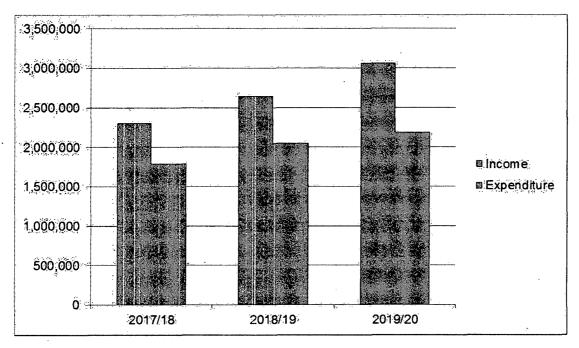
Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation to it or it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement and it can be reliably measured.

Total consolidated expenditure increased from £2.09mil to £2.24mil. This is an increase of 15%. This increase can be attributed to the overall increase in activity over the year.

Total group surplus for the year was £830K

Investment policy

Funds over and above immediate needs are invested over a number of banks over a number of different time years ranging from 6 months to 3 years. The Trustees ensure that an appropriate return continues to be obtained. The Trustees take advice related to investments as required. Consideration is also given to ethical and environmental issues and policies in choosing investment institutions.

Reserves policy

The total financial reserves of the church have been strengthened during the year as the members of the church continue to give generously. The Trustees are of the view that a minimum of three months expenditure, which amounts to £525K is to be retained in revenue for working capital. General reserves at 31 March 2020 were £2.4mil, well in excess of our minimum reserve policy. The trustees have proposed to transfer a sum of £1.7 mil from the General reserves to the building fund reserves in anticipation of the planned purchase of a building for the Enfield church. This will thus leave a balance of £695K in the General reserves.

Income and expenditure budgets are prepared annually and reviewed monthly.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Grant making policy

The charity grants donations to both institutions and individuals as part of the objectives and activities of the charity. There are no upper or lower limits of support. Gifts that are made to individuals represent responses to specific needs and also in support of those working overseas.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Jubilee Church London was incorporated (Private Limited by Guarantee) on 28th January 2014 and later registered as a Charitable Company on 6th February 2015.

Jubilee Church London is a multicultural church based in North London. It is part of the Newfrontiers family of churches as well as being a part of the Evangelical Alliance.

Trustees' induction and training

New trustees are appointed from within the church membership and on recommendation from the elders and existing trustees. They are individuals who are reliable and active in the life of the church and are committed to its vision and values. The Induction and training is carried out by a delegate of the Chairman using the Charity Commission guidance papers. Formal outside training is also made available to new Trustees.

Existing trustees attend training from time to time to keep up to date with the latest requirements and best practice. In addition, informal learning continues to take place on an ongoing basis.

Organisational structure

The trustees meet quarterly and have overall legal and financial responsibility for the Charity and are responsible for approving the budgets and monitoring on-going financial performance against the set budgets. They have delegated the spiritual and strategic leadership and the day to day management of the church to the Elders. The Elders oversee the 3 sites and are assisted by the different site pastors.

Key management personnel

Salaries for key management and staff are set by the non-salaried Trustees after taking advice from an External Adviser. National comparators are taken into account such as the National school pay scale, alongside individual responsibility levels and performance. The trustees consider the four Senior Pastors to be the key management personnel.

Related parties

Details of related party transactions are disclosed in the notes to the accounts.

Risk management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risks.

We rely on the generous and sacrificial giving of the church members to enable our many ministries to be able to continue to operate. As a charity, we also benefit from the tax relief provided by the Government's Gift Aid Scheme which enables us to extend our ministry in the community even more effectively. We shall continue to monitor giving levels and communicate to the congregation the need and our gratitude.

The trustees continued to spread the cash reserves across a number of banks in order to be covered by the Government guarantee against bank failures.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements and assessment of going concern

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

The financial statements are presented in sterling (£).

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing financial statements it is necessary to make certain judgements, estimated and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in the financial statements. The following judgements and estimates are considered by the trustees to have most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Useful economic life of tangible fixed assets:

The annual depreciation charge for tangible assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic lives and residual values of the assets. The useful economic lives and residual values are reassessed annually. They are amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets.

Group financial statements and basis of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary Forty Leisure Limited (Company no. 02824450) on a line-by-line basis.

Income

Recognition of income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- The charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- The trustees consider it probable that they will receive the resource;
- The monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Donations

Donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Tax reclaims on individual donations

Income from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the donations to which they relate.

Investment income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and, in accordance with the requirements of the SORP, and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs relating to that category

Grants payable are payments made in furtherance of the charitable objectives of the charity. grants are recognised upon an obligation being created on an accruals basis in accordance with FRS 102.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

No depreciation is charged in respect of freehold land and buildings as the residual value of the property after its estimated useful life is anticipated to be at least the carrying value of the property show in the financial statements.

Depreciation is provided on all other tangible fixed assets and rates are calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows;

Improvements to property over 10 years Equipment over 3 years Motor vehicles over 10 years

All fixed assets over £7,000 are capitalised

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash, current bank accounts and deposit bank accounts with no withdrawal limitations.

Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are recognised at their settlement amount

Fund accounting

Restricted funds

The restricted funds are available for expenditure on specific projects in accordance with the donors' directions.

Designated funds

These are unrestricted funds set aside by the Trustees from the general fund for specific purposes.

General funds

These are unrestricted funds available to the Church for everyday operations.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially settled at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Designated funds:

Mission support - monies designated for missions overseas and for ministries run by others outside of Jubilee Church or by the Jubilee Church for missional purposes or for the benefit of the wider community.

Building fund - monies set aside as a deposit for a Church Building (this is a long term plan). The transfer to Building Fund is money set aside for future building project.

Zambia - monies designated for the support of the charity's work in Zambia.

Zimbabwe Orphanage funds - monies put aside for the shelter and support of single mums and orphans in the Zimbabwe Jubilee family Centre.

Property Fund - this represents the net book value of the properties held by the group, less mortgage obligations.

Restricted funds:

Education fund - monies set aside to support the education of less advantaged children.

Mission month - monies given for a variety of overseas missions which the church community supports.

Foodbank - monies given to support the running of the North Enfield Food Bank.

Clothes bank - monies given to support the running of the Kids Clothes Bank.

Benevolent fund - monies given for the relief of specific financial crises of members.

Courageous Sisters - monies given for the Courageous Sisters project in Zambia.

20. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

The charity is committed to a rolling lease for their premises in Cineworld Enfield. This commenced on 17 September 2017 and will be at the cost of £250,000 per annum, with an increase on each anniversary of either 5% or in line with the retail price index, whichever is higher. There is also a rolling lease in place with Vue Cinema Woodgreen, which commenced 29th September 2015 at a cost of £65,000 per annum.

With the onset of the pandemic and the national lockdown in March 2020, the two cinemas were closed and the rentals suspended until the reopening of the venue.

21. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

During the year Mrs Kemi Koleoso and Mr Toyosi Koleoso, the spouse and son of a trustee Tope Koleoso received employment benefits of £43,590 and £22,023 respectively (2019: £20,000 and £15,733)
