Trustees' report for the year ended 31 August 2021

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report and a directors' report under company law.

The academy trust operates an academy for pupils aged three to seven serving a catchment area in Acocks Green and South Yardley. It has a pupil capacity of 270 and 39 full time equivalent nursery class places and had a roll of 257 in the school census on 7 October 2021.

Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The academy trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust. The trustees of Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company operates as Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School.

Details of the trustees who served during the year and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and Administrative details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

In accordance with normal commercial practice the academy has purchased insurance to protect trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on academy business. The insurance provides cover up to £10,000,000 on any one claim.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

Parent trustees are elected by the parents of registered pupils at the academy. A parent trustee must be a parent of a pupil at the academy at the time when she/he is elected.

Community Trustees may be appointed by the Governing Body provided that the person who is appointed as a Community Trustee is:

- · a person who lives or works in the community served by the Academy; or
- a person who, in the opinion of the Governing Body, is committed to the government and success of the Academy.

Staff Trustees are elected by employees of the Academy Trust. At least one Staff Trustee will be a qualified teacher and at least one will be a member of the support staff. Staff are invited to apply to become a Trustee when a vacancy becomes available or at the end of the Trustee's term of office (four years).

Staff Trustee positions are advertised internally and if there is more than one candidate there is a vote

Policies and Procedures Adopted for the Induction and Training of Trustees

The Governing Body has a Service Level Agreement with the Trustee Support department of Birmingham City Council to provide training, advice and support to the Governing Body.

Newly elected Trustees attend Induction Training for new Trustees, and in addition select specific training provided by Trustee Support in accordance with their needs.

One of the Trustees is appointed as Link Trustee, attends relevant training and provides information to Trustees following such training.

The Deputy Head Teacher is the Leader for Professional Development in school, and ensures that Trustees are provided with opportunities to receive training in accordance with their role, and the school's Training Plan.

Organisational structure

The Governing Body has established committees and appoints Trustees to serve on each of the committees annually. The committees for the period of the report were:

- · Finance, Staffing and Audit
- Premises
- Curriculum
- Head Teacher Performance Management
- Appeals
- Disciplinary and Complaints
- Redundancy

The written terms of reference of the committees include the monitoring of the preparation and management of the academy's budget and implementation of the academy's financial management policies, including risk assessment.

The board of trustees also appoints a responsible officer and this role has been fully implemented in accordance with the academy trust's financial procedures.

Decisions relating to Head Teacher Performance Management are reserved for the board of trustees.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

Head Teacher performance management committee decide upon the pay and remuneration of the Head Teacher. Other key management personnel have performance management targets set and meetings with the Head Teacher and his recommendations are approved by the Finance & Staffing committee.

Related parties and other Connected Charities and Organisations

Trustees' related parties and other connected charities and organisations are all documented on their pecuniary interest forms which are reviewed to ensure sound governance and transparency. The Academy publishes its relevant business and pecuniary interest of local governors on its website.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The main objectives for the year are:

- 1. To bring all children safely back into school in 2021
- 2. To develop a Recovery Curriculum to ensure progress for learners created by COVID-19
- 3. Learners make good progress to close the gap created by COVID-19 and school closures
- 4. Continue encourage healthy lifestyle, both physically and mentally

The strategies adopted for achieving these objectives are covered in detail in the school development plan which can be found on the school website.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities, the Governing Body has given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Strategic Report

Achievements and Performance

Since becoming an academy, Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School has taken a wide range of steps to ensure that the education standards for all its children have continued to improve. The school has focused on improvement linked to the school development plan to ensure a positive impact on outcomes for children. Nationally, all schools were closed to the majority of pupils on 5th January 2021 which impacted on the progress that the school was making against its objectives. The government also suspended all data collections. Progress against the 2020/21 objectives;

To bring all children safely back into school in 2021

The school operated in year group bubbles throughout the year. There were very few cases
of COVID-19 during the year and strategies that had been put in place such as staggered
start and finish times, reducing the number of people on site, remote assemblies contributed
to this

To develop a Recovery Curriculum to ensure progress for learners created by Covid-19

- A revised curriculum was put in place focussing on English and maths and Prime areas.
 Children came back from the first lockdown ready to learn but massive gaps in knowledge which were only exacerbated by the second lockdown
- Children seemed to have lost independence after the second lockdown and staff reprioritised content of the curriculum to ensure that children gained the skills and knowledge needed for the next school year.
- The school has embedded ClassDojo as a way to receive and provide work and feedback from children learning at home

Learners make good progress to close the gap created by Covid-19 and school closures

- Learning was disrupted due to the second lockdown and participation in home learning varied enormously from child to child.
- Remote education itself was very successful The infrastructure set up during the autumn term meant that the school was quickly able to deliver online learning. Parents fed back that they were pleased with the offer.
- Children made progress from their starting points

Continue to encourage healthy lifestyle, both physically and mentally

- School achieved both the Investors in Pupils award and the Bronze Unicef Rights Respecting School Award
- The school appointed a Senior Mental Health Lead to look at mental health and wellbeing and prioritise wellbeing throughout the school for pupils and staff
- The Relationships and Health Education curriculum was implemented after a consultation with all stakeholders
- Pupil voice interviews show that children say that they're safe and know who to speak to if they need help

- The school invested in new playground markings to encourage children to participate in a daily mile
- The Pastoral Manager trained as an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant and works with selected children on modifying behaviour strategies.

- Direct costs as a percentage of total costs were 64% (2020: 63%)
- Support costs as a percentage of total costs were 36% (2020: 37%)

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Financial Review

The financial results of Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School are detailed in the following pages. It is considered that the finances are sound and well established. The principal financial management policies adopted are laid down by the Finance Handbook for Academie's published by the ESFA and requirements as laid down by the Academy's Financial Handbook.

The principal funding source is grant income from the ESFA. All expenditure of this grant income is planned to fulfil the objectives and strategies of the Academy.

During the year ended 31 August 2021 total resources expended were £1,854,439 and the deficit of income over expenditure was £180,499 which included depreciation of £61,829.

Reserves Policy

The trustees continually monitor the reserves of the charitable company. This process encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams and the need to match commitments with income and nature of reserves.

It is the board of trustees' general policy to maintain reserves at a reasonable level to try to ensure financial security of the academy for future years.

The academy had total funds at 31 August 2021 of £554,456 which included £63,557 of restricted funds not available for general purposes of the academy trust, £250,292 of free reserves defined as unrestricted funds available for general purposes and £2,376,607 which can only be realised by the disposal of tangible fixed assets.

The balance on restricted general funds (excluding pension reserve) plus the balance on unrestricted funds was a surplus of £313,849.

In addition, the deficit on the restricted pension fund of £2,136,000 arises from an actuarial deficit on the local government pension scheme which will be dealt with as advised by the actuary.

The trustees regularly review the level of reserves and aim to maintain them at a minimum of one month of expenditure. Budgeted expenditure for 2021/22 is £1,549,111 and hence the minimum target is £129,093. Unrestricted reserves at 31 August 2021 therefore represent two months.

Investment Policy

Some surplus funds were invested within savings accounts covered by the FSCS limit of £85,000. These investments are carried out in accordance with the powers vested in the Governing Body and the academy's Treasury Management Policy.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The trustees have considered the major risks and uncertainties facing the charitable company which include changes in legislation and regulations and cash flow management and have put in place procedures to deal with these matters.

Attention has also been focussed on non-financial risks arising from fire, health and safety. These risks are managed by ensuring accreditation is up to date, having robust policies in place, and regular awareness training for staff working in these operational areas.

Fundraising

The children take part in various fundraising events throughout the year to raise money for charities such as Children in Need, Comic Relief, Marie Curie, MacMillan Cancer Support, Poppy Appeal, international disasters etc.

We feel that there is also a need locally for support so we are a dropping off point for the Acocks Green Foodbank. The collection point is in the main school entrance. We also donate harvest assembly donations to local residents, Acocks Green Foodbank and Birmingham City Mission, which provides food for the homeless

Governance statement for the year ended 31 August 2021

Scope of Responsibility

As trustees, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

As trustees, we have reviewed and taken account of the guidance in DfE's Governance Handbook and competency framework for governance.

The board of trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the head Teacher, as Accounting Officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School and the Secretary of State for Education. They are also responsible for reporting to the board of trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Trustees' Report and in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities. The **board of trustees** has formally met 7 times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of trustees was as follows:

A review of governance was once again undertaken during the year, which found that the governing body continued to demonstrate strengths in terms of their overall conduct and commitment, the existence of a clear strategy for achieving the school's vision, the provision of effective challenge and support to the school leadership team and good financial management and compliance via the Finance, Staffing and Audit (FSA) Committee. Several areas for improvement were also identified: the need to refresh the governing body's awareness of the annually-updated guidance relating to Keeping Children Safe in Education; a need to refresh the process for overseeing Head Teacher performance, as the school continues to recover from the disruption relating to the pandemic, and to re-start visits for governors to the school so that they retain a familiarity with how subjects are delivered and can develop an understanding of school life first-hand; there was also a feeling amongst governors that they were not yet fully abreast of all the measures in place in school to maintain levels of staff and pupil wellbeing.

The main challenge faced in the year was in supporting the school in delivering their recovery curriculum, and in managing the risk of further disruption and risks to health brought about by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. In the context of there being fewer children in the community to take up places at the school, governors were also actively engaged in the management team's efforts to maintain effective financial control and mitigate the risk of a budget deficit this year and in future years.

Subsequently, the following actions were taken:

- A refresh of the latest guidance related to Keeping Children Safe in Educations was led by the Head Teacher as part of a Full Governing Body Meeting early in the Autumn term, and governors confirmed they had subsequently read and understood the relevant sections of guidance.
- A new School Improvement Partner was identified, following the retirement of our previous partner, and dates were confirmed to re-start the Head Teacher's performance management process in the new school year.
- Governor visits to school and/or video calls between governors and their staff subject leader buddies recommenced.
- The Head Teacher took governors through the outcomes of the recent mental health and wellbeing audit, and it was suggested that governors could in future check in with their buddies to confirm that the wellbeing provisions made available by the school were publicised and wellunderstood.
- The routine established last year, of circulating summarised monthly budget statements to all governors on a monthly basis, continued to ensure that all governors were aware of the school's financial position; a sub-committee was also established to identify and implement interventions necessary to control spending, and thus ensure that the school's budget remains sustainable in light of continued reduced income forecasts for the next few years.

The trust intends to conduct its next self-evaluation/external review in January 2022.

Review of value for money

As accounting officer the Head Teacher has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where appropriate. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- The Deputy Head Teacher left and the new Deputy Head Teacher was appointed with a class commitment which lead to a significant cost-saving.
- The school share a SENDCo with another local school and so do not incur the full-time cost of this role
- There was an extensive procurement process undertaken for the renewal of our photocopier lease to ensure we obtained best value.
- During lockdown the school managed to obtain a significant reduction in its catering contract costs.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of the academy trust's policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Cottesbrooke Infant and Nursery School for the year to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period from 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

The Risk and Control Framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- regular reviews by the finance and general purposes committee of reports which indicate financial
 performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure
 programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · identification and management of risks.

The board of trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided to appoint Academy Advisory to complete the internal control audit for the academy.

Their role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial systems. In particular the checks carried out in the current period included:

- testing of payroll systems
- · testing of purchase systems
- testing of control accounts / bank reconciliations

On an annual basis, the Finance Consultant reports to the board of trustees, through the finance, staffing and audit committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities and annually prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

The internal control report raised three minor points, but confirmed that:

- the financial responsibilities of the GB are being properly discharged
- resources are managed in an efficient, economical and effective manner
- sound systems of internal control are maintained
- financial considerations are fully considered in reaching decisions

Review of Effectiveness

As accounting officer, William Loughlin (the Head Teacher) has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the internal reviewer;
- the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process of the school resource management self-assessment tool;
- the work of the executive managers within the academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the finance, staffing and audit committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2021

1. Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Income (continued)

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

· Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. Upon sale the fair value of the goods is charged against, and the proceeds are recognised as, 'Income from other trading activities'.

Donated fixed assets

Where the donated good is a fixed asset it is measured at fair value, unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor should be used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the academy trust's accounting policies.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the academy trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Long leasehold buildings

- straight line over 50 years

Fittings and equipment

- 20% straight line

Computer hardware

- 33% straight line

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use and reclassified to freehold or leasehold land and buildings.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined by FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2021 (continued)

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Financial instruments (continued)

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Pension benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income/(expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency or Department for Education.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 21, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by West Midland Pension Fund. Both are multi-employer defined-benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every four years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service
 to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with
 the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service deficit
 of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate
 is 2.4% above the rate of CPI, assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of
 earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return
 including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £115,877 (2020: £69,190).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

21. Pension and similar obligations (continued)

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2021 was £130,000 (2020 : £280,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £104,000 (2020 : £254,000) and employees' contributions totalled £26,000 (2020 : £26,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 23.7% for employers and between 5.5% and 10.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

The trustees have agreed that the trust will make additional contributions in addition to normal funding levels over the next 21 years.
