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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity's main object is to relieve the needs of disabled persons whose disabilities were caused as a result of their mother taking an anti-convulsant drug during pregnancy to treat her condition in such ways as the trustees may from time to time decide.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

2022 has been a complex year for INFACT especially as everything started to reach normality once again. Our first big achievement came in October 2021 when we received confirmation from the World Health Organisation (WHO) that our proposals had been accepted and that the Essential Medicines List for Sodium Valproate was to be updated to ensure every county across the world were made aware of the dangers of the medication when taken in pregnancy.

As we had met with the Sunday Times Health editor back in October last year too, we continued that conversation as they had shown particular interest in the story. The best news arrived in March when we were informed that the story of the damages caused by Valproate were to hit their front page, however the shock came on 17 April 2022 when the story had also continued into pages 8 and 9 and also the Editors Column. The coverage wasn't to stop there, as we were also told that the Sunday Times had agreed to back our campaign and continue to report and help push for redress.

This year, we had decided to organize a fund-raising event which had brought with it many trying times for those taking part as they trained to climb Ben Nevis. The climb took place in August when the weather was at its best but extremely hot. Hats of to those completing the climb as they raised around £3,000.

In September, INFACT we had been asked to attend and act as keynote speaker at the Health Safety Journalism conference which attracted a huge attendance of around 1,000 healthcare professionals. The attention given to Valproate and its problems brought with it plenty of questions and numerous contacts within the profession.

September brought with it numerous challenges as INFACT had been asked to give evidence to the Health Select Committee about the campaign and the experience of those harmed by Valproate, however due to the train strikes was put back until December. We had also been contacted by production companies who, due to 2023 being the 50th year of Valproate, wanted to make a documentary of the topic. Then came the terrible news from Buckingham Palace that the Queen had died and everything came to a stop. However, Janet Williams, due to receiving her MBE back in April received an invite to the funeral and was accompanied by colleague Emma Murphy to travel with her. The experience was very emotional, an experience which will never be forgotten.

At the start of October information arrived that the Patient Safety Commissioner had been named, and so INFACT took it upon themselves to make contact enabling our first meeting with her on the 12th October 2022. There was a sudden surge of meetings which followed, this included a meeting with our APPG, of which the Chair is Cat Smith MP, closely followed by a meeting with Health Minister Maria Caulfield on the 19th.

By the end of the year INFACT had given evidence to the Health Select Committee and had numerous appointments with the Patient Safety Commissioner (PSC) and Health Minister who agreed that compensation was needed for those who had been harmed by Valproate, with the costings of that given to the PSC.

Christmas came and went and by January 13th we had our 3rd meeting with the National Institute for Clinical Excellence who deal with the guidance for healthcare professionals, in this meeting it was agreed that information would be put forward about the problems caused by Fetal Valproate Spectrum Disorder enable better diagnosis, however this wouldn't come into force until later in the year.

By February the future definitely looked brighter with the possibility of redress, better information on diagnosis for valproate spectrum Disorder and a meeting in the diary to discuss a Diagnostic Clinic with the NHS.

It had been yet another busy year with no signs of it slowing down in 2023!

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The statement of financial activities shows a deficit of £8,655 and carried forward funds surplus of £179.

Donations and grants during the period were £2,551.
