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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 October 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 October 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

STRATEGIC REPORT

Objectives and activities

The Society's objectives are set out in its governing document. There are two objectives. The first is to promote, advance and improve for the benefit of the public, agriculture, horticulture and rural crafts and skills in all their branches by the improvement of livestock and the demonstration and showing of livestock, machinery, crafts, products, methods and processes connected with agriculture and agricultural education in particular by the holding of an annual show. The second is to provide or assist in the provision of facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

Under normal circumstances, the Society brings a showcase of agricultural activities to the general public, thus giving the opportunity for them to see animals, crafts, skills & produce at close quarters whilst addressing the need to educate the public regarding agricultural produce, processes and provenance of food. The agricultural events also provide a showcase to producers wishing to promote their products. Great importance is placed on providing the public with a well-rounded, educational portrayal of agriculture and the associated industries. The Society seeks to improve and develop this function each year, bringing new elements to it to continue educating the public in new agricultural developments. By doing this, it believes that it is providing the public with a platform which will improve knowledge of the agricultural industry whilst enabling agricultural based businesses with the opportunity to display their products & services. The main activity that the Society organises to meet this objective is the flagship event, the Pembrokeshire County Show. These activities have been affected since March 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, but there are clear plans in place to resume our normal activities in 2022. The trustees are constantly reviewing and implementing strategies to attract larger audiences and more exhibitors to this event to ensure the above objectives are met.

The Society also provides facilities to events and organisations which seek to assist less able members of the public to enjoy experiences that they may not be able to benefit from otherwise. Examples of such activities are the annual Family Fun Day which is organised by the Society, the provision of showground facilities to the local YFC movement and the provision of facilities to local organisations who work with disabled stakeholders. The Society believes it has excellent facilities for such events and wishes to continue to expand upon the existing use of the facilities. It will continue to work with existing users and will seek to build relationships with potential new users of the facility.

The other activities undertaken by the Society, to support the above charitable objectives, are the management of the portfolio of properties it holds on its estate which includes the receipt of income from rental properties, the management of regular events on the showground such as Car Boot Sales and also hosting of various other events on the showground such as the aforementioned annual Family Fun Day for less-able people, a Christmas Fayre, Wedding Fayres, Poultry Shows, the annual YFC Rally and numerous other events in our venues. We look forward to hopefully a return to some normality in 2022 in terms of events.

Volunteers are of utmost importance to the charity. All trustees, committee members and show stewards are entirely voluntary and without their valuable contribution the Society, and in particular the Pembrokeshire County Show, could not operate as it does. It is estimated that the total volunteer numbers are approximately 200 individuals, and they are provided administrative support by staff.

The Trustees have regard to the Charity Commissions guidance on public benefit, and this remains a primary focus when reviewing the aims and objectives for future activities of the Society.

Reserves Policy

The Board aims to see the Society's free reserves at a level that ensures the future viability of the Show and the Society. This is in order to ensure that, should the Society be unable to hold a show in any given year in the future, there are sufficient funds available to run the Society.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Pembrokeshire Agricultural Society is a Limited Company, it is also a registered charity. The Board of Directors of Pembrokeshire Agricultural Society Limited are also its Charity Trustees enabling the Society to be compliant with both company and charitable law. As a company limited by guarantee, the Society's governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Board of Directors are responsible and accountable for the affairs and finances of the Limited Company that is the Society. The Board has approved the appointment of contracted services for the provisions of HR and Health & Safety advice, to include the ongoing development & monitoring of health and safety processes appropriate to the effective management of risks during the annual show

The Show Council acts in an advisory and consultative capacity, in all matters relating to the organisation of the Society's flagship event - the three-day Pembrokeshire County Show, and any sub-shows such as the Spring Equine Shows. The Show Council is comprised of the members from the show committees:- equine, show jumping, cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, poultry, craft & horticulture, dogs and vintage and others elected. The Show Council comprises of up to 50 elected members, Directors of PAS Ltd, the President and the President Elect. One third of elected members shall retire from office each year, but are eligible for re-election. The Show Council, in normal circumstances, meets bi-monthly.

Show Council members are drawn from the catchment area of the Society and generally represent a wide cross section of the community and have particular skills that they can bring to the Show Council. Each new council member is presented with an induction pack containing information about the Society, its constitution and objectives.

The Society has a wholly owned subsidiary, P.A.S. Promotions Limited which operates events at the Showground.

Achievement and performance

The activities of Pembrokeshire Agricultural Society were once again affected the by nationwide restrictions which were in place due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We are however very pleased to be able to report that we were able to increase our activities compared to the previous year.

The Society continued to be operated by the Board of Trustees with support from other voluntary members of the organisation, and one part-time administrative assistant during the year.

During the first six months of the year there were no events held by the Society due to the continuing pandemic and the associated restrictions on public gatherings. However, by the beginning of April it had become apparent that events could recommence under certain conditions. With this in mind, the newly rejuvenated Equine Committee arranged two Spring Equine Shows.

The events were held on separate weekends in May 2021 to ensure that all COVID-19 regulations were met, following detailed consultation with the local authority to ensure they were happy with the measures taken to limit the risk of the spread of COVID-19. Having obtained agreement from the local authority to proceed, two very successful days of competitions were held at the showground with many complimentary comments from exhibitors. The events were sadly not open to the public due to the restrictions in place at the time.

We were delighted with the feedback from these inaugural events, and look forward to continuing to build on their great success in 2022 in more normal circumstances.

Unfortunately, we were once again unable to hold our annual Family Fun Day in May 2021 due to the ongoing pandemic. Bearing in mind that guests at this event fall into the vunerable health category, it is planned to revive this event once COVID case numbers adequately diminish.

As time progressed, it became apparent that once again we would not be able to hold our normal flagship event, the three day Pembrokeshire County Show. After several meetings of our Show Council and the relevant sub-committees it was agreed that it would be feasible to hold a scaled down event that would be open to very small number of visitors. In a period of eight weeks the society's volunteers sprung into action to organise a two day event which was held on the Wednesday and Thursday of our normal show week.

Once again there was detailed consultation with the local authority and the Society's plans were agreed subject to a maximum number of attendees of 4,000 people.

Bearing in mind the limitations on attendee numbers, the event was sadly closed to the general public but society members could purchase tickets to attend. Competitions were held for livestock, equine, vintage and showjumping classes. Competitors travelled from all over the UK to attend, and given the difficult circumstances we were delighted with the number of entries forward. Due to the fact that there were very limited numbers of visitors on site there were no trade stands as such, but there were a small number of organisations represented in the newly formed Welfare Village. Feedback from this event was once again excellent, and this provided a just reward to our very hard working volunteers. Many people commented that they preferred the simpler layout, and our 2022 Pembrokeshire County Show is currently being planned with these comments in mind.

The Crops Competition was also held during the summer months, but given the restrictions in place there were no crops at the two day event.

We would not have been able to hold the above events without the financial support received from several sources.

We applied for and were successful in obtaining grant funding from the Welsh Assembly Government Cultural Development Fund which helped to cover our running costs during the months when it was not possible for us to hold any events, and this was invaluable to us.

We also once again received sponsorship from the Welsh Assembly Government, and from many of our other sponsors. The support of all our sponsors is absolutely crucial to us and we are very grateful for their kindness once again this year.

The membership charging structure was changed for 2021, with membership to the Society now costing a flat fee of £30. This decision was taken as part of the Board of Trustees simplification of processes, and we will continue to roll this change out during the coming year. Members who wish to attend any society events will be given the opportunity to acquire tickets at the appropriate time.

The trustees have continued to take the opportunity to conduct reviews of the operations of the organisation and changes continue to be implemented. One of the main drivers is to simplify our processes and procedures, whilst ensuring that we are complaint with all relevant regulations and legislation. The changes introduced to date have proved to be successful, with the administrative burden of our internal processes being significantly reduced.

We are pleased to be able to report that all rental properties were fully occupied for most of the year despite the difficult business conditions. The income from the estate has been essential during these difficult times to support the organisation's charitable objectives. We continue to work with our tenants to support them as much as possible and to strengthen the relationship so each party can continue to support one another.

There were a limited number of events on the estate during the year, with our Parkhouse Building having some bookings and the Pavilion being used mainly for business meetings and training courses by local agricultural sector businesses. Our car boot sales ran for part of the year, when weather and COVID restrictions would allow. We were also very pleased to be able to support the Celtic Truck Show on the showground in late August which was raising money for local charities. We still aim to hold more events on the showground throughout the year such as equine shows, calf shows, craft shows and garden shows.

Notable developments during the period was the commencement of negotiations with Pembrokeshire College for the lease of a site for a new facility on the showground, and also the development of some community gardens on the showground. While both projects were in their infancy during the year in question we are pleased to be able to report that both matters have successfully progressed at the time of writing this report.

The Society continued to offer opportunities and support to young people from all backgrounds who are involved in rural activities throughout Pembrokeshire. We have continued to support the Pembrokeshire YFC movement in any way we can and have also continued to work with Pembrokeshire College to help provide facilities for some of their vocational courses.

We remain very proud of the relationships we have developed with our stakeholders and we look forward to continuing those relationships as we look forward to the end of the pandemic restrictions.

Much work has again been undertaken by the trustees to ensure that the society is financially stable, and the trustees are pleased that the decisions they have made have ensured that the society remains in a favourable position from which it can move forward with confidence.

The continued support of the dedicated team of volunteers who work within the Society must once again recognized and acknowledged. Their support continues to be immeasurable, and the society would not be able to function without their dedication and assistance.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The financial results for the Society show a surplus for the year ending 31 October 2021. This is due a considerable decrease in costs compared to the previous year combined with income from grants received.

The overall result is that the combined result for the charity and its subsidiary is a surplus of £129,835 for the year compared to a deficit of £50,846 for the previous year. This turnaround in results of £180,681 is due to the changes highlighted below.

The show had a surplus of £44,657 compared to a deficit of £84,011 the previous year. Income was £134,939 compared to £73,551 the previous year with a large proportion of this being income from COVID support grant schemes, which amounted to £67,116 in 2021. We also received sponsorship of £43,183, membership income of £8,630 and entry fees of £10,358. Expenditure was £90,282 with the main items included in this being prize money of £9,590, infrastructure costs of £9,201, wages costs of £8,713 and depreciation of £13,718.

The deficit in the previous year mainly related to staff costs incurred during the period November 2019 to March 2020 prior to the cancellation of the 2020 Pembrokeshire County Show. The vast majority of grant income was from the Welsh Assembly Government Cultural Resilience Fund which were awarded to help fund overhead costs during the period when we were unable to hold events. This funding was obviously a huge assistance to the society at a very difficult time.

If the 2021 Show was taken as a stand alone event, the net position of running the event - including overhead costs for the eight week run up period - was that the event broke even.

The financial performance of the estate – including the trading subsidiary PAS Promotions Limited - continued to be affected by the pandemic. The trading subsidiary continued to be affected as were the bookings for events in the buildings on the estate.

Income was £217,400 compared to £227,067 the previous year. The reduction in income, which was due to very few events taking place on the showground during the year, was more than compensated for by a significant reduction in costs of £53,168 which mainly related to the reduction in wages costs. This resulted in a surplus on the estate of £85,178 compared to a surplus of £41,677 previous year. The Board has continued to work towards ensuring that the properties owned by the Society are fully occupied, and are in good order. Ongoing increased utilisation of the property owned by the Society is once again a high priority for the coming year.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Pembrokeshire Agricultural Society Ltd (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 October 2021 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. 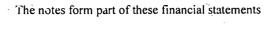

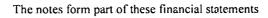

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Company Status

The Society is a company limited by guarantee.

Basis for valuation of Gifts in Kind and Donated Services

The society values gifts in kind and donated services at an estimated market value. Due to the cancellation of the main show, there were no gifts in kind or donated services.

Group Financial Statements

These Financial Statements consolidate the results of the Charity and its wholly owned subsidiary - PAS Promotions limited. A separate statement of financial activities and income and expenditure account are not presented for the Charity itself following exemptions afforded by para. 397 of the SORP.

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Most costs are directly attributable to the running costs of the annual show or the management of the Estate and are allocated accordingly. The cost of the company's staff is divided between the Show activity and the management of the Estate on the basis of time devoted

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life or, if held under a finance lease, over the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

Plant and machinery

- 20% on reducing balance and 10% on reducing balance

Tractors

10% on reducing balance

Motor vehicles

- 15% on reducing balance

The Freehold Property is included in the financial statements at its revalued amount based upon open market values. As valuations are carried out every 5 years a separate impairment review is not considered necessary. The Board of Management is of the view that its policy on maintenance ensures that the value of its land and buildings is unlikely to fall below the value currently shown in the accounts.

Investment property

Investment property is shown at most recent valuation. Any aggregate surplus or deficit arising from changes in fair value is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the Balance Sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their estimated useful lives or the lease term, whichever is shorter.

The interest element of these obligations is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.
