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TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The exclusively charitable objects for which The Charity is established are:

- 1. To advance education
- 2. To relieve need in individuals arising from their youth, age, gender infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances
- 3. To develop the capacity and skills of the members of communities that are socially or socially and economically disadvantaged in such a way that they are better able to identify and help meet their needs and to participate more fully in society

Such other exclusively charitable means as the trustees may from time to time determine.

Significant activities

- Adapting programmes and raising funds during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- NHS fundraising appeal launched.
- Community 'careline' providing a check in with our supporters and vulnerable members of the community.
- Launch of our Building Brighter Futures strategic document.
- Launch of the Sport Value Bank a tool to measure the social value that projects create.
- Creation and launch of a Sport Toolkit version of the Skills Builder Framework.
- Roll-out of Ahead of the Game in partnership with Movember.
- Conducted research on homophobic language in sport and supported the delivery of the first Pride Game in professional rugby union.
- Creation of The Jesters our wheelchair rugby team.
- Appointment of Ambassadors to increase awareness of our work
- Launched 'Move, Learn, Grow' our primary school offer, in partnership with Sport Impact and Kingston University's CPESA department.

Public benefit

As required by the Charities Act 2011, the Trustees have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when formulating the grant making policy. In particular, the Trustees consider how grants can be made to ensure maximum benefit flows through to the intended ultimate beneficiaries. The grants benefit several public causes, as detailed in the notes to the financial statements.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Achievement and performance

A year that started off with such excitement as we entered the growth phase of our planned development suddenly ended with COVID-19 and all the uncertainty it continues to create.

Reassuringly our strategic approach enabled us to continue to deliver a lot our work, albeit in a revised format, as we expedited our use of digital tools and the creation of online products such as our STEAM resources.

The team were able to achieve programme targets (some of which were revised post lockdown), which once more meant a growth in the numbers of participants and programmes, but more importantly it meant we continued to have a positive impact on the communities we work in and were unrelenting in our aim to Build Brighter Futures.

Strategy and direction

Our vision

A world where the power of sport is used to drive positive change.

Our mission

To use the Harlequin network and brand to inspire, educate and equip individuals and communities at home and around the world to change their lives and fulfil their potential.

Our focus is on inspirational, sustainable, and transformative solutions that tackle inequality, poor health and the challenges facing the most vulnerable in society using education, skills development, and entrepreneurship.

Whilst growth in the numbers of participants is a useful measure, we are now more focused on the social value we create through our delivery. These two measures are not mutually exclusive and may mean creating greater social value through engaging more numbers. However, our focus is more on reaching the right people, at the right time, with the correct programme to maximise our impact and effectiveness.

The strategy we developed and launched in early 2019 has weathered the test of the pandemic. Our approach is to focus delivery in the 'Harlequin Heartlands', specifically the boroughs surrounding The Stoop and in countries around the world through selected partners; and indirectly through the development of strategic relationships, creation of resources and the support of campaigns on topics we are passionate about.

To maximise our impact and achieve a consistent approach across our programmes, we co-created a bespoke sports-based version of a Skills Builder toolkit designed to support the development of eight essential skills and capabilities. This will help to guarantee our beneficiaries have an opportunity to acquire the essential skills for work and life and help us to demonstrate a clear approach to how we work and the difference we make.

We also recognise that sport has long been a means to unite people and sports organisations continue to deliver positive social outcomes for communities, generating social value through their work. There is an unmet need to quantify this value more accurately.

By investing in the development of the Sport Value Bank (SVB), we have set a new industry standard approach to impact measurement and can demonstrate our true value to society, whilst supporting other like-minded organisations to do the same.

Our delivery falls under three broad pillars:

Skills

We believe in the principle that everyone should have the opportunity to build the essential skills, experience, and aspirations to succeed in the 21st century. As a result, we will design, develop, and deliver a range of programmes that meet the needs of the beneficiaries, with a specific focus on those most vulnerable in society.

The relationship with the Club presents opportunity to develop a 'skills' pathway, from work experience through to

employment, that supports our ambition and positively impacts the local community. Success will be predicated on developing and maintaining partnerships with key stakeholders and the creation of opportunities that provide a valuable experience for the participants.

Wellbeing

Good health is central to a person's happiness and well-being. We are committed to increasing awareness and supporting preventative approaches that enable our communities to improve their mental and physical health.

By working with key partners both locally and nationally, we will deliver innovative programmes and campaigns that respond to the needs of our communities. By encouraging participation in regular physical activity and changes in behaviour to support overall improvements in health, we aim to help people within our communities to lead happy and fulfilled lives.

Inclusion

We will continue to challenge discriminatory attitudes, removing barriers to participation for everyone, regardless of age, sex, disability, race, ethnicity, religion or economic or other status. By supporting the design and delivery of programmes that promote the inclusion of those from traditionally under-represented groups in sport, we will demonstrate that rugby and sport in general is for all.

Programmes and partnerships

- 1. Skills Programme:
- 1.1. Hitz a Premiership Rugby Ltd (PRL) programme. We achieved the required volume of students to enrol on the programme for the season (30). Following the national lockdown in March, the students completed their academic year learning remotely/online, which they adapted to well, continuing to attend remote lessons and achieve positive outcomes.
- 1.2. Hitz on Track another PRL programme which we delivered to circa 45% of target (180 young people). This is predominantly delivered during the summer term and as a result was subsequently affected by COVID-19.
- 1.3. Engage an ESF Funded Programme (Positive Directions London South) Short educational intervention for targeted NEET young people offering Functional Skill in English and Maths and positive enrichment opportunities. Volumes increased and contract extended as a result of performance, continued to run remotely for enrolled students throughout lockdown.
- 1.4. National Citizen Service (NCS) delivered a pilot programme of NCS on behalf of PRL during October 2019.
- 1.5. Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme became the only Premiership Rugby Club currently licenced to deliver The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme (Bronze and Silver) which will be deliver to young people on our programmes adding value to our existing enrichment offer.
- 2. Wellbeing Programmes:
- 2.1. METTLE our flagship mental resilience programme which is delivered in primary and secondary schools (years 5-7). Delivery was on track but slowed by lockdown. As a result we undertook a refresh of the programme and relaunched it as part of Harlequins EDU (as PSHE), a comprehensive learning hub which takes inspiration from one of the world's most famous rugby clubs, Harlequin F.C.
- 2.2. Tackling Health PRL programme, delivery had commenced in nine schools during February engaging 401 young people. However, programme was paused as a result of Covid-19 for the remainder of the season.
- 2.3. Ahead of the Game delivered in partnership with Movember, Ahead of the Game teaches young male athletes, parents and coaches how to talk about mental health. Two members of staff attended training in Toronto delivered by Movember and the programme was later piloted with local community rugby clubs affiliated to Harlequin FC.

- 2.4. Matchday Health Checks delivered two matchday events before lockdown curtailed the final two.
- 2.5. Diabetes Decathlon delivered a pilot programme in partnership with Merton Clinical Commissioning Group, partnership lead for South West London Health & Care Partnership. A new Diabetes Prevention Decathlon programme funded by the HIN Innovation Grants. This project piloted a new type of diabetes prevention programme over 10 weeks that offered patients more choice and encourages them to work together as a team, trying different types of physical activity while learning key information that can help prevent the onset of Type 2 Diabetes. Using our Spot Value Bank we were able to demonstrate that the pilot created £48,400 of social value for society.
- 2.6. Imagination Café a free, pop-up community event featuring music, art activities, rugby memorabilia show and tell, delicious refreshments served by a selection of Harlequins players. Specifically designed for people with dementia and their carers The Imagination Café welcomes all those over the age of 55, living in Richmond, Hounslow & Kingston who are living alone, in care or assisted living. This was delivered three times throughout the year, with the final event postponed as a result of COVID-19.
- 3. Inclusion Programmes:
- 3.1. Switch a flagship programme developing girls participation in rugby.
- 3.2. Project Rugby a PRL programme aiming to introduce the game to traditionally under-represented communities in playing and/or watching rugby. Worked in partnership with The Met Task Force and delivered a 'Celebration of Rugby' festival at Staines RFC, engaging over 400 young people.
- 3.3. Premiership Rugby Champions App a PRL programme that provides online learning resources for teachers to use in their classroom.
- 3.4. Launched International Rugby Leaders Programme encouraging the development of the next generation of female leaders paused due to COVID-19.
- 3.5. Launched Jesters Harlequins wheelchair rugby team.
- 3.6. Sport Inclusion Project research on the use of homophobic language in sport + support of Harlequins Pride game in February.
- 3.7. Move, Learn, Grown primary school programme in partnership with Sport Impact and Kingston University's CPESA department.
- 3.8. Community Response Team funding from City Bridge Trust London Community Fund enabled us to reach out and engage with some of our vulnerable supporters during the first lockdown, provide valuable mental health resources as part of our partnership with Believe Perform and deliver activities to re-engage young people with education after the first lockdown.
- 3.9. Satellite hubs funding from London Sport enabled us to deliver 5 targeted physical activity hubs which went online during the first lockdown.

4. Additional support and Partnerships

- 4.1. Continued support of Team Richmond as part of the London Youth Games.
- 4.2. Support of Seb's Fund with a game dedicated for fundraising.
- 4.3. Player appearances at events throughout the year in support of local charities and organisations.
- 4.4. Donation of signed items and match tickets for auctions for charities.
- 4.5. Supported Memphis Inner City Rugby, a partner of the Atlas Foundation, in a visit and playing opportunity for one of their participants.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Financial review

Financial position

The Harlequins Foundation's total income for the year amounted to £539,854 compared to £721,905 in the previous period.

Total restricted income amounted to £138,510. This was made up from one major source. Income from Premiership Rugby Ltd. of £129,154 to deliver their national programme initiatives along with additional income from the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme grant of £2,996 and other income for programmes and other donations of £6,360.

Unrestricted income decreased from £513,626 to £401,344. This is made up of decreased charitable donations received. These are primarily made up of a significant contribution from an individual donor to support the development of the Foundation and the "50% Ticket Forwarding" money received from Harlequin FC.

Included in unrestricted grant income is government grants in relation to the furlough scheme amounting to £49,914.94.

The total resources expended were £605,466 compared to £669,149 in the previous period, the decrease due mainly to the coaching costs of delivering PRL programmes and METTLE.

As a result, the charity carried forward healthy reserves of £482,875 at the reporting date, of which £41,044 were restricted and £441,831 unrestricted.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to have enough funds available to meet all ongoing responsibilities (programmes and partnerships that the charity has committed to) and operating costs for six months.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees have considered the major risks to which the charity is exposed and have reviewed those risks and established systems and procedures to manage those risks.

The principal risks which have been identified are recorded and actively monitored in the risk register are: Governance - lack of clear strategy, skills on the Board, organisational structure, and reporting processes.

- External factors poor public perception, changes with funders and government policy.
- Regulatory compliance with legislation, reporting requirements and legal/HR issues.
- Financial inaccurate or insufficient information, inadequate reserves and/or cashflow and dependency on limited income sources.
- Operational safeguarding, Covid-19, staff recruitment and retention.

Future plans

Over the course of the next 12 months The Harlequins Foundation will:

- Adapt our delivery to meet the needs of the community as we navigate COVID-19.
- Reimagine our three-year delivery plan.
- Use the Sports Value Bank to measure impact.
- Continue to diversify our income streams.
- Identify functions that will support the Foundation's growth and employ high quality people.
- Ensure staff use the Skills Builder framework when delivering programmes.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a company, limited by guarantee by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The Charity is an incorporated charity, registered with the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales (1161838) and a company incorporated in England (0929973). The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a company, limited by guarantee by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. The Charity is limited by Guarantee to a maximum of £1 contribution per member. At the year end date there were five (2019: five) members. Its principle objectives are; to advance education; to relieve need in individuals arising from their youth, age, gender, infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances; and to develop the capacity and skills of the members of the communities that are socially and/or economically disadvantaged. The registered office is; The Twickenham Stoop Stadium, Langhorn Drive, Twickenham, Middlesex, TW2 7SX.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost conversion.

The Financial Statements have been prepared in Sterling. This is the Charity's functional and presentation currency.

Monetary amounts in these Financial Statements are rounded to the nearest £. There are a few rounded differences which cannot be eliminated.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue and accordingly the Financial Statements have been drawn up on a going concern basis.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations Receivable

Donations are recognised in the SOFA when conditions for receipt have been complied with.

Government Grants

Grants relating to revenue are recognised in income on a systematic basis over the periods in which the entity recognises the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate. Grants that become receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the entity with no future related costs are recognised in income in the period in which it becomes receivable.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Donations Payable

Donations payable are recognised when they are approved by the Trustees and the recipient of the donation has been informed of the amount paid. Any donations where the recipient has not been informed are noted as a contingent liability.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term deposits with a withdrawal notice period of no more than 90 days.

Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities that qualify as basic financial instruments which are recognised at transaction cost and subsequently carried forward at amortised cost.

3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the view of the Trustees in applying the accounting policies, no judgements were required that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements nor do any estimates or assumptions made carry a significant risk of material adjustment in the next financial year.

PRL Programmes are aimed at increasing participation in rugby and those that use rugby for education.

METTLE projects are aimed at building and protecting the mental resilience of players by raising awareness of, providing support for and education and deliver school programmes to young people in local boroughs and schools promoting mental health and supporting its challenges.

Hitz is a programme that uses the core values of rugby, alongside other sporting and extracurricular opportunities to increase young people's resilience, self-confidence and long-term employability.

Move Like a Pro is a programme designed by Premiership Rugby's professional rugby coaches for people who aren't currently particularly active, inspiring a legacy of long-term lifestyle change across the rugby fan community.

Tackling Health is an interactive programme for children aged seven - eight, which takes a holistic approach to teaching children about their own health, wellbeing and about leading a healthy lifestyle with a rugby focus.

Seb Fund was a specific fundraising fund set up in the memory of Harlequins player Sebastien Adeniran-Olule.

Switch is a multi-tiered programme aimed at encouraging girls to get involved in the sport.

The other funds have specific restrictions and will be used for the purpose received.

Transfers between funds

The Charity has used unrestricted funds to support the excess costs of £5,889 (2019: £2,695) on two of the restricted funds.

Included in the bought forward balance of Unrestricted funds was £83,588 in relation to wages for Project Rugby which had been incorrectly allocated to Unrestricted fund. of £83,588. A transfer has been made to correct this.

17. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

During the year the Harlequin Football Club Limited (The Club), a former Trustee of the Charity, paid for goods and services and collected monies on behalf of the Charity totalling net expenditure of £144,491 (2019: £54,901). The balance due to the Club, included in other creditors at the year end, was £259,882 (2019: £115,391). The balance is unsecured, repayable on demand and bears no interest.

The Club provides facilities and services to The Foundation for which no charge is made. The level of these costs cannot be reliably estimated by The Foundation.
