DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements of London Stock Exchange Group (Services) Limited (the 'Company') for the year ended 31 December 2022.

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

London Stock Exchange Group (Services) Limited operates as an investment holding company and its key objective is the monitoring and review of its investments.

The Company's loss after tax for the year ended 31 December 2022 was £2,719.4k (2021: £803.0k). This is mainly driven by finance expense charged on amounts due from the parent.

Following a detailed review of the investments, it has been deemed that the carrying value of £24,324.1k (2021: £24,324.1k) is appropriate as at 31 December 2022 with no factors to indicate impairment. Due to the nature of the business, the directors have concluded that there are no other relevant KPIs.

The Company is part of London Stock Exchange Group plc ('LSEG', the 'parent', the 'group').

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Company is expected to continue to operate as an investment holding company.

EMPLOYEES

The Company has no employees (2021: nil).

WORKFORCE ENGAGEMENT

As the principal activity of the Company is to act as an investment holding company, during 2022 the Company had no employees. Its subsidiary however, LSEG Employment Services Limited, had a workforce of over 250 employees during the financial year. The Company's other subsidiaries being LSEG Business Services Limited, LSEG Business Services Colombo (Private) Limited and LSEG Business Services RM S.R.L., also had employees during the same financial year.

Details on LSEG Employment Services Limited workforce engagement activities can be found on page 3 of its report and financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2022.

Engagement with our workforce includes formal and informal meetings, an annual engagement survey and town hall meetings. The Board reviewed the Company's culture dashboard during the year. The dashboard tracks metrics around: recruitment and onboarding, performance and development, talent and mobility, diversity and inclusion and leavers, allowing the Board to measure and assess culture and track progress over time. The Board also received the results of the annual "Have your say survey". The survey enables employees to share their views on what it is like to work for the Company, and it provides management and the Board with insight into employees' views on a number of topics as well as a way to track engagement within the organisation.

Much of this activity is supported by Group led mechanisms. For details on the some of the engagement that takes place with the Company's workforce at a Group level, please see the London Stock Exchange Group plc Annual Report for the financial period ended 31 December 2022.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

London Stock Exchange Group plc (LSEG, the Group) operates group wide risk management procedures which bring greater judgement to decision making as this allows management to make better, more informed and more consistent decisions based on a clear understanding of the risks involved.

LSEG has adopted a group wide risk management system that provides ongoing formal assurance that all subsidiary companies are appropriately controlling all of the risks to which they are exposed, ensuring that internal controls operate efficiently and effectively.

The Company is subject to a variety of foreseeable and unforeseeable risks and uncertainties which may have an impact on the Company's ability to execute its strategy and deliver its expected performance. The identification, assessment and management of these risks are central to the Company's operating framework. The Company's risk control structure is based on the 'three lines of defence' model:

- The First line (Management) is responsible and accountable for identifying, assessing and managing risk.
- The Second line (Risk Management and Compliance), is responsible for defining the risk management
 process and policy framework and providing challenge to the first line on Risk Management activities
 assessing risks and reporting to the Group Board Committees on risk exposure.
- The Third line (Internal Audit) provides independent assurance to the Board and other key stakeholders
 over the effectiveness of the systems of controls and the Risk Management Framework.

The Company's principal risks are to the value of its investments in subsidiaries and loans due from subsidiaries and arise from the activities of those companies, these include the continuing changing regulatory and macro-economic environments and increasing security threats (both physical and cyber). The risks associated with the Company's subsidiaries are disclosed in full in the financial statements of those companies.

DIVIDENDS

No dividends were paid during the year. (2021: nil).

Under company law, the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and of the profit or loss of the Company for that period.

In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to:

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including FRS 101, have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The directors are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the Company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

GOING CONCERN

The Directors have reviewed the Company's forecasts and projections, taking into account reasonably possible changes in trading performance, which show that the Company has sufficient financial resources. On the basis of this review, and after making due enquiries, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

LSEG has formally confirmed it will continue to provide financial support for the ongoing operations of the Company for the 12 months following the date of this annual report and that it does not intend to call amounts outstanding under the loan agreement within that period, so long as the Company remains a part of the group. Accordingly, the Company continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements.

Opinion

1. Basis of Preparation and Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 101, Reduced Disclosure Framework ('FRS 101') and the Companies Act 2006 (the 'Act'). FRS 101 sets out a reduced disclosure framework for a 'qualifying entity' as defined in the standard which addresses the financial reporting requirements and disclosure exemptions in the individual financial statements of qualifying entities that otherwise apply the recognition, measurement and disclosure requirements of UK-adopted international accounting standards.

The Company is a qualifying entity for the purposes of FRS 101. Note 14 gives details of the Company's ultimate parent and from where its consolidated financial statements prepared in accordance with IFRS may be obtained.

The following disclosure exemptions under FRS 101 have been considered and applied where deemed to be applicable:

- IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows and related notes;
- reduced IFRS 2 disclosure for share-based payment arrangements in a subsidiary's financial statements;
- IAS 8 the listing of new or revised standards that have not been adopted (and information about their likely impact) may be omitted;
- reduced IAS 36 disclosure of impairment reviews;
- reduced IFRS 3 disclosure for business combinations during and after the period;
- reduced IFRS 5 disclosure for discounted operations;
- reduced IFRS 7 disclosure for financial instruments;
- reduced IFRS 13 disclosure relating to fair value measurement;
- IAS 24 related party disclosures for intra-group transactions and disclosure of key management compensation;
- IAS 1 the requirement to present comparatives in roll-forward reconciliations for movements on share capital, property plant and equipment, intangible assets and investment property;
- reduced IAS 1.134-1.136 disclosure on capital management;
- reduced disclosure for IFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers; and
- reduced disclosure for IFRS 16 Leases.

These financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of assets and liabilities held at fair value.

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies.

These financial statements contain information about London Stock Exchange Group (Services) Limited as an individual company and do not contain consolidated financial information as the parent of a group. The Company has taken the exemption from producing consolidated financial statements afforded by section 400 of the Companies Act 2006 because it is a wholly owned subsidiary of London Stock Exchange Group plc which prepares consolidated financial statements which are publicly available.

The Company is a private limited company, limited by shares incorporated and domiciled in England and Wales. The address of its registered office is 10 Paternoster Square, London, EC4M 7LS.

Going concern

Accounting Policies

Income Statement

Foreign currencies

These financial statements are presented in Pounds Sterling, which is the Company's presentation and functional currency.

Foreign currency transactions are converted into the functional currency of the reporting entity using the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Foreign exchange gains or losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the income statement.

Finance income and expense

Finance income and expense comprise interest earned on cash deposited with financial counterparties and interest paid on borrowings which reflect the agreed market-based or contractual rate for each transaction undertaken during the period and calculated using the effective interest rate method. In conditions where negative interest rates apply, the Company recognises interest paid on cash deposits as an expense and interest received on liabilities as income.

Current and deferred taxation

Income tax on the loss for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognised in the income statement except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date in the country where the Company operates and generates taxable income and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax is provided in full, using the liability method, on temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Deferred tax is not recognised if it arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction (other than a business combination) that affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at that time. Deferred income tax is determined using tax rates (and laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date and are expected to apply

when the deferred tax asset or liability is settled. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when the deferred income taxes assets and liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority.

Balance Sheet

Investment in subsidiary undertakings

Subsidiaries are all entities (including structured entities) over which the Company has control. The Company controls an entity when the Company is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity.

Investments in subsidiaries are stated in the Company's financial statements at cost less impairment, if any. On disposal, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the investment's carrying amount is included in the income statement. Loans to subsidiaries which are determined as capital contributions are recorded as investments in subsidiary undertakings.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are initially recognised at fair value on the date of recognition. The Company classifies its financial instruments as amortised cost. The classification depends on the Company's business model for managing its financial instruments and whether the cash flows generated are 'solely payments of principal and interest' (SPPI).

- a) Financial assets at amortised cost are financial assets that are held in order to collect the contractual cash flows and the contractual terms give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest. This includes cash and cash equivalents and trade and other receivables.
 - After initial recognition these assets are measured at amortised cost. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition is recognised directly in the income statement and presented in other income or operating expenses together with foreign exchange gains and losses.
- b) Financial liabilities at amortised cost are all financial liabilities that are not included within financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL). This comprises the Company's trade and other payables.

Impairment

The Company adopts a forward-looking approach to estimate impairment losses on financial assets. An expected credit loss (ECL) is calculated based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due and the expected cash flows. The difference is discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate and recognised as an allowance against the original value of the asset.

a) Financial assets at amortised cost - the ECL for trade receivables and contract assets is calculated using IFRS 9's simplified approach using lifetime ECL. The allowance is based on the Company's historic experience of collection rates, adjusted for forward looking factors specific to each counterparty and the economic environment at large to create an expected loss matrix. If there is a significant increase

in credit risk, then a lifetime ECL will be calculated. A significant increase in credit risk is considered to have occurred when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the balance sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Trade and other receivables

Other receivables include amounts due from companies within the group on loans and interest on these loans. Other receivables are also recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for ECL. Interest is charged at variable rates as stated within the relevant group loan agreement as set out by management. These loans are repayable either on demand or on dates stipulated within the relevant group loan agreement.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank, short-term deposits and other instruments and structures that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other payables

Other payables relate to loans from other companies within the group. Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Trade and other payables are classified as 'trade and other payables' within current liabilities, if payment is due within 1 year or less (or in the normal operating cycle of the business if longer). If not, they are presented as 'other non-current payables' within non-current liabilities.

Trade and other payables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Share capital

The share capital of the Company consists of only 1 class of ordinary shares and these are classified as equity.

Dividend distributions

Dividend distributions to the Company's equity holders are recognised as a liability in the financial statements in the period in which the dividends are approved by the Company's shareholder.

Judgements and estimates are regularly evaluated based on historical experience, current circumstances and expectations of future events. The significant judgements and estimates for the current year are as follows:

Valuation of investment in subsidiary undertakings: for the purpose of impairment assessment, this is
determined based on forecast cashflows and an appropriate discount rate. The basis of such values cannot be
precise and is subject to market variations in both cases.
