Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 5 April 2019.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

To advance education for the public benefit by the promotion of the arts, in particular but not exclusively opera, and for such other charitable purposes as the company may from time to time decide.

Vision

Operasonic is passionate about opera as an artform that connects with the potential and creativity of young people in a direct and visceral way.

Operasonic believes young people can own opera, as audiences, as creators, as leaders. Yound people need contemporary opera created on their own terms and in their communities, venues, schools, and online spaces. The opera of the future wil be driven by them.

Mission

Our mission is to inspire young minds, broaden horizons and launch fresh ideas through opera. In order to fulfil our vision and mission, Operasonic creates opportunities for young people to explore, create and experience opera: particularly projects focusing on opera writing; opera productions created specifically to open up the world for different age groups.

Values

We keep participation at the heart of everything we do.

Public benefit

Operasonic has continued to provide access to the arts for young people, both in the form of opera performances created especially for family audiences and through workshop activity working directly with young people. We focus on our beneficiaries gaining new creative experiences and opera skills, as well as developing social and emotional skills including focus, attnetion control, empathy, emotional expression, social problem-solving, critical thinking and confidence.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Achievements and Performance

Operasonic has had a successful first three years of operation which have included delivering a range of different projects, forging partnerships, building a reputation, and being shortlisted for a major national award in its field. This year trustees came together to put a new business plan in place — Operasonic 2018 — 2023 Embedding and Establishing. This plan lays out the ambition for the next five years.

Operasonic plans to develop a stable and sustainable organisational structure, build a core staff team and grow reserves. This base will enable the charity to collaborate with more young people across Newport and tour work to communities beyond Newport. The development of key partnerships, such as with The Riverfront Theatre and Artis Community, will also help to grow the reach of the charity. By 2023 Operasonic plans to have a new large-scale participatory project in development led by young artists and local young participants.

In order to achieve our vision and mission, the following aims have been set for Operasonic's work:

- 1. To create opportunities for meaningful engagement with young people in Newport
- 2. To take opera out to other communities of young people
- 3. To lead the way for opera participation practice in the UK
- 4. To create a stable and sustainable organization

2018 2019 Activities

This year Operasonic had a presence at a number of key festivals, including Maindee Festival and Art on the Hill in Newport, and Tete a Tete Festival in London. We also worked with a range of schools, including Clytha Primary and Lliswerry High School for the third year running. The Riverfront Theatre and Maindee Library continue to be a key collaborators and supporters of our work.

Key Operasonic projects delivered this year were:

- Deeds Not Words a songwriting project with secondary school performing arts pupils exploring protest, created in collaboration with Welsh National Opera
- Gingerbread a primary school opera-writing project inspired by Hansel and Gretel, in collaboration with Iford Arts
- Mabinogion Chwedl â Chân an opera-writing project exploring stories from the Mabinogion
- Nonsensus Opera an opera inspired by a community project in Maindee, created in collaboration with artist Steven Jones
- Echoes of Swimming a digital commission exploring memories of Stow Hill Baths presented as part of Art on the Hill
- Songwriting sessions with the Bigger Picture Centre in Pillgwennlly
- Opera Creators 2018 opera-writing and family choir project
- Street Detectives a Lead Creative Schools project exploring geography through opera with Year 2 at Ysgol Y Ddraig
- Initial development of the Vehicles project working with Oxford University

Operasonic has continued to develop and grow our own projects. *Opera Creators* built on the Maindee Family Choir project run as part of Newport Legends. It offered young people the chance to create an opera working with artists. Participants were then invited back and asked to bring their adults in order to create a family choir. The choir performed the final opera – *Tales of the Ocean* - at the Maindee Festival.

The development of *Vehicles*, a new opera of 6 – 12 year olds has begun working with composer Martyn Harry, Professor of Music at Oxford University. Funding bids have been developed to support the further development of both *Nightmare Scenario* and *Newport Legends*.

Operasonic has benefited from the ACW Creative Learning programme this year and was awarded funding from the Creative Collaborations fund to work with 3 schools to explore Welsh language and Cwricwlwm Cymreig, and was also selected as practitioner for a Lead Creative Schools project for Ysgol y Ddraig in Llantwit Major.

Operasonic has continued to work in partnership this year. Our third partnership with Iford Arts saw us lead workshops for Gingerbread, a project to accompany their production of *Hansel and Gretel* which reached 6 schools in the South West. A rich partnership with WNO led to the *Deeds Not Words* project which enabled pupils from John Frost School to explore political protest through song. The final performance took place at the Riverfront Theatre alongside the WNO production *Rhondda Rips It Up* in June 2018. Pupils also took the performance to the Senedd in Cardiff Bay, performing for an audience of AMs.

Trustees' Report

We have also received commissions from a range of local partners to deliver creative projects, including commissions from the Fusion project in Newport to work with Bigger Picture and from Maindee Library to adapt Steven Jones's *Nonsensus* project into an opera. This is extremely encouraging, as it shows the beginning of an authentic dialogue with the community and is evidence that other organisations are considering opera as a valid tool for community engagement.

Operasonic has been further expanding its national and international links in order to raise awareness of our work and benchmark our practice. As a member of RESEO (Opera and dance education network for Europe), Operasonic attended the Dusseldorf and Bern Conferences, and Rhian was elected Chair of the RESEO Steering Committee in March 2018. Rhian also attended the Youth Arts Network Cymru Casgliad in March 2018 and ran an Operasonic workshop for participants. This year Rhian spoke at the Women in Opera Conference in June 2018 and the Rose Bruford Opera Conference in October 2018, spreading about Operasonic's practice alongside other sector stakeholders.

Financial Review

Income of £31,144 (previous year: £18,793) funded an operating surplus/(deficit) of £364 (previous year: £51,828).

Operasonic's reserves (unrestricted funds) stood at £1,600 and (restricted funds) £5,410 at the year-end. It is one of our key aims going forward to get reserves in place to cover any shortfall of funding and ensure that delivery can continue in this eventuality for 2 months. We aim to hold at least £3000 and no more than £15,000.

Fundraising has been successful this year and has been based around the Mabinogion Creative Collaborations Project and Lead Creative Schools delivery. Operasonic is extremely grateful to the following partners and funders for funding this year:

Future Plans

In the next year, we plan to launch our first touring opera – Vehicles – an operatic space voyage through the history of human transport for 6 - 12 year olds. We will also develop a residency project around our production Nightmare Scenario, using the production as a provocation for a dialogue with a community.

Trustees' Report

Summer 2019 will see the final performance of the three mini-Mabinogion operas which are being created as part of our Mabinogion Creative Collaborations project. We also plan to deliver Opera Creators again in 2019, working with the Riverfront to deliver the final opera performance at Big Splash Festival.

We will be embarking on a new partnership with Carnegie Hall in New York, as we become a Lullaby partner and pilot the songwriting project aimed at new parents in RCT with the support of Artis Community.

Finally, we will be created a choir working with Maindee Primary and Lliswerry High School which will bring Gypsy Roma Traveller families and community members to sing together, and also working with LINC Cymru Housing Association to celebrate the Lysaght Institute in Lliswerry through song and performance.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

Operasonic Cyf was formed as a company limited by guarantee on 26th November 2014 and a registered charity on 18th March 2016.

The charity is also known as Operasonic.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The charity is led by a board of trustees / directors, who are recruited through a public recruitment process. All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

There were no expenses reclaimed by trustees during the year.

New trustees appointed by the Board of Trustees at meetings throughout the year, based on selection against a regularly updated skills audit.

Operasonic has a number of policies in place to support the activities of the charity which are reviewed regularly by the Board of Trustees:

- Equal Opportunities Policy
- General Data Protection Policy and Privacy Notice

Operasonic employs a freelance Creative Director and a range of freelance artists who are project based. Disclosure and Barring checks are carried out for all staff members before they commence employment.

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

Operasonic Cyf meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 5 April 2019

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £600.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 5 April 2019

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the charity will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Financial instruments

Classification

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the charity after deducting all of its liabilities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 5 April 2019

Recognition and measurement

All financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at transaction price (including transaction costs), except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value (which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs), unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction. If an arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, the financial asset or financial liability is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are only offset in the statement of financial position when, and only when there exists a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and the charity intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets are derecognised when and only when a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or are settled, b) the charity transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, or c) the charity, despite having retained some, but not all, significant risks and rewards of ownership, has transferred control of the asset to another party.

Financial liabilities are derecognised only when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Fair value measurement

The best evidence of fair value is a quoted price for an identical asset in an active market. When quoted prices are unavailable, the price of a recent transaction for an identical asset provides evidence of fair value as long as there has not been a significant change in economic circumstances or a significant lapse of time since the transaction took place. If the market is not active and recent transactions of an identical asset on their own are not a good estimate of fair value, the fair value is estimated by using a valuation technique.
