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Directors' Report For the Year Ended 31 May 2020

The Directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 May 2020.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the business is the generation and sale of electricity, gas and heat.

Business review

Turnover decreased 4.7% to average £357,226 per month (2019: £374,762 per month). This was largely driven by increased downtime and the removal of the Economizer, a piece of machinery that was eligible for the Renewable Heat Incentive tariff.

Due to reduced maintenance costs, earnings before interest, tax and depreciation (EBITDA) increased to £612,457 (2019: £435,517).

The Directors expect the Company's performance to improve in future years.

Subsequent to the year end, on 10 August 2020, C Tanner was appointed Director of the Company.

Going concern

The Directors recognise that the Company has a net current liability position of £1,744,200 as at 31 May 2020. This is as a result of the parent company loan, totalling £2,103,778, and accrued interest on this loan, totalling £1,221,037, which, as at 31 May 2020, were repayable on 31 July 2020. Subsequent to the year end, the loan agreement was extended and the loan and all accrued interest became repayable on 31 July 2023 (see Note 25). In the period between the original repayment date and the agreement amendment, the parent company, Warren Power Limited, did not charge any penalties or any additional interest on overdue amounts.

On the basis that the parent company loan agreement has been extended, and having made other appropriate enquiries including the preparation of forecasts for a period of at least 12 months, the Directors are satisfied that the Company has adequate resources to continue trading for the foreseeable future.

In addition to this, the Directors also consider it necessary to acknowledge the uncertainty created by the current global COVID-19 pandemic. Risks that could impact Warren Energy Limited as a company operating in the electricity, gas and heat industry include a potential prolonged fall in export prices, potential staff illnesses preventing the running of the plant, and possible disruption to the supply chain leading to a shortage in feedstocks and other necessary inputs which may limit the production capacity of the plant. The Company has not been materially impacted by any of these potential risks thus far throughout the pandemic, and the Directors do not expect this to change, and therefore believe it is appropriate to continue preparing the accounts on a going concern basis.

Post balance sheet events

On 23 July 2020, the Company received funding of £27,640 from JLEN Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited.

On 3 September 2020, the Company received funding of £85,732 from JLEN Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited.

Both receipts are subject to interest at a rate of 7.5% per annum, and were drawn to pay for capital expenditure on value enhancing items.

On 13 May 2021, the repayment date for the loan from Warren Power Limited was amended to 31 July 2023. All other loan terms remain unchanged. The interest accruing on the loan is also payable on the repayment date of 31 July 2023.

Small companies note

In preparing this report, the Directors have taken advantage of the small companies exemptions provided by section 415A of the Companies Act 2006.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 May 2020

1. General information

Warren Energy Limited is a limited liability company incorporated in England and Wales under the Companies Act. The registered office is 10-12 Frederick Sanger Road, Guildford, Surrey, GU2 7YD. The principal activity of the Company is set out in the Directors' Report.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

2.2 Going concern

The Directors recognise that the Company has a net current liability position of £1,744,200 as at 31 May 2020. This is as a result of the parent company loan, totalling £2,103,778, and accrued interest on this loan, totalling £1,221,037, which, as at 31 May 2020, were repayable on 31 July 2020. Subsequent to the year end, the loan agreement was extended and the loan and all accrued interest became repayable on 31 July 2023 (see Note 25). 2.3 Turnover

Turnover comprises revenue recognised by the Company in respect of the generation of electricity, gas and heat. Turnover is recognised on a monthly basis as output is transferred.

2.4 Other operating income

Other operating income comprises income from activities falling outside of that defined in 'Turnover' (see Note 2.3) e.g. ad hoc sales of excess feedstock.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.5 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Land is not depreciated. Depreciation on other assets is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

2.6 Valuation of investments

Investments in unlisted Company shares, whose market value can be reliably determined, are remeasured to market value at each balance sheet date. Gains and losses on remeasurement are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings for the year.

2.7 Stocks

Stocks represent costs of energy crops for use as a feedstock in biogas generation, and spare parts and consumables held for use on site. All stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

2.8 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

2.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.10 Financial instruments

With the exception of immaterial investments in unlisted company shares, the Company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade debtors and creditors, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Investments in non-convertible preference shares and in non-puttable ordinary and preference shares are measured at fair value with changes recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the balance sheet date.

2.11 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.12 Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

The Company's functional and presentational currency is GBP.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the spot exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

At each period end foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. Non-monetary items measured at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction and non-monetary items measured at fair value are measured using the exchange rate when fair value was determined.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

2.13 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

2.14 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income using the effective interest method.

2.15 Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in the year in which they are incurred.

2.16 Taxation

Tax is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Balance Sheet date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

3. Judgments in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements, the directors have made the following judgement:

- Determine the provision for feedstock lost whilst being stored in clamps. This provision is recognised based on historic losses of relevant crops and assumes that losses will occur in the following stages - 60% losses initially, as it is expected that the majority of losses will occur during clamping, then a further 5% loss each month for the following 8 months.

Other key sources of estimation uncertainty

- Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives. The actual lives of the assets may vary depending on a number of factors.

25. Post balance sheet events

On 22 July 2020, the Company received funding of £27,640 from JLEN Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited.

On 2 September 2020, the Company received funding of £85,732 from JLEN Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited.

Both receipts are subject to interest at a rate of 7.5% per annum, and were drawn to pay for capital expenditure on value enhancing items.

On 13 May 2021, a loan agreement amendment was signed which changed the repayment date for the loan from Warren Power Limited from 31 July 2020 to 31 July 2023. All other loan terms remain unchanged. The interest accruing on the loan is also payable on the repayment date of 31 July 2023.

26. Controlling party

The company is wholly owned by Warren Power Limited, a company registered in England and Wales (company number 09391505). Warren Power Limited's registered office is 10-12 Frederick Sanger Road, Guildford, Surrey, United Kingdom, GU2 7YD.
