The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2021.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was that of publishing.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The directors continually monitor the trading and operational risks facing the company and implement processes and procedures necessary to maintain the company's performance. The principal risks and uncertainties facing the company are as follows:

- The risk of customers not renewing their subscriptions or purchasing other services. Ongoing uncertainties facing the UK such as political and economic uncertainties and inflation may impact customer confidence and increase the risk of subscribers not renewing their subscriptions or purchasing other services.
- Maintaining the high calibre and knowledgeable team of contributors and editors. This is being managed through a comprehensive training programme and ensuring an optimal employment environment.

Results and Dividends

The loss for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to £(127,360) (2020 - £(1,203,487)).

The primary measures used to monitor and assess performance in the year are turnover and profitability which are detailed in the profit and loss account. The company's turnover increased by 62% during the year. The company also invested in building it's file size and number of subscribers which resulted in the company generating a profit before depreciation and amortisation of £68,068 (2020 -£1,017,163).

The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Southbank Investment Research Limited ('the company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2021 which comprise the Profit and Loss Account, the Balance Sheet, the Reconciliation of Shareholders' Funds and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable Law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A (Small Entities).

In our opinion, when reporting in accordance with a fair presentation framework the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs as at 31 December 2021 and of its loss for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and the Provisions Available for Audits of Small Entities, in the circumstances set out in Note 4 to the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Material uncertainty related to going concern

In forming our opinion on the financial statements, which is not modified we have considered the adequacy of the disclosure made in note 3 to the financial statements concerning the potential impact on the company's ability to continue as a going concern. The company incurred a net loss of £127,360 during the year and liabilities exceed assets by £4,722,649 at 31 December 2021. These conditions along with the other matters explained in note 3 to the financial statements indicate the existence of a material uncertainty which may cast significant doubt about the company's ability to continue as a going concern. The financial statements do not include the adjustments that would result if the company was unable to continue as a going concern.

Other Information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report other than the financial statements and our Auditor's Report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Southbank Investment Research Limited is a company limited by shares incorporated in the United Kingdom. The registered office of the company is Crowne House, 2nd Floor, 56/58 Southwark Street, London SE1 1UN which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report. The financial statements have been presented in Pound Sterling (£) which is also the functional currency of the company. The company's registration number is 09539630.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2021 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2006.

The company has availed of the exemption under FRS 102 Section 1A of the requirement to present a Cash Flow Statement because the company is classified as a small company.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

Turnover

Turnover represents the amount derived from the company's principal activity of publishing and after the deduction of refunds and value added tax.

Subscription income, after adjusting for refunds, is recognised on the basis of the sales value of the publications delivered in relation to the total sales value of all items covered by the subscription.

Income arising from lifetime subscriptions are recongised over a period of ten years.

Deferred Income

Deferred income relates to amounts received from customers for subscriptions to be fulfilled, generally recognised under the stage of completion method. Deferred income is transferred to revenue upon delivery of subscribed publications in proportion to the total number of publications subscribed for by the customer.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment Leasehold Improvements 15% Straight line

- 10% Straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Repairs, maintenance and minor inspection costs are expensed as incurred.

Tangible fixed assets are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected. On disposal the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying value is recognised in the profit and loss account.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the Balance Sheet bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs relating to the acquisition of assets are capitalised at the appropriate rate by adding them to the cost of assets being acquired. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on the assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation. All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Employee benefits

The company provides a range of benefits to employees, including annual bonus arrangements, paid holiday arrangements and defined contribution pension plans.

(i) Short term benefits

Short term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits, are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is received.

(ii) Defined contribution pension plans

The Company operates a defined contribution plan. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a seperate fund. Under defined contribution plans, the company has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. Pension costs are recognized as an expense in the period in which the contribution becomes payable.

Taxation and deferred taxation

Current tax represents the amount expected to be paid or recovered in respect of taxable profits for the financial year and is calculated using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted at the Balance Sheet date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future, or a right to pay less tax in the future. Timing differences are temporary differences between the company's taxable profits and its results as stated in the financial statements.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are anticipated to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the Balance Sheet date.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Profit and Loss Account.

Customer Lists

Customer Lists are valued at cost less accumulated amortisation.

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost in equal annual instalments over their estimated useful life of 3 years.

The carrying values of customer lists are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Intangible assets are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected. On disposal, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial Instruments

Basic financial instruments

Basic financial instruments are initially measured at the transaction price, including transaction costs, and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using an effective interest method. Basic financial instruments include trade and other debtors and cash and cash equivalents.

Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those held at fair value, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each reporting end date. Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows have been affected. If an asset is impaired, the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the expected cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. Any impairment losses are recognised in the Profit and Loss account. If there is a decrease in the impairment loss arising from an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the impairment is reversed. The reversal is such that the current carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been, had the impairment not previously been recognised. The impairment reversal is recognised in the Profit and Loss account.

De-recogniton of financial assets

Financial assets are derecognised only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or are settled, or when Southbank Investment Research Limited transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, or if some significant risks and rewards of ownership are retained but control of the asset has transferred to another party that is able to sell the asset in its entirety to an unrelated third party.

Basic Financial Liabilities

Basic financial liabilities are initially recognised at the transaction price, including transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitute a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities include trade creditors and other payables.

De-recognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligations of Southbank Investment Research Limited specified in the contract are discharged, cancelled or expire.

Ordinary share capital

The ordinary share capital of the company is presented as equity.

3. GOING CONCERN

The company incurred a net loss of £127,360 during the year ended 31 December 2021 and, at that date, the company's total liabilities exceed the total assets by £4,722,649.

Having made due enquiries and considering the uncertainties described above, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has and will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. However this is dependent on the company continuing to increase its income and return to profitability. The company has implemented a new business plan which saw it produce a profit of £68,068 before amortisation in 2021 and the directors are confident that this improvement will continue. The directors note that the company does not rely on any third party support for financing and it has significant cash resources at 31 December 2021.

For this reason, the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. However the directors note that some of the circumstances outlined above are not entirely within their control, and that they therefore indicate a material uncertainty which may cast doubt over the company's ability to continue as a going concern.

Should the going concern basis on which the financial statements have been prepared prove to be inappropriate, adjustments are likely to have to be made to the net assets shown in these financial statements to reduce assets to their more immediately recoverable amounts and to reclassify creditors due after more than one year to current liabilities, and to provide for further liabilities that may arise.

4. PROVISIONS AVAILABLE FOR AUDITS OF SMALL ENTITIES

In common with many other businesses of our size and nature, we use our auditors to prepare and submit tax returns to Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs.

5. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The directors considers the accounting estimates and assumptions below to be its critical accounting judgements and estimates:

Recognition of revenues from lifetime subscriptions

The company offers customers a lifetime subscription to certain publications it publishes for an upfront fee. This fee is initially recorded in deferred income in the balance sheet and is released to the profit and loss account in equal instalments over ten years. Judgement is required in determining the period over which this income is recognised in the profit and loss account. The directors believe ten years is a fair reflection of the period over which it will be required to provide publications to customers who have purchased a lifetime subscription. This is largely based on the Agora group's experience of such subscriptions to its financial publications in other jurisdictions. The directors regularly review the expected pattern of consumption of lifetime subscriptions. Changes in such patterns which give rise to a revision of the expected consumption period can have a significant impact on revenues recognised for the period.

Recognition of deferred tax asset

The recognition of deferred income tax assets is based upon whether it is probable that sufficient and suitable taxable profits will be available in the future against which the reversal of temporary differences and tax losses carried forward can be utilised. Where the temporary differences are related to losses, the availability of the losses to offset against projected taxable profits is also considered. The company has recognised a deferred income tax asset of £251,963 at 31 December 2021 (2020: £251,963). Recognition involves judgement regarding future financial performance of the company and as a result there is no absolute assurance the assets recognised will be realised.

6. EMPLOYEES

The average monthly number of employees, including directors, during the financial year was 37, (2020 - 34).
