Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was formed on 3 Sept 2015. It is governed by a memorandum and articles of association. The articles were amended by special resolution on 15 March 2016. The liability of the members in the event of the company being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £10.

Method of recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees of the charity are also the directors for the purposes of company law and are appointed by the members at the AGM.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects

To act as a resource for young people from the age of 11 up to the age of 16 living in Leeds by providing advice and assistance and organising programmes of physical, educational and other activities as a means of:

- a) advancing in life and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals;
- b) advancing education;
- c) providing recreational and leisure time activity in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons.

The charity's main activities

Involve provides a variety of education programmes to vulnerable young people living in Leeds. The programmes are both effective and creative, positively impacting their education achievement, their self-esteem and their future aspirations. Programmes have included KS3 education, KS4 enterprise, work experience, afterschool clubs, one to one mentoring, bicycle refurbishment, trips, educational visits and residentials. All the activities have the joint aim of helping young people learn, achieve and realise their potential.

Public benefit statement

In setting our objectives and planning our activities our trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular the advancement of education and support programmes to vulnerable young people living in Leeds.

Achievements and performance

Key Stage 3

Our work at KS3 is a core element of our work. In the 2015/16 academic year we supported 17 young people for 4144.5 hours all of who were struggling in mainstream school and additionally faced multiple disadvantages including but not limited to chaotic home lives, variety of levels and kinds of abuse at home or in their community, suffering from child sexual exploitation & grooming, looked after, bullied/the bullier, uncontrollable anger issues and physical aggression or family suffers from substance misuse leaving the young person unsupported and neglected.

The team have experienced and recorded positive social impact based on the 5 aims outlined in the initial proposal: building positive relationships, building confidence and working on the national curriculum, addressing behavioural needs, working with the family and working with the schools.

Additional to the 17 young people Involve has supported, we have also provided 8 volunteer and student placements. These placements have been very successful giving volunteers and students an excellent introduction to working in an alternative education environment.

- 1. In 2015/16 the attendance of KS3 young people referred to Involve was 85.1%
- 2. In 2015/16 88% of the young people improved by 2 or more National Curriculum (NC) sub-levels, and 12% improved by less than 2 NC levels.
- 3. In 2015/16 76% have seen step-change* improvement in their behaviour and engagement on the programme and 82% have given feedback in tutorials* that Involve has positively impacted their aspirations and plans for the future.
- 4. In 2015/16 100% of KS3 young people we supported have successful reintegrated into mainstream school or progressed on to further education, employment or training.

TA was a young person facing permanent exclusion from his school due to reaching his allotted amount of fixed term exclusions for the academic year. When we began working with him, he had issues with drug use, getting involved in petty-crime and anti-social behaviour, and was falling behind at school due to pressure from his peers and spending so much time in isolation.

Achievements and performance (continued)

When he started at involve, it was clear that TA did not lack ability, but he needed to hone his behaviour and build his confidence in order to succeed, filling in the gaps he had missed due to being isolated from mainstream lessons. In his time with us TA went up 5 national curriculum sublevels in English and Maths, received support from Platform Leeds (drugs awareness programme) and we negotiated a reintegration plan between his mum and school. 6 months later we received contact from his school to say that not only was he was keeping himself out of trouble, but that he was succeeding and back on track to succeed in his education.

Key Stage 4

Our iVenture, (and additional iSkills project) has had more limited success in 2015/16. We have experienced lower than usual referrals to the KS4 (14-16 provision) due to many of our referring schools creating their own inhouse 14-16 provision. The lower number of referrals has meant that we have been able to work more intensively with the smaller group.

The KS4 programme supported 5 young people for 562.5 hours in 2015/16. The referred young people were persistent non-attenders to their mainstream school, and in doing so had incredibly low national curriculum levels in English and Maths, low levels of interest in academic or practical study and were clearly on a path to be unemployed and disaffected at 16. Additionally, the young people had unsupportive families, issues of addiction, were in foster care, were persistent youth offenders and benefited from the Youth Offending Service and in many cases the mainstream referring school had given up all hope the young person re-engaging with education, and little chance of qualifications.

Additional to the 5 young people Involve has supported, we have also provided 2 volunteer and student placements. These placements have been very successful giving volunteers and students an excellent introduction to working in an alternative education environment.

- 1. In 2015/16 20% young people gained accreditation.
- 2. In 2015/16 the attendance of KS4 young people referred to Involve was 75%
- 3. 60% of the young people we supported at KS4 progressed onto education, employment or training.

SD was a 16 year old referred to us as he was no longer attending mainstream education and was struggling to find a work experience placement. SD was a child looked after and presented a number of issues that made it difficult for him to access a regular work experience placement. SD began on iSkills working half days at a local charity shop; steaming, pricing and selling second hand clothing in Hunslet. Due to his success at this he was soon offered an opportunity helping restore furniture in a warehouse and selling it on the shop floor. With our close supervision SD flourished and following the completion of his accreditation, he was able to find a more independent placement working full days at a local builders' merchants. SD achieved an attendance figure of over 95% and also received support with his English and Maths work while he was placed with us, better preparing him for the work place.

Wrap-Around

Wrap-Around has provided a wide range of programmes for young people afterschool in the South Leeds area. The youth workers have been working extremely hard engaging hard to reach young people through a variety of activities including: sports on the local multi-use games area, youth clubs at the Involve Learning Centre, working in partnership with other youth organisations to offer Summer activity camps, trips to the seaside, local climbing wall and laser quest.

- 1. Youth clubs and detached community work: In 2015/16 the detached youth work team have engaged 200 young people through their regular sports sessions, summer holiday activities and trips.
- 2. Group mentoring: In 2015/16 Involve has supported 35 young people through small group work on a Thursday and Friday with young people requiring Social Emotional Aspects of Learning Activities, and the creative offer of a monthly bike repair project at the Urban Bar.
- 3. One to one support for the most vulnerable: the mentoring team has support 17 young adults through the development of a football team, regular sports coaching and regular meetings to support those individuals to access further education, employment or training.

Financial review

The net income for the year was £74,958 on unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The charity's free reserves, excluding fixed assets, at the year end were £69,041.

The policy of the trustees is to hold between 3 and 6 months reserves.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees report and the financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and UK Accounting Standards.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

I report on the accounts of the charitable company for the period 3 September 2015 to 30 September 2016, which are set out on pages 7 to 11.

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. 1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Charities SORP (FRSSE)) the Companies Act 2006 and Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Expenditure and liabilities

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources.

Taxation

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition. Gifted assets are shown at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

Minibus: over 4 years

Fixtures and fittings: over the lifetime of the tenancy agreement held with Leeds Christian Community Trust.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. The costs of contributions are recognised in the year they are payable.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
