Company activities and impact

Education and Communities CIC focuses on the ethnic minority children, especially those with predicted of 5 and below in the core and help to build their confidence and improve their grades. We have children who were really underachieving in Mathematics, English, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. We chose those students who have been excluded from school and the ones at risk. Most of these children come from highly deprived area which become a hindrance as they have little or nothing to work on and some do not even have any computer to work with. We assess these children and put them into groups in order to build their confidence and motivate them which is based according to their individual needs. We have a total of 8 groups run mostly by volunteer teachers and mentors meeting fortnightly on-line and each group consist of a maximum of five in numbers. A learning programme has been designed for individual children to quickly build the gaps in their learning processes, coupled with the facts that the mentors and teachers work together so as to make the children aware that everyone is working for their good. Mentors meet regularly with the teachers and student to discuss improvements and ways forward. Through the help of our stake holders, we were able to provide 14 students with refurbished laptops. We set homework and children have access to their mentors 4 hours a day. Once the children are stable, they begin to make progress in their learning and their confidence level increases and start to engage and interact with each other. We teach and inspire them to set goals for themselves, with little targets which they meet, and we celebrate their achievements weekly. In 2023 we had 73% of our excluded children making grade 5. They are now in colleges studying for their A levels. We have 3 of our A level students of similar background in the various university as well. We, continue to make children know the value of education and developing them to their full potentials and hopefully we plan to increase our capacity by 25%. The community can see the positive difference and effect it is having on the children. Efforts have been made to help our senior citizen cyber friendly, three times a month we rent our local community hall in Greenwich where we intentionally have tea and teach the senior citizens the rudimentary of computer. Our workshop is titled "Computer is your friend", and we do not compromise with online safety procedures. We have our Senior citizens booking Uber, using their cards safely for payment as well. Education and Community CIC is still creating awareness for autism. This is ongoing in our communities. Workshops are held on this invisible disability and continue to signpost parents and carers to where to get help. We continue to build network groups. We continue to build network groups for parents to support themselves and to come together.

Consultation with stakeholders

The stakeholders are residents and visitors to the communities and meet regularly with the directors/trustees to discuss outcome and progress based on the business model earlier created to achieve the set goals of the company. We achieve maximum participation and always welcome new ideas to help in shaping and directing the course of the company. This year, was a bit challenging due to recession. We actively engaged with our stakeholders, who are our service users, parents, carers, senior citizens and the community in order to support the prime students, excluded ones and the community at large. It was also agreed that core subjects should be our focus (biology, chemistry, physics, maths and english). There was a huge support to help excluded students and also securing equipment for our students. We work with our Prime Students and the deprived in our communities. It was decided to get volunteers teachers to help our students. The method of teaching and the added support of mentors was agreed upon. All involved were in zoom meetings and agreement was reached. E safety was to be taught before the sessions. Dos and don't rules are displayed for all to see. Teachers cannot teach more than 5 students at a time. Children's work and behaviour must be monitored. Concerns must be log on and share during teachers and mentors meetings. Students progress must be assessed and recorded. There must be transparency across the board. As soon as we had enough volunteers, advert were placed on social media handles and teaching continued online. It was agreed to continue to support the senior citizens to become cyber friendly by creating evening tea sessions three times a week per month. Two dedicated volunteer should be delegated - the session is ongoing. The autism awareness is agreed to be ongoing.
