Strategic Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2020

The directors present their strategic report for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the company is that of sale of agricultural machinery, equipment and supplies.

Review of the business

The Directors believe the results shown in these financial statements are positive despite the uncertainties in the UK agricultural sector driven by both economic and government policy fluctuations. The directors are pleased to report that, aside from some minor disruption in activity and supply chain, the business has not been impacted to any significant degree by either Brexit or the Coronavirus pandemic (as described below). Purchase price changes have been successfully managed with a slight improvement in gross margin whilst volumes of sales were particularly strong in the second half of the year. The mix of product sales has remained consistent with the prior year.

The net current liability position as at 31 December 2019 of £2.44m was driven by the timing of the refinancing of the £2.08m property mortgage which was presented, in accordance with its terms of repayment, within current liabilities as at 31 December 2019. During 2020 the company successfully refinanced the facility for a further period of five years.

Over the course if 2020 the company's net debt has reduced from £7.1m to £5.3m driven by strong cash flow from operating activities of £2m (2019: net operating outflow of £1.8m).

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties that face the company are considered to be the state of the agricultural industry as a whole within the country and the competition within that market.

Although some disruption has occurred following the exit from the European Union, the company is satisfied that it has secured sufficient stocks of spares, whole-goods and other equipment in light of the time of the year and buying patterns of our customers.

The directors have considered the impact of COVID-19 on the supply chain and market demand and concluded that this is not a principal risk to the business. The directors will continue to monitor the ongoing impact of the pandemic on the business, in particular regarding customer demand, debtor recoverability and access to supply chain, but do not anticipate major challenges arising.

Financial instruments

Objectives and policies

The company has exposure to three main types of risk, being liquidity risk and customer credit exposure. The company does not enter into any hedging transactions. The use, and nature, of finance instruments are determined by the directors, in context of trading terms made available to the company by the customers and suppliers, with the objective of securing the liquid and profitability of the company.

Price risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and cash flow risk

Due to the nature of the financial instruments used by the company, there is no exposure to price risk. The company's approach to managing other risks applicable to the financial instruments concerned is shown below.

In respect of bank balances, the liquidity risk is managed by maintaining a balance between the continuity of funding and flexibility through the availability of overdraft facilities at floating rates of interest and stocking loans.

Trade debtors are managed in respect of credit and cash flow risk policies concerning the credit offered to customers, and the regular monitoring of amounts outstanding for both time and limits.

Trade creditors liquidity risk is managed by ensuring sufficient funds are available to meet amounts due. Trade creditors are paid in line with agreed credit terms and conditions, subject to correct invoicing.

Future developments

With the sixth generation of the Halse family now actively engaged in the business, robust management and the ongoing commitment to the development of staff, the directors are confident of the future progression of the company, and its continued support for the agricultural sector in the South West of England.

We discussed with management how the compliance with these laws and regulations is monitored and discussed policies and procedures in place.

We also identified the individuals who have responsibility for ensuring that the entity complies with laws and regulations and deal with reporting any issues if they arise.

As part of our planning procedures, we assessed the risk of any non-compliance with laws and regulations on the entity's ability to continue trading and the risk of material misstatement to the financial statements.

Based on this understanding we designed our audit procedures to identify non-compliance with such laws and regulations. Our procedures involved the following:

As part of our enquiries we discussed with management whether there have been any known instances, allegations or suspicions of fraud, of which management confirmed there had been none during or after the period.

We also evaluated the risk of fraud through management override. The key risks we identified were to meet compliance with financial loan covenants and minimise tax liabilities, and we determined that the principal risks were related to cut-off in respect of revenue recognition, management override of controls and stock valuation.

In response to the identified risk, as part of our audit work we:

- Used data analytics to test journal entries throughout the year, for appropriateness;
- Reviewed estimates and judgements made in the accounts for any indication of bias and challenged assumptions used by management in making the estimates; and
- Undertook specific cut-off procedures in respect of revenue recognition.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that we will not detect all irregularities, including those leading to a material misstatement in the financial statements. Notes to the Financial Statements

Year Ended 31 December 2020

1 General information

The company is a private company limited by share capital, incorporated in England & Wales.

The address of its registered office is: West Hill Brickyard Road Ottery St Mary Devon EX11 1GN England

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared using the historical cost convention except that as disclosed in the accounting policies certain items are shown at fair value.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. As at 31 December 2020 the company had net current assets of £525,392 (2019 - net liabilities £2,437,276). The directors are satisfied that the going concern basis of preparation remains appropriate. In forming this opinion, and having made all necessary enquiries and considered a period of no less than 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements the directors have considered the following key matters:

There has been no significant impact upon the company of the Covid-19 pandemic and the directors do not consider that this will impact on the company due to the nature of the agriculture sector.

Profit and Loss and cash flow forecasts have been prepared for a period of 12 months following the date of approval of these financial statements on a prudent basis and the directors are satisfied that the company will continue to generate cash and profit and to meet its liabilities as they fall due and any bank covenant requirements.

The directors are also satisfied with the profitable trading performance subsequent to the year end and their assessment is that the company will continue to be able to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year Ended 31 December 2020

Key judgements and sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The key sources of estimation uncertainty that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are as follows:

The Directors have considered the impact upon the Company of the COVID-19 pandemic, both in terms of the known immediate impact and possible impact for the foreseeable future (being a period of no less than 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements). The directors are satisfied that no adjustments are required to the financial statements arising from the COVID-19 pandemic and are also satisfied, based upon post year end and financial performance that the going concern basis of preparation remains appropriate.

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost, less accumulated depreciation and any subsequent accumulated impairment loss. This requires an estimation in the depreciation rates used and residual values attainable when the assets are sold, as well as an assessment of the ongoing economic contribution of the assets of the company as to whether an indicator of impairment has occurred. The carrying amount is £4,390,216 (2019 - £4,691,216).

Goodwill is considered to have a finite useful life, the directors believe goodwill should be amortised over 10 years. This estimate is based upon the economic climate and no reliable estimate being able to be achieved as required under FRS 102 to amortise over a longer period. The carrying amount is £971,250 (2019 - £1,128,750).

Stock is measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. This requires estimation as to the net realisable value of each stock line, as to whether a provision is required. The carrying amount is £6,650,835 (2019 - £6,483,707).

Trade debtors are constantly being managed and are reviewed throughout the year. A provision for doubtful debt is made where recovery of debt is uncertain, this is on a case by case basis. The carrying amount is £2,366,288 (2019 - £2,192,235).

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year Ended 31 December 2020

Revenue recognition

Turnover comprises the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the sale of goods and provision of services in the ordinary course of the company's activities. Turnover is shown net of value added tax, returns, rebates and discounts and after eliminating sales within the company.

Revenue relating to the sale of goods is recognised in the profit and loss account on delivery or collection. Where customers are invoiced prior to delivery of goods a deferred income balance arises which is included within accruals and deferred income within current liabilities.

Revenue relating to the sale of services is recognised in the profit and loss account when the service has been provided.

Tax

Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except that a change attributable to an item of income or expense recognised as other comprehensive income is also recognised directly in other comprehensive income.

The current corporation tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the company operates and generates taxable income.

Deferred tax is recognised on all timing differences at the balance sheet date unless indicated below. Timing differences are differences between taxable profits and the results as stated in the profit and loss account and other comprehensive income. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and a valuation allowance is set up against deferred tax assets so that the net carrying amount equals the highest amount that is more likely than not to be recovered based on current or future taxable profit.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are stated in the balance sheet at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

The cost of tangible assets includes directly attributable incremental costs incurred in their acquisition and installation.

Depreciation

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost of assets, other than land and properties under construction over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Goodwill

Goodwill is amortised over its useful life, which shall not exceed ten years if a reliable estimate of the useful life cannot be made.

Amortisation

Amortisation is provided on intangible assets so as to write off the cost, less any estimated residual value, over their useful life as follows:

Stocks

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after due regard for obsolete and slow moving stocks. New realisable value is based on selling price less anticipated costs to completion and selling costs. Cost represents the purchase price of goods for resale, new any discounts receivable.

Leases

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee.

Assets held under finance leases are recognised at the lower of their fair value at inception of the lease and the present value of the minimum lease payments. These assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the useful life of the asset and the lease term. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the Balance Sheet as a finance lease obligation.

Lease payments are apportioned between finance costs in the Profit and Loss Account and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Defined contribution pension obligation

Retirement benefits to employees are provided by a money purchase scheme which is funded by the company. Payments are made to pension trusts which are financially separate from the company. The payments are charged against profit in the year in which they become payable.

Except for bank loans, such instruments are initially measured at transaction price, including transaction costs, and are subsequently carried at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received, after taking account of impairment adjustments.

Bank loans are initially measured at transaction price, including transaction costs, and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
