NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2022

1 Accounting policies

Company information

Gallagher Finance Limited ("the company") acts as a finance company.

The company is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Gallagher House, Gallagher Way, Gallagher Business Park, Warwick, Warwickshire, CV34 6AF.

1.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 as applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime. The disclosure requirements of section 1A of FRS 102 have been applied other than where additional disclosure is required to show a true and fair view.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

In considering the appropriateness of the going concern assumption, the directors have taken into consideration the company's cash flow forecasts and present level of funding. Based on the overall financial position the directors have concluded that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

1.3 Turnover

The company receives interest receivable and arrangement fees from trading as a finance company. Interest receivable is recognised as revenue as it accrues. Arrangement fees are recognised as revenue over the life of the finance provided.

1.4 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are basic financial assets and include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.5 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

(Continued)

Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors, bank loans, loans from fellow group companies and preference shares that are classified as debt, are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.6 Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of transaction costs. Dividends payable on equity instruments are recognised as liabilities once they are no longer at the discretion of the company.

1.7 Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

Current tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the profit and loss account because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting end date.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all timing differences and deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the timing difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the tax profit nor the accounting profit.

8 Related party transactions

The loans to related parties are long term loans on normal commercial terms and are secured by way of a negative pledge on the assets of the borrower.

Countywide Developments Limited

During the year Countywide Developments Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher, provided the company administrational services. Services provided to 30 September 2022 amounted to £60,000 (2021: £60,000). Half of this balance has yet to be invoiced by Countywide Developments Limited and is currently accounted for in other creditors. As at 30 September 2022 the balance due to Countywide Developments Limited is £nil (2021: £nil)

Gallagher Developments Cardington Limited

On 16th April 2018 the company provided a loan of £6,300,000 to Gallagher Developments Cardington Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher. The total arrangement fee charged was £15,750, of which £3,150 (2021: £3,150) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £239,732 (2021: £196,068). Interest is charged at 3% above the Bank of England base rate. As at 30 September 2022, Gallagher Developments Cardington Limited owed the company £6,300,000 (2021: £6,300,000). This loan is repayable April 2023.

Ashflame Cardington Limited

On 16th April 2018 the company provided a loan of £14,000,000 to Ashflame Cardington Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher. The loan was repaid during the previous year. The total arrangement fee charged was £51,000, of which £nil (2021: £9,222) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £nil (2021: £402,507). Interest was charged at 3% above the Bank of England base rate. As at 30 September 2022, Ashflame Cardington Limited owed the company £nil (2021: £nil).

Bull Ring Trading Estate Limited

On 16th April 2018 the company provided a loan of £1,600,000 to Bull Ring Trading Estate Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher. The total arrangement fee charged was £4,000, of which £nil (2021: £723) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £60,884 (2021: £49,795). Interest is charged at 3% above the Bank of England base rate. As at 30 September 2022, Bull Ring Trading Estate Limited owed the company £1,600,000 (2021: £1,600,000). This loan is repayable April 2023.

Gallagher Developments Warwick Limited

On 18th March 2019 the company provided a loan of £3,300,000 to Gallagher Developments Warwick Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher. The total arrangement fee charged was £8,250, of which £1,650 (2021: £1,650) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £113,896 (2021: £77,781). Interest is charged at 2.25% above the Bank of England base rate. This loan is repayable March 2024. On 20th April 2020 the company provided an additional loan of £2,000,000 to Gallagher Developments Warwick Limited. The total arrangement fee charged was £5,000, of which £1,000 (2021: £1,000) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £76,061 (2021: £62,586). Interest is charged at 2.25% above the Bank of England base rate. This loan is repayable April 2025. As at 30th September 2021, Gallagher Developments Warwick Limited owed the company £5,300,000 (2021: £5,300,000).

Gallagher Investments Holdco Limited

On 31st January 2022 the company provided a loan of £10,000,000 to Gallagher Investments Holdco Limited, a company under the control of Sir A C Gallagher. The total arrangement fee charged was £40,000, of which £3,045 (2021: £nil) was credited to the Statement of Comprehensive income during the year. Interest receivable during the year amounted to £250,991 (2021: £nil). Interest is charged at the fixed rate of 4%. The loan is repayable in January 2029. As at 30 September 2022, Gallagher Investments Holdco Limited owed the company £10,000,000 (2021: £nil).
