#### **Business review**

The Company is part of the Admiral Group and a comprehensive trading review for the Group is included in the consolidated accounts of AT Brady Holdings Limited.

The Company's income comprises a management recharge to fellow group companies and interest income receivable on amounts owed by group undertakings. The Company's costs primarily represent interest payable on amounts owed to group undertakings and the amortisation of finance costs.

#### Financial key performance indicators

A comprehensive review of the state of affairs of the Group into which the Company is consolidated, including key performance indicators and key risks and uncertainties is contained in the report and financial statements of AT Brady Holdings Limited.

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the period ended 29 May 2022.

#### **Directors' responsibilities statement**

The directors are responsible for preparing the Strategic Report, the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'. Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and of the profit or loss of the Company for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies for the Company's financial statements and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **Principal activity**

The principal activities of the Company are to act as a financing and holding company.

#### Disclosure of information to auditor

Each of the persons who are directors at the time when this Directors' Report is approved has confirmed that:

- so far as the director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the Company's auditor is unaware: and
- the director has taken all the steps that ought to have been taken as a director in order to be aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Company's auditor is aware of that information.

#### Going concern

The Company is a member of the Admiral Taverns group of companies (the Group). A full list of the Group can be found in the accounts of AT Brady Holdings Limited as referred to in note 21. The Company has a cross guarantee arrangement in relation to the Group's financing and therefore the Group position is relevant.

In assessing Going Concern the Directors have considered the limiting factors that may prevent them from supporting a going concern assumption for the Group. These are:

- insufficient cash resources to pay creditors as and when they become due; and
- an inability to meet certain financial covenants (the Leverage Test) in the Group's amended loan facilities
  agreement with ICG, which could lead to an event of default which would trigger a demand for repayment of
  the Facility.

#### Cash Resources

As of 28 April 2023, the Group had £45.8m of free cash. The pub estates continue to trade well meeting management's expectations and generating cash. Pub disposals remain on track and Management have yet to see any impact on pub values as a result of the UK's Financial Crisis. The Group has hedged its own utility costs and over half its interest rate exposure under its debt facilities. The robust cash position is also supported by the large freehold asset base.

#### Leverage Test

The Leverage Test (a quarterly covenant test of the ratio of net debt to EBITDA over the preceding 12-month period) was reset in August 2021 as part of the extension of the existing facilities to fund the Hawthorn Acquisition. This included raised levels of covenant headroom and the addition of certain Pandemic Protection clauses, suspending the leverage test in the event of further large scale, Government mandated closures of pubs and replacing it with a minimum liquidly requirement or maintaining at least £5m of liquid cash resources during the impacted period.

#### Conclusion

The Directors have concluded that sufficient resources exist for the Group to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the twelve months from the date of approval of the accounts. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements.

#### Post balance sheet events

On 30 August 2022 C&C Group Plc sold its holding in Brady P&C Limited, the Group's parent, to Proprium capital partners.

As noted in the directors' section above, 3 directors resigned after the year end.

On 10th June the Group successfully implemented its new ERP system combining the operations of the Hawthorn and Admiral Pub Estates.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements For the Period Ended 29 May 2022

#### 1. General information

AT Brady Bidco Limited is a limited liability company incorporated in England. The Registered Office is Milton Gate, 60 Chiswell Street, London, EC1Y 4AG.

#### 2. Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 3).

The Company is itself a subsidiary company and is exempt from the requirement to prepare group accounts by virtue of section 400 of the Companies Act 2006. These financial statements therefore present information about the Company as an individual undertaking and not about its group.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

#### 2.2 Going concern

The Company is a member of the Admiral Taverns group of companies (the Group). A full list of the Group can be found in the consolidated accounts of AT Brady Holdings Limited as referred to in note 21. The Company has a cross guarantee arrangement in relation to the Group's financing and therefore the Group position is relevant.

#### 2.3 Cash flow

The Company, being a qualifying entity which has been included in the Group's consolidated financial statements that are publicly available, is exempt from the requirement to draw up a cash flow statement under FRS102.

#### 2.4 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. The following criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

#### Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- the Company has transferred the significant risks and rewards of ownership to the buyer;
- the Company retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold;
- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the Company will receive the consideration due under the transaction; and
- the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably.

#### Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised in the period in which the services are provided in accordance with the stage of completion of the contract when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the Company will receive the consideration due under the contract;
- the stage of completion of the contract at the end of the reporting period can be measured reliably; and
- the costs incurred and the costs to complete the contract can be measured reliably.

#### 2.5 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements For the Period Ended 29 May 2022

#### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.6 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to profit or loss over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

#### 2.7 Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

#### 2.8 Current and deferred taxation

Tax is recognised in profit or loss except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except that:

- the recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

#### 2.9 Valuation of investments

Investments in subsidiaries are initially recorded at cost, including directly attributable costs, plus the directors' assessment of the fair value of any deferred consideration. Subsequently, deferred consideration is revised to reflect actual amounts payable.

Investments in subsidiaries are reviewed for impairment in the event that there are any indicators of impairment.

#### 2.10 Debtors

Short-term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.11 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

#### 2.12 Creditors

Short-term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.13 Financial instruments

The Company used an interest rate cap to adjust interest rate exposures. The cap was initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract was entered into and was subsequently revalued to fair value and shown on the balance sheet at the year end with movements in fair value reflected through the profit and loss account. The interest rate cap expired in December 2020 and has not been renewed.

#### 3. Judgments in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the financial statements:

#### Taxation

The Company establishes provisions based on reasonable estimates, for possible consequences of audits by the tax authorities of the respective countries in which it operates. The amount of such provisions is based on various factors, such as experience with previous tax audits and differing interpretations of tax regulations by the taxable entity and the responsible tax authority.

Management estimation is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon likely timing and level of future taxable profits together with an assessment of the effect of future tax planning strategies.

#### Derivative instruments

The group used interest rate cap to adjust interest rate exposures.

Derivative financial instruments were measured at fair value. The fair value of interest rate cap contracts was determined by appropriately qualified external valuer. The interest rate cap expired in December 2020.
