## Notes to the financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2020

#### 1. General information

UK Tyres and Lubricants Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England. The address of its registered office is 2920 Trident Court, Solihull Parkway, Birmingham Business Park, Birmingham, B37 7YN. The company's principal activity is the sale and repair of automotive tyres.

#### 2. Summary of principal accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently throughout the period, is set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The current accounting period is the 10 months ended 31 December 2020, as the Company was incorporated on 6 March 2020.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

#### 2.2 Revenue recognition

The Company operates retail shops for the sale of branded and own branded tyres, as well as autocare services. Revenue is recognised on sale to the customer, which is considered the point of delivery of goods and rendering of services. Retail sales are usually by cash, credit or payment card.

#### 2.3 Operating leases

Rentals arising under operating leases are charged to the income Statement on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### 2.4 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the income statement using the effective interest method.

#### 2.5 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the income statement over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

#### 2.6 Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised in the income statement in the period in which they are incurred.

#### 2.7 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The Company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the income statement when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Company in independently administered funds.

#### 2.8 Current and deferred taxation

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Profit and loss account, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Balance sheet date, except that:

- the recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

#### 2. Summary of principal accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.9 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

At each reporting date the company assesses whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined which is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. An impairment loss is recognised where the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.

Depreciation is charged to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Plant and machinery -10-20%

Fixtures and fittings -20%

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the income statement.

#### 2.10 Intangible assets

Intangible assets are stated at cost less amortisation and consists of goodwill. Amortisation is provided on a straight-line basis at rates which are estimated to write off the intangible asset over 10 years. An annual review is undertaken by management to assess the recoverability of these assets in relation to the carrying value. The impairment is recognised immediately in the income statement.

#### 2.11 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first out basis. Work in progress and finished goods include labour and attributable overheads.

At each balance sheet date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### 2.12 Debtors

Short term debtors are initially measured at transaction price and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 2.13 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

#### 2. Summary of principal accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.14 Creditors

Short term creditors are initially measured at the transaction price and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.15 Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are made where an event has taken place that gives the Company a legal or constructive obligation that probably requires settlement by a transfer of economic benefit, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are charged as an expense to the income statement in the period that the Company becomes aware of the obligation and are measured at the best estimate at the balance sheet date of the expenditure required to settle the obligation, taking into account relevant risks and uncertainties.

When payments are eventually made, they are charged to the provision carried in the Balance sheet.

#### 2.16 Financial Instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade debtors, trade creditors and loans to related parties. Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the income statement.

#### 2.17 Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders at an annual general meeting.

#### 2.18 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial period are addressed below.

#### Key estimates

Provisions are made for intangibles where there is an indication of impairment following the annual review undertaken by management to assess the recoverability of assets, using their knowledge and expertise of the market.

#### Key judgements

In the course of preparing the financial statements, no significant judgements have been made in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies.

#### 2.19 Going concern

The directors have received a letter of support from a fellow group member, Goodyear Europe BV. This letter of support guarantees the company access to funding for the foreseeable future, being at least 12 months from the date of signing of these accounts. Thus, the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual financial statements.

On 6 April 2020, the Company completed an Asset Purchase Agreement ("APA") with a fellow group member company, Easy Autocentres Limited, which resulted in the acquisition of a fast-fit garage business located in Henley-on-Thames, for consideration totalling £307,500.

The fair value of the assets acquired includes £20,000 of property plant and equipment and £10,000 of inventories, giving rise to goodwill of £277,500.

In accordance with the APA, identifiable assets were acquired, which have been initially recognised in accordance with the Company's Accounting Policies noted on pages 3 to 11.

Consideration transferred in excess of the fair value of the identifiable assets has been recognised as Goodwill in Intangible Fixed Assets. An annual review has been undertaken by management to assess the recoverability of Goodwill, resulting in an impairment charge during the year of £77,250.
