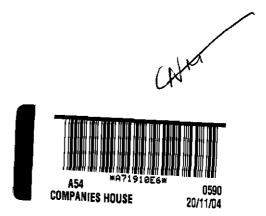

Directors Report for the Year ended 31 March 2004

The Directors present their report and the financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 March 2004.

Mission and Vision

The principal activity continues to be the provision of healthcare services, with InHealth established as one of the UK's leading providers of managed healthcare services. The main aim of the business is to work as a strategic partner to the NHS and, by working with them, to improve the provision of healthcare in the UK by delivering market leading services that represent value for money and quality to our customers and to the patients they treat.

Continued expansion and growth

We continued to experience strong organic growth with the demand for services strong across all of our businesses. The Company's order book continues to grow with the addition of further medium and long term contracts. Opportunities identified are already converting into new lines of activity and are expected to grow in future years. In keeping with our strategy of growth the Company added a number of new services during the year.

Some further acquisitions

Sterile Services International was acquired during the year. This business consists of contracts for equipment management at the Central Middlesex ACAD and facilities management at St David's Cardiff, both of which add further to the Company's service offering. Of even greater importance, it added a significant contract with Cardiff University Teaching Hospital for the provision of Decontamination services, augmenting the position the Company already established in this emerging market.

Teamwork and culture contribute to results

As the Company grows, significant time and effort has been invested in building the right working environment and ensuring that we get the best from our employees whilst recognising their contribution both individually and collectively. The results achieved are the result of teamwork as well as the hard work of our employees. The Group employs a very large number of highly skilled and trained professionals with many years of experience working within the health sector. By working together as well managed units they continue to deliver exemplary services and operate with high levels of efficiency. The Board would like to take this opportunity of thanking them all for their contribution.

Growing capacity and maintaining equipment to high standards

The Company continues to invest heavily in growing its capacity, often ahead of contracted demand. It also follows a vigorous policy of keeping all of its assets maintained to a high standard including regular upgrades to keep its equipment current with the technology developments.

Movements in fixed assets during the year are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Directors Report for the Year ended 31 March 2004 (contd)

Satisfactory results

Once last year's figures are adjusted to exclude prior year discontinued activities, turnover grew by 17% during the year. Operating profit on these activities was £796,000 after £3.3million goodwill amortisation charge. It is anticipated that the Group will adopt International Accounting Standards as soon as possible (year ending 31 March 2006) under which the goodwill balances will cease to be amortised and a full impairment review will be required on an annual basis. Without the current year amortisation charge, the operating profit would have been £4.1million; an 18% increase on the previous year calculated on a like for like basis.

The Directors are more than satisfied with the results in light of the expansion and significant long term investment being made.

Dividends

The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend, and the policy continues to be to re-invest all profits in future development and growth of the business.

Directors' responsibilities for the financial statements

The Directors are responsible for preparing the financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and the Group and of the profit or loss of the Group for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company and the Group will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and the Group. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and the Group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Review of Trading Activities for the Year ended 31 March 2004

Lister InHealth

Lister InHealth provides managed services predominantly in general diagnostic and scanning. It operates facilities and staffing on both short and long term contracts.

Radiology services and MRI/CT

Lister InHealth continues to grow as the leading provider of managed scanning services to the NHS. We also continue to work with a number of private hospital groups as they seek to expand their own ranges of service provision. As in previous years new sites were brought on stream during the year and we contracted for a number of new services. These will come on stream in future accounting periods.

Increasingly the Company is providing a wider range of scanning and diagnostic services, covering all modalities but with particular focus on MRI, CT, X-Ray, Ultrasound and Vascular Imaging. Radiologist reading services are also supplied to a number of centres. Lister InHealth also runs a fleet of mobile MRI and CT units, capable of providing instant diagnostic capacity anywhere in the country. Together with Cardinal InHealth, the Group offers the widest range of scanning services and, with nearly 15 years of experience and a large number of fixed installations on NHS sites, it is amongst the most widely experienced in the sector. The fleet was both updated and extended during the year.

Positron Emission Tomography (PET)

Lister InHealth also runs the London PET centre, providing PET scans, primarily for cancer detection. The London PET Centre has carried out over 2000 scans, making it the most experienced provider outside of the NHS and a recognised leader in this field with strong associations with leading experts in PET scanning.

Further contracts for the delivery of PET services are at an advanced stage of negotiation and it is likely that this technology will start to grow strongly in the coming year.

Diagnostic Centres

These continue to be a focus for the Company leveraging our extensive skills and experience in Diagnostics and Imaging. The expansion of the Cornwall House Diagnostic Centre was completed and growth in this area was good. The enlarged centre supports a range of diagnostic services, working closely with the local PCT and GPs. It not only provides consultation rooms but also instant access to a wide range of diagnostics and scanning. As a model it is likely to replicated in further opportunities.

Cardinal InHealth

Cardinal InHealth operates all the Group's cardiac services. As with Lister InHealth, it provides its facilities and staffing on both short and long term contracts, operating fully managed services. The business significantly complements activities undertaken by Lister InHealth.

Cardiac Catheterisation

Cardinal InHealth is the leading non NHS supplier of mobile, re-locatable and static cardiac catheterisation units to the NHS. Cardinal undertakes about 10% of NHS catheterisation procedures, performing in excess of 15,000 cases per year, and has the benefit of more than 10 years of cardiac catheterisation experience. Cardinal was the first UK Company to provide the more invasive angioplasty services at NHS sites and its static and mobile services increasingly include these procedures. As well as the permanent and semi permanent units throughout the UK, we also operate a fleet of mobiles and are the only UK operator able to provide this level and complexity of service.

Cardinal InHealth continues to deliver high levels of quality, clinical governance and service.

Cardiac MRI

Cardiac MRI continues to grow, is proving a useful addition to the service offering and is operational at a number of NHS hospitals.

Cardiac Perfusion

Quantum InHealth is the leading supplier, outside the NHS, of nuclear perfusion scans and reports. Most of these reports are used to diagnose heart conditions. The recent NICE report recommends a large increase in this procedure and the Company is well placed to assist the NHS in increasing its capacity in this area.

Modular Wards

Modular day recovery wards continue to used at a number of NHS sites. This service not only ensures maximum throughput of cardiac procedures but also frees up beds for other uses.

Rocialle InHealth

Rocialle InHealth provides dressing packs for pre and post operative treatment; procedure packs for use in all types of clinical environments, in particular hospital operating theatres, and single use instruments. Services include procurement, sterilisation and direct delivery to the point of use and full traceability from production to the patient. With nearly 30 years practical experience, it has state of the art clean rooms, logistics capability and leading edge sterilisation processes.

Dressing Packs

Sales grew steadily in line with the market. The introduction of the Readyfield range was an innovative development that will appeal to Primary Care Markets in particular, giving improvements to the sterile field and ease of handling.

Procedure Packs

Procedure Pack sales in the UK continue to show good growth with NHS and private hospitals continuing to realise the benefits of the Procedure Pack model. The Company now supplies a large number of NHS hospitals with its packs with the benefits becoming more widely understood. The ability to tailor packs for specific procedures and or individual surgeons, combined with high levels of quality and service reliability, has enabled the Company to enjoy a continued market leading position. Our own sterilisation facilities and advanced logistics capability allow us to offer unsurpassed levels of service.

Instruments

Our single use instruments have been developed to the point where the quality matches that of reusable instruments but with price points that make then more economical than recycling and cleaning re-usable instruments. They also offer an ability to address continuing concerns about cross infection and sterilisation through single use instruments.

National Decontamination Strategy

InHealth are one of a few companies to have made a number of short-lists for the provision of decontamination centres. We have continued to invest in this area and see significant opportunities for long term contracts. The acquisition of Sterile Services International was a significant move to further strengthen our offering in this area. Significant investment in resources to support our bids and further build our knowledge were made in the year and will, we hope, result in contracts in future years. These projects utilise the Company's wide ranging skills in design, build and operate together with our extensive knowledge of operating theatres and consumables. The Company has all the professionals and expertise necessary to deliver the projects.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2004

1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

(a) Basis of accounting

These non-statutory accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the accounting policies set out below. The Company's statutory accounts on which an unqualified audit opinion has been given, are prepared in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and regulations of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg and are appended to these financial statements. The accounts have been drawn up in sterling which is the functional currency of the Group.

(b) Basis of consolidation

The Group accounts consolidate the accounts of InHealth Group SA and its subsidiary undertakings drawn up to 31 March each year.

Goodwill (c)

Goodwill is the difference between the cost of an acquired entity and the aggregate of the fair value of that entity's identifiable assets and liabilities.

Positive goodwill is capitalised, classified as an asset on the balance sheet and amortised on a straight line basis over its useful economic life. It is reviewed for impairment at the end of the first full financial year following acquisition and in other periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

(d) Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation and amortisation are calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of tangible and intangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives to the business. The annual depreciation and amortisation rates and methods are as follows:

Freehold property

- 50 years straight line

Leasehold land and buildings - straight line over the term of the lease

Fixtures and fittings Plant and machinery

- 6 to 10 years straight line - 4 to 15 years straight line - 3 years straight line

Computer equipment Motor vehicles

- 4 to 6 years straight line

Goodwill

20 years straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

(e) **Fixed asset investments**

The carrying values of fixed asset investments are reviewed for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

(f) Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(g) Pension contributions

The Group operates a number of pension schemes. The pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Group to the schemes in respect of the year.

(h) Research and development

Research and development expenditure is written off as incurred.

(i) Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Income and charges are translated at the year end rate. All differences are taken to the profit and loss account with the exception of exchange differences on the net investment in overseas businesses which are taken directly to reserves. The accounts have been drawn up in sterling which is the functional currency of the Group.

(j) Government grants

Grants of a revenue nature are credited to income so as to match them with the expenditure to which they relate. Government grants in respect of capital expenditure and job creation are credited to a deferred income account and are released to profit over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets and the project life by equal annual instalments.

(k) Deferred taxation

Deferred taxation is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated, but not reversed, at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred and will result in an obligation to pay more, or right to pay less or to receive more tax, with the following exceptions:

Provision is made for tax on gains arising from the revaluation (and similar fair value adjustments) of fixed assets, or gains on disposal of fixed assets that have been rolled over into replacement assets, only to the extent that, at the balance sheet date, there is a binding agreement to dispose of the assets concerned. However, no provision is made where, on the basis of all available evidence at the balance sheet date, it is more likely than not that the taxable gain will be rolled over into replacement assets and charged to tax only where the replacement assets are sold.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the Directors consider that it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences reverse, based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

(I) Liquid investments

These are stated at the lower of cost or market value.

(m) Leasing and hire purchase agreements

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are capitalised in the balance sheet and are depreciated over their useful lives. The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding. Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2. TURNOVER

Turnover, which is stated net of value added tax, represents amounts invoiced to third parties. Substantially all of the group's sales are made in the United Kingdom.

Prior year (2003) figures include £6.0 million of revenue in respect of discontinued activities.
