Structure, governance and management

The company is a 'not-for-profit' organisation, is limited by guarantee and has no share capital.

The company is governed and managed by the board of directors and management committee.

The board of directors carry out their governance role throughout the year by way of meetings on a regular basis to review the performance of the company and to make decisions regarding the company's financial and operational matters. The directors govern the activities of the company in line with the objectives set out in the governing documents of the charity, namely the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the charity's constitution.

Objectives and activities

The principal activity of the company during the year was to provide fine art print making facilities for both professional artists and the wider community, while continuing to encourage the education and appreciation of the art of printmaking amongst the general public.

The directors are satisfied that the performance of the company during the year, in terms of both financial and operational results, is in line with the charity's constitution and key objectives. The aim for the year was:

To continue to develop course provision for community aware organisations i.e. Artscare Develop course provision for the wider community.

Organise exhibition of members work, also the CVA organisation are stepping down from leasing building from ICT. Up to now we have been subleasing downstairs unit from CVA. DPW will now need to make steps towards taking over and running the unit 5 pump street arts facility - including managing upstairs studio and general work areas. This will be dependent on acquiring a long-term lease from Inner City Trust.

Achievements and performance

Brief outline of activities for the year

A series of courses for the local community were organised.

1.DPW Autumn/Winter Programme

Beginning in September 2016 and running through Autumn-Winter Derry Print Workshop was pleased to offer a variety of printmaking Courses. The courses on offer aimed to give novice printmakers the skills needed to access the workshop's facilities and for the more experienced Artist/Printmaker there are courses to introduce new techniques, get to know the workshop and try out new mediums. Courses covered introductory printmaking, collagraph, etching screenprint relief print.

2. CCA workshops Activist Screenprints

The exhibition is the result of a project in which the Derry Print Workshop - in partnership with CCA - established Derry's only open screen-printing facility. It was activated through a series of workshops and open-studio sessions for campaigning groups and other members of the community to learn the process, theory and history of screen-printing. Through this programme, the DPW created an 'open-source' platform, with community and voluntary groups producing a series of prints and posters addressing campaign and visibility issues.

A number of groups including Alliance for Choice, Art of Resistance, Derry Youth and Community Workshop, Lilliput Theatre Company, Northwest Black and Minority Ethnic Strategic Forum, The Rainbow Project (Trans Youth Project), UV Arts, and Zero Waste North West were selected to take part.

3. Activist Screenprints Exhibition

Edenvale Arts Centre, Pilots Row There was a final exhibition of the prints at the Eden Place Arts Centre as a part of the Human Rights Festival 2016.

4. Arts Care Workshops and facilitation.

Specialised printmaking workshops facilitated and co-ordinate participatory workshops and with a specialist printmaker from Derry Print Workshop.

DPW have participated in facilitating workshops with Artscare for the past 3 years. Artscare is a unique Arts and Health Charity based in Northern Ireland. In partnership with Health and Social Care Trusts throughout Northern Ireland, Arts Care engages 19 Artists-in-Residence, and many project artists who facilitate and co-ordinate participatory workshops and performances. Believing in the benefits of creativity to well-being, Arts Care makes all forms of art accessible to patients, clients, residents and staff in health and social care settings.

6 workshops were facilitated in 2017 the practice areas of linocut, screenprint and cyanotype printmaking. An exhibit of work produced is held yearly in Belfast organised through the Artscare organisation.

A series of cyanotypes based on living and growing up with Polio produced by one of the participants is shown in Altnagelvin exhibition space.

5.European Youth Capital '19

Screenprinted t-shirts in support of the EYC bid for 2019.

6. North West Regional College ~ Limavady Campus

Teacher Development Event

Linoprint expert Matthew Braithwaite led an introduction course to the lecturers at NWRC. Christmas card printing was utilised to teach the basics of relief printing and use of the Rochat relief press in the workshop.

7. Women of the World Festival 2016

Provided a facilitator and equipment to a t-shirt and tote bag printing workshop at the 2016 Women of the World Festival. The short workshop saw participants both print and make stencils for the merchandise which was sent home with the participants as well the extras will be sold at next years festivals to help support festival costs.

8.Education outreach at Coleraine Grammar School, Loretto College, St. Joseph's Student Development Course

DPW provided a facilitator and some equipment to have a member of the workshop go to Coleraine Grammar School and do an introduction to printmaking through drypoint. In addition, the work that was made during the two day workshop would be included in their portfolio to move forward with their arts education.

This was located at Coleraine Grammar School but included select students going on to study art in their A Levels from three schools: St Josephs, Coleraine Grammar, and Loretto College.

11. Continued to offer a facility for professional artist / printmakers. Some members are successfully exhibiting works across the country.

Overall our initial aims and strategies for the workshop for the last year have been met, setting in place a good foundation for future development. The various introductory courses held throughout the year have been particularly successful in marketing and establishing the fine art print workshop as an important asset to the art sector in the city. Acquiring part time technician provision has meant good facilitation of courses and increased access to the workshop facility.

The successful application and acquisition of screen printing equipment last year has meant a substantial upgrade to the workshop facilities. It has brought new interest in membership and has been an additional benefit in course provision. It will be important to use the success of the last year to further establish the print workshop as an essential creative art facility within the city. This will mean an increased effort towards securing funding towards projects/ running costs with the aim of securing part time posts for a technician/ administrator and to continue provision of a series of courses throughout the coming year.

Technician part time funding is applied for on yearly basis and unfortunately DPW was not successful in gaining funding for part time technician provision (£6,000) from Derry City Council Venue Fund. The application criteria changed. Stating that organizations should have a permanent full time employee in place (or equivalent) before application could proceed. We couldn't meet the criteria (even our payments to facilitators etc does not amount to equivalent full time wage). This has meant that all technician, /admin has been provided for voluntarily. This cannot be sustained for long and need seriously to address this next year. We are at a stage of development that without further increased funding we will just be ticking along again at our present level. Funding bodies such as Esmee Fairbairns, Derry City Council and the ACNI should be looked at for help towards funding for projects and general running costs.

DPW have since end of May effectively taken over the running of the whole of the Unit5 arts facility in the Garden of Reflection. We have acquired a preliminary six monthly lease for premises from ITC with negotiations for a long term lease in place. Acquiring running cost funding is particularly of major importance as DPW are now effectively running the unit 5 Arts facility and paying heat, light and insurance costs for whole premises. Discussions on long -term lease terms are ongoing with the Inner City Trust. This could mean an increased rental outlay and could prove unsustainable unless funding is acquired.

Financial review

The net outgoing resources for the year was £4,123 (2016 - incoming £7,840). The company reserves at the year-end were £29,998 (2016 - £34,121) of which £4,943 is unrestricted funds and £29,178 is restricted funds. The trustees aim to have a reserve covering at least three months expenditure at any given time.

The full results are set out in the accounts which form part of this report.

Plans for future periods

Proposals should be drawn up and initiatives started for the following:

- Course provision continue to provide a series of introductory and advanced courses held throughout the following year. Aim of providing 15 weekend courses through the year. Courses have proved to be valuable in both establishing the profile of the fine art print workshop in the city and for increasing paying membership. (ACNI and Esmee)
- 2. Technician / Administrator post important to make continue to source permanent funding for these posts. If the workshop is to develop a professional facility that is accessible throughout the week then this is essential. (Esmme Fairbairns, DC Council) (both dependant on long term lease.)
- 3. Running Costs This is obviously becoming a major issue if we want to improve, develop and meet the aims of the workshop (Emee Fairbairns ACNI, and DCC dependant on long term lease.)
- 4. Continue facilitating courses with Artscare.
- 5. Develop further contact with NWRC art department offering further workshop facilitation and access to fine art print facility.
- 6. Develop contact with local schools offering workshops for A level students
- 7. Develop membership numbers continue to offer fine art print facility to local artists.
- 8. Exhibition provision- Need to establish a couple of yearly exhibitions that will help towards fundraising. Altnagelvin Gallery, Garden of Reflection Gallery. Open day exhibition in workshop facility
- 9. Community group Project. Apply for funding for further community group project youth project for year of youth. (small grant fund ACNI)
- 10. Secure lease with Inner City Trust, Look to signing 5 year lease with ICT.

N.B All funding applications are dependent on DPW gaining a 5 year lease on premises otherwise funding applications are void.

1. General information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Northern Ireland and a registered charity in Northern Ireland. The address of the registered office is 8 Miller Street, Derry, BT48 6SU.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Transition to FRS 102

The entity transitioned from previous UK GAAP to FRS 102 as at 1 July 2015. Details of how FRS 102 has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is given in note 15.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is
 impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor
 or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the
 accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for
 the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Print room furniture

20% straight line

Printing Equipment

- 5% straight line

Computer Equipment - 20% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Financial instruments (continued)

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.
