Day to day management of the company is delegated by the Council to an Executive committee. The governing documents of the company are contained within a memorandum and articles of association. The memorandum and articles of association contain provision for the appointment of 15 members of council who become directors of the company. Vacancies on the Council are filled by election of members at the Annual General Meeting.

The company has one wholly owned dormant subsidiary company, The Institution of Engineers in Scotland Limited.

Other Activities

Scottish Engineering Hall of Fame

The Scottish Engineering Hall of Fame continues to flourish; four more engineers were inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 2014 James Watt Dinner.

Energy Strategy Group

The thrust of advice to government from this group over several years, has been that the UK electricity system needs to be assessed by a team of competent, independent people to identify mix of generation that will provide a good balance in relation to the competing requirements. New approaches to regulating the system and for procuring the plant etc. also need to be devised using engineering methodology. During the year this message has been communicated to the energy ministers in the Holyrood and Westminster Governments.

Professional Engineering Group

The group promotes professional engineering as a very worthwhile career for young people. We manage a website for this purpose, organise special lectures for aspiring engineers and visits to universities to inform students about career prospects. The institution held a prestigious lecture for aspiring engineers in 2015. Members of the group give support to Primary Engineer and for careers events in schools.

Centre for Professional Engineering Competence

A successful series of early evening CPD workshops on Risk Assessment and Control were held in 2015. An initiative to provide examples of applications of the use of engineering mechanics in practice is being promoted.

James Watt Dinner

The annual James Watt Dinner was held on 3rd October 2014. The dinner was held in the Radisson Blu hotel, Glasgow. The Council records its thanks to the members of the JWD sub-group for organising the successful event.

Membership

During the session, 39 applications for membership were approved. As a consequence, as detailed in the membership roll shown on page 6, membership of the Institution at the 31st July 2015 was 496. The membership approved a clarification and streamlining of the membership grades at the AGM.

Publications

The Transactions publication has been updated to a more modern, full colour, magazine style. Volume 154 was published in this format and copies were sent to other Engineering Institutions and MSPs. The IESIS website has been improved. The institution published a newsletter in Spring 2015.

Representation

Mr Graeme Fletcher is the IESIS representative on the Technical Committee of Lloyds Register.

Other Bodies

The Institution continues to provide secretarial support and office space for meetings to Engineering Scotland, the organisation that produces a combined programme of events for engineering institutions and organisations in Scotland. The Institution continues to support the work of the Primary Engineer, and has been able to give £2000 in sponsorship of engineering kits to schools in Glasgow.

Financial review

The results for the year to 31st July 2015 show a positive outcome. Council wishes to record their thanks to Speirs and Jeffrey for their management of the funds which has increased income from the portfolio in line with Council's request.

Financial Instruments

The company's principal liquid financial assets are its bank balances and investments. The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit ratings assigned by international credit rating agencies. The company does not enter into any derivative financial instruments. The investment portfolio is spread across a range of listed securities.

Risk Management

The Council is advised by its independent financial advisors, Speirs & Jeffrey, who has conducted its own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. External risks have been addressed in the strategic plan, which allows for the diversification and development of activities to mitigate the identified risks. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects to ensure

consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Going Concern

The company has financial resources, both liquid and investments, that can be readily converted to cash. Accordingly, the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005), the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

Subscriptions

Subscriptions, donations, legacies and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All costs have been attributed to one of the functional categories of resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA). The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Equipment - 20% Reducing Balance Fixtures & Fittings - 20% Reducing Balance

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.
