DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their report and the group accounts for the 56 week period ended 23 November 1996

RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

The retained profit after taxation for the period amounts to £7,842,000 (1995 - £99,000).

The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend in respect of the period (1995 – £9,834,861). After exchange differences on retranslation of net assets and results of subsidiary undertakings of £331,000, the retained profit carried forward is £9,792,000 (1995 – £2,281,000).

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND REVIEW OF THE BUSINESS

The group's principal activities during the period continued to be the manufacturing and packing of food products and the marketing, selling and distribution of these and other products to grocery, catering and other outlets. Additionally, the group manufactures thermoformed samples used for promotional purposes.

The operating results for the period ended 23 November 1996 were satisfactory, and the future outlook for the business remains promising.

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

The changes in tangible fixed assets during the period are summarised in note 13. The principal element of tangible asset additions relates to assets acquired as part of the relocation and integration of 'dry' food production activities in Haddenham. This project will continue throughout the current year as noted in note 6 (exceptional item) and note 23 (capital commitments).

EMPLOYEE INVOLVEMENT

The group has continued its policy of providing employees with information on matters of concern to them as employees and has consulted them or their representatives on a regular basis. This has been carried out by divisional management at the group's various locations and by way of group meetings, information bulletins and conferences. Employees participate directly in the success of the business through the group's profit sharing scheme.

DISABLED EMPLOYEES

The group gives full consideration to applications for employment from disabled persons where the requirements of the job can be adequately fulfilled by a handicapped or disabled person.

Where existing employees become disabled, it is the group's policy wherever practicable to provide continuing employment under normal terms and conditions and to provide training and career development and promotion wherever applicable.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

The group has made gifts for charitable purposes amounting to £11,438 (1995 – £9,775) to local charities serving the needs of the community.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

Basis of consolidation

The group accounts consolidate the accounts of McCormick (UK) Plc and all of its subsidiary undertakings for the period ended 23 November 1996. No profit and loss account is presented for McCormick (UK) Plc as permitted under section 230 of the Companies Act 1985.

Cashflow

The group has decided to adopt FRS1 (Revised). Therefore, no group cashflow has been prepared because the accounts of the group's US parent company are publicly available.

Goodwill

Goodwill is the difference between the amount paid on the acquisition of a business and the aggregate fair value of its separate net assets. It is being written off in equal annual instalments through the profit and loss account over its estimated economic life of 20 years.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land and assets in the course of construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value based on prices prevailing at the date of acquisition, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Government grants

Government grants in respect of capital expenditure are credited to a deferred income account and are released to profit over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets, currently ranging from three to eight years, by equal annual instalments.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes direct materials and labour and also those overheads incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less further costs expected to be incurred to completion and disposal.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Foreign currencies

Company

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction or at the contracted rate if the transaction is covered by a forward exchange contract. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date or if appropriate at the forward contract rate. All differences are taken to the profit and loss account.

Group

The accounts of the overseas subsidiary undertaking are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. The exchange difference arising on the retranslation of opening net assets is taken directly to reserves. All other translation differences are taken to the profit and loss account.

Pension costs

The group operates a defined benefit pension scheme, which requires contributions to be made to a separately administered fund. Contributions to this fund are charged to the profit and loss account so as to spread the cost of pensions over the employees' working lives within the group. The regular cost is attributed to individual years using the projected unit credit method. Variations in pension cost, which are identified as a result of actuarial valuations, are amortised over the average expected remaining working lives of employees in proportion to their expected payroll costs. Differences between the amounts funded and the amounts charged to the profit and loss account are treated as either accruals or prepayments in the balance sheet.

Deferred taxation

Deferred taxation is provided using the liability method on all timing differences to the extent that they are expected to reverse in the future without being replaced, calculated at the rate at which it is anticipated that the timing differences will reverse.

Leased assets

Assets held under finance leases and HP contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership have passed to the group, are capitalised in the balance sheet and are depreciated over their useful lives. The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Operating lease rentals are charged to the profit and loss account over the term of the lease.

2. TURNOVER AND SEGMENTAL ANALYSIS

Turnover represents the amounts derived from the provision of goods, including those sold on clients' behalf, and services which fall within the group's ordinary activities, all of which are continuing, stated net of value added tax.
