ADDENDUM TO THE ANNUAL REPORT 1996 RESOLUTIONS TO AMEND THE ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION

AMENDMENT: The Council shall have the power to regulate the manner in which all Entry Fees and Subscriptions shall be paid. If such a subscription remains unpaid on 31 January the Council shall have the power to remove the name of such Member or Associate Member from the Register. Reinstatement shall be at the discretion of the Council on payment of all arrears. Arrears of subscriptions shall be considered a debt due to the Club and the Club shall be entitled to sue for such arrears.

REPORT BY THE DIRECTORS

The directors present their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 1996.

Captain's Report

During 1996 Broomieknowe had the pleasure of hosting the Midlothian Inter-Club Tournament over the last weekend in March, while July saw the Club playing host to the South-east of Scotland Ladies County Championships and a return of professional golf in the shape of the Scottish Region PGA Patron's Club Proam. This is the first professional competition held at the Club since 1975 when the now defunct Coca Cola Tournament was played over Broomieknowe.

Having come through the Junior Section together it gave me special pleasure in presenting the Championship Trophy to Bobby Johnstone who was winning this event for the first time.

There was no team success with the Club losing in the quarter-final of the Edinburgh Summer League to Turnhouse away, while the Junior team was narrowly beaten by Glencorse in their semi-final played over Craigmillar Park. I would thank the respective selectors, Jim Hamilton and Les Wight together with the players for their efforts over the past year.

My thanks go to Hamish Brough, Head Greenkeeper and his staff for their hard work throughout yet another difficult year as regards weather and the general lack of assistance from mother nature. Thanks to John and Marianne Cleary and their staff for the service to Members and visitors over the past year. Joe Williams, the Gardener/handyman has given us the usual high standard of floral displays throughout and his efforts are appreciated. Thanks to our Professional, Mark Patchett and his assistants Jonathan and Richard for their assistance over the past year. November saw the end of an era at the Club with the retiral of Mrs Sheila Dickie after 22 years at Broomieknowe and it was perhaps fitting that Sheila who was welcomed to the Club when my father was Captain, was subsequently seen off by yet another Nimmo. I hope that Sheila leaves with many fond memories of the Club and that she has a long and happy retirement. Work goes on in the office and my thanks to Mrs Avril Mitchell for her efforts over the past year and in particular for the extra work undertaken with the departure of her colleague. My thanks for all the help and advice from the other Office Bearers and Council over the past year perhaps I will listen a bit more in my second year!! The House Convener, Walter Renton, Junior Convener, Les Wight and Match Secretary, Jim Hamilton all retire from Council by rotation and my thanks to them for all their hard work over the past 3 years.

It is always sad to have to report the death of any Member and over the past year the Club has seen the loss of E A Bayne, J Lawrie, J Elder and J Riddell.

Fixtures Convener's Report

It proved to be a difficult year for scoring as the standard scratch score was mainly 70 throughout the year. The best scratch score was 67 in the Open Amateur Tournament.

The Club Championship was won for the first time by Bobby Johnstone. Gordon Miller won the "B" Class and Willie Hendry the "C" Class. Special mention must be made of the exploits of the recently "retired" Joe McDermott who not only won the Seniors Championship but also the Seniors Open later in June. Congratulations to all the other competition winners, especially Rae Watson and Norman Smith who won both the Summer and Winter Foursomes.

The problem area remains the late withdrawals from competitions which are depriving other Members of a game. This situation is being monitored for persistent offenders.

My thanks to all who assisted the Fixtures Team in 1996. Have an enjoyable season in 1997.

Greens Convener's Report

Extensive damage caused during winter months resulted in poor course condition at the start of the season. The main area of concern was the 13th green and this restricted play on the green until the Club Championship. Extensive work carried out on greens 2, 7 8 and 13 in late July appears to have been successful and these greens will be closely monitored during the next 12 months. Drainage work in the bottom field was brought forward to the beginning of July and whilst it caused some disruption, it proved to be the correct decision. Several areas will need attention during the season to provide a complete recovery. The additional drainage to the new holes appears to be reasonably successful and will again be monitored. After consulting Mr A Boyter, several trees have been removed from established plantations to allow hardwood trees to flourish. This will be an ongoing exercise.

Greens Convener's Report (Continued)

Fairway mats were introduced during the winter season and proved to be a great success. This allowed play from normal tees. However, some inconsiderate Members refused to use mats and has resulted in some minor damage. I would appeal to all Members and their guests to repair all pitch marks and rake bunkers as this is a major problem.

House Convener's Report

Improvements to the fabric of the Club funded by the refund of VAT have continued with the refurbishment of the ladies' and juniors' locker rooms. The ladies has been finished in a style similar to that of the gents and has been well received by the Ladies who held an event on 8 March to formally open the locker room.

There has been little other expenditure other than on necessary maintenance, decorating etc in recognition of the rising costs across all budgets. Bar income has reduced by about £13,000 (12% approximately) but we continue to achieve a constant profit level largely due to good terms from our draught suppliers, Maclays and the efforts of the Clubmaster in seeking good value for money on wines and spirits.

Following some problems with the draught beer, the cooling/distribution system was replaced by Maclays at no cost to the Club. They also helped with the identification and supply of the new beverages which were installed at the turn of the year following the installation of the new equipment.

The gaming machines were changed mid year in an attempt to increase usage which has slumped to about 33%. As a result there has been an increase in usage but over the year income has dropped by about £7,000 (30-35%).

In the latter part of the year we have tried to increase usage of the Club by increasing the variations in beverages, bar meals and suppers.

Entertainment events were fewer than in previous years but they were consistently well attended and it is recommended that future events focus on the tried and tested events where a good turnout is assured.

This has been my last year as House Convener and for the latter part I have had to pass responsibility to George Lothian following my move to a new job. I am indebted to him for taking on the post as I am to the House Committee and staff for their unswerving efforts during the year.

Match Secretary's Report

The Summer League proved successful with the Broomieknowe team coming second in their section. Hopes of winning were dashed by losing to Turnhouse in the quarter finals.

Due to other commitments, Jim Hamilton had to retire as Match Secretary prior to the Winter League. Many thanks to Jim for all his efforts.

After losing our first game in the Winter League, Broomieknowe went into an unbeaten run for seven matches then unfortunately lost to Harburn in the penultimate match. At this time Broomieknowe had 13 points, which in past years would have won the League. The final match was cancelled due to bad weather and this left Broomieknowe as the runners up.

It was unfortunate that Broomieknowe could not raise their strongest teams but praise must go to our new younger players who were ably assisted by the more experienced members of the team. A special thanks should go to Bobby Johnstone who as champion led the team well and improved the team spirit.

Let up hope success will be ours next year.

As predicted last year in my report, we qualified for the final stages of the Junior Summer League.

We were undefeated in the League and qualified with maximum points. We won against Lothianburn at home in the Quarter finals, however, lost 4/3 against Glencorse in the Semi-final at Craigmillar Park.

Ratho won the final 4/3. My thanks to the parents and council for their support throughout the Summer League and not forgetting the caddies for their help.

Congratulations to Joe Avent for getting through to the last 16 in the Scottish Boys Championship at West Kilbride in April. Well done also to Ross Thomson and Alan Bradley for representing Broomieknowe at the Championships. The council will always support the Juniors in those events.

Congratulations also go to Ross Thomson for finishing runner-up in the Lothians Junior Order of Merit superb achievement to playing in all the Junior events and some senior events in the summer season.

The highlight of the year in the Junior section is the Junior Championship and the final always produces excitement. This year was no exception, it was a privilege to watch two young golfers battling it out in the final. Alan Bradley overcame Steven Morgan by 4/3 - congratulations Alan.
