#### HOUSE REPORT

This past year has seen a lot of work and inconvenience in the Clubhouse.

We have over the past year re-covered the chairs in the top lounge, refurbished the office and, of course, upgraded the locker room. The positive feed-back from the members has made the efforts of the upgrading worthwhile.

The income from the fruit machines, although poor at the start, recovered a bit nearer the end of the year owing mainly to the new machine. Although the bar sales are up, we would remind members that the more you use the bar, the more chance we have in keeping the fees down.

Our aims for next year are the upgrading of the members' bar, the junior locker room and the re-covering of the wall seats in the top lounge, along with any decoration that may be required.

## **GREENS REPORT**

At last, the long awaited day, 21 May 1994 and the opening of the reconstructed course, arrived and members managed to finally play the new lay-out after some three years of reduced or interrupted play. The general consensus was favourable - golfers were able to address a new range of shots, decisions and even approaches to the new holes. It became very clear initially that, given the immaturity of plantations and rough, many golfers were opting for short-cuts and lines of shots that were potentially dangerous to other golfers playing adjacent holes. For that reason internal out-of-bounds were introduced to protect golfers from danger until plantations have matured and helped reduce or eliminate dangerous shots by blocking out these routes.

## GREENS REPORT (CONTINUED)

Three holes in particular, the 5th, 7th and 9th, appear to have caught the imagination of members, although the 6th is also proving to be an interesting test with some of the longer drives bringing the pond into play from an unforeseen direction. The 9th can be a "Jekyll and Hyde" hole dependent upon wind direction. Presently the 8th requires some backdrop of trees to offer some depth of field for an approach to the green. Once plantations mature and the trees mask off the A7 road it may become a more interesting challenge.

The Lothians Golf Association have been taken by the new lay- out and their Championship has been scheduled to be held in May of this year which is a considerable honour for the Club and for the new course.

To provide a degree of stability to members over the next year, the Green development programme, which incidentally has been posted on all notice boards, will concentrate on relatively cosmetic elements such as levelling tees - especially the 4th, refurbishing and thinning plantations, renewing/repairing paths and clearing up the jungle behind the 4th green towards the 5th hole. Next year when budgets allow, new 5th forward tees will be constructed on both the left hand and right hand side. The present 5th tee is considered inadequate to sustain a full year's play. The three year programme of biennial hollow tining and over seeding has been completed and this process will revert to an annual tining either in Spring or Autumn. The over seeding with bents has given improved putting surfaces over the winter months when much of the annual meadow grass disappears. One issue of real concern which members will be aware of is the apparent amount of surface water appearing on the course, especially on the approach to the 9th This coupled with the known problem of underground springs at the 4th/14th adjacent to the new ditch, at the rear of the 5th green and from the 6th down through the 7th to the 8th tee has influenced the Club to commission a drainage consultant's report on the matter including options for remediation and likely costs. The problem has been exacerbated by an exceptionally wet year, an increase in the water table, possibly caused by the switching off of underground pumping from coal mines, and the discovery of some thirty broken field drains from bygone years. There is suspicion too that the fissure sealing undertaken in creating the foundations of the new A7 may also be acting as a dam to prevent the release of water. There is a commitment, however, to address and cure the problem as soon as possible.

Finally, it is the Green Committee's and the Greenkeeper's intention to continue to maintain and develop the course to the highest standards for members - consistently. The quality of the course has attracted considerable favourable comment from members, guests and visitors over recent years and for that we are grateful to Hamish Brough and his staff for the efforts that they make on our behalf.

#### JUNIORS REPORT

1994 for Broomieknowe Juniors was a reasonably successful year regarding the Summer League in which we qualified to the quarter finals by winning our section with 12 points. In the quarter finals against Turnhouse we were unlucky to lose 4/3 several matches going to the last green. Turnhouse eventually went on to win the Summer League, beating Ratho Park in the finals. Thanks to all who turned out to support the Juniors in all their matches.

To the Juniors who enter the Senior section, W Henderson, R McAlpine, E Bradley and K Wilson, we pass on our good wishes and wish them well in their Senior careers. My thanks to all the Juniors who represented in the Scottish Boys and all the Open competitions. Congratulations to A Bradley on winning the Liberton Boys' Open with a scratch score of 67 and to J Avent on winning the Under 14 Section at Newbattle.

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Accounting Convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Freehold buildings - 2% straight line
Clubhouse furnishings - 10% straight line
Course equipment - 15% straight line
Course watering system - 6.67% straight line

#### Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### **Pensions**

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.
