Report of the Directors

The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2001.

Junior Report

Johnathan, before he left for Egypt, managed to hold two sessions for juniors 12 years and under which Mark will continue this year. We feel the earlier coaching is started the better.

In the Edinburgh Junior League the team played really well in reaching the final. Unfortunately, they lost to Prestonfield. I feel they can do very well this year as we will have the same group of players to contest the league

Greens Report

2001 started with drainage work being completed to the 4^{th} , 6^{th} and 9^{th} fairways, including small drainage work around the 5^{th} green. The work carried out has kept the bottom field a lot drier during the summer months. We still have problems elsewhere on the course. The staff are going to carry out further drainage work during the winter. By the end of the year we could see problems with the other parts of the bottom field which will have to be tackled in the future.

The course itself was maintained to a high standard by the staff which proved Broomieknowe can still be one of the best courses in the Lothians. We thank Hamish and his staff for their hard work throughout the year in all types of weather.

We have planned during the winter to carry out tee levelling work and remedial work to all bunkers. Also, drainage runs off to certain greens which have been ponding during heavy rain. During the excavation of those drains we found that we have a problem with thatching which means the water is not getting through the turf hence the reason we continue with hollow coring of the greens. Most of the members do not like this work as it upsets the putting surfaces but the operation is essential to achieve better drainage.

It is important while playing your game that you leave the hole the way you found it. Therefore, to maintain the course in the condition you would expect you should always rake bunkers, repair pitch marks and replace divots. By following these rules it will also help the greenkeepers and cut down their workload, reducing costs.

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed asses at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Leasing

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.
