STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Scottish Fisheries Museum Limited is a company limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. The governing documents of the organisation are the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The business of the Trust is arranged and managed by trustees with all major policy decisions and strategic development plans being made by them. The Director and managerial team carry out the day-to-day management and organisation.

THE SCOTTISH FISHERIES MUSEUM TRUST LIMITED REPORT BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Trust has an ongoing connection with the Boats Club which maintains, crews and sails the Reaper and White Wing, engaging in outreach work on behalf of the Museum at various events in the United Kingdom. The Chairman of the Boats Club sits on the Board of Trustees and there is also a Board representative on the Boats Club Committee. Appointments to the Board also include one member elected by the Volunteers of the Museum, three members elected by the Members of the Scottish Fisheries Museum, five members (who must be members of the Trust) appointed by the Board and one member each from the Scottish Museum's Council, Fife Council, the University of St Andrews, the Scottish Executive and the Scottish Fishing Industry. All members of the Board of Trustees serve for a period of three years. After one term, a retiring Trustee is eligible for election/appointment to a further term in office and, in exceptional circumstances and as determined by the Board, a Trustee may be eligible for election/appointment for more than two sequential terms in office. The AGM may elect a President and any number of Vice-presidents. Trustee Elections to the Board of Trustees take place at the AGM. Induction and training is dependent on the experience and the needs of each appointment.

The Trust has assessed the major risks in the Business Plan and is satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The central purpose and role of the Scottish Fisheries Museum is to collect, preserve, research, interpret and display the fishing heritage of Scotland.

The major aims of the Trust include the following:

- 1. To be the internationally acknowledged and respected National Fisheries Museum of Scotland
- 2. To be a first class tourist and visitor attraction centre
- 3. To have a reducing reliance on public funded grants
- 4. To be an internationally recognised research centre for Scottish fishing and heritage issues
- 5. To be creating an annually increasing operational surplus fund

The objectives for the year included commissioning consultation work towards the production of a business plan and an interpretation plan. These will combine with work on the visitor profile, audience development and a learning and access assessment to guide our plans for future developments. It is important to relate short-term planned improvements, such as to the tearoom, locating large object storage and the development of 20 East Green, to these plans along with a new Forward Plan.

Developing and maintaining a dynamic programme of exhibitions and events suitable for a wide range of vistiors is always a top priority. The 2010 exhibition programme included 'Mr Darwin's Fishes' (with BRLSI), Fife's 'Fringe of Gold', an exhibition of winning entries to our children's art competition, the superb photographs of Erskine Beveridge in 'Wanderings with a Camera in Scotland' (with RCAHMS), 'Ring-netters' new paintings by Mark l'Anson in collaboration with poet and author Angus Martin and 'Extravagansey!' featuring ganseys from our collection along with the contemporary designs of Annie Shaw. Events ranged from a very successful ShowScotland World War 2 weekend 'We'll Meet Again: Revisit the Home Front', the Model Boats Club exhibition and our second Museum Open Day in conjunction with the first Scottish Coastal Rowing Regatta and 'Pirates Ahoy!', a bigger and better version of our pirate reenactment event in 2008. We were pleased again to be able to host the Annual Buckland Lecture, as well as the Buckland exhibition, and we are grateful to Dr Richard Shelton and the Buckland Foundation for all their assistance with both of these and a continued fruitful partnership.

Curatorial objectives included further enhancing the collection, improving storage facilities and bringing in some more inter-active interpretation to certain galleries. Documentation Assistant Victoria Brown was employed in order to tackle the documentation backlog and, under Jennifer Gordon, ably covered the absence of Linda Fitzpatrick while she was on maternity leave. The curatorial team, with library volunteers Kay Kydland and Marjorie Morrison, continues to deal with the high volume of family history and other enquiries. Alastair Ramsay has carried out sterling work on digitising the large photographic collection and reproducing copies from the collection when ordered. Several secondary school and St Andrews Museum Studies course students undertook museum placements under curatorial supervision, carrying out useful work for the museum as well as gaining valuable experience from our professional staff.

The Museum objectives will be achieved by strategic forward planning, a planned curatorial works programme, by utilising and developing partnerships and by securing external project-based funding. Examples include three MGS grants, Fife Council grants and work on a European Culture funded project with eight European partner museums for a food project on 'A Taste of Europe'. We were pleased to host a successful working meeting by all the delegates in February when there was plenty of opportunity to sample local food, both inside the Museum, thanks to Sheila Taylor and the Boats Club, and at local eating establishments.

The Museum continued to participate and play an active part within the Fife Museums Forum and the Association of Independant Industrial Museums in Scotland (AIIMHS) and STICK (Scottish Transport and Industrial Collections and Knowledge Network). Behind the scenes work continued on health and safety in both the Museum and on board the Reaper. Further work took place on producing business and development plans that will lead to future improvements for visitors in both exhibition areas and facilities. A Visitor Survey was continued and provides interesting information on the current visitor profile to help us target and measure success in attracting new audiences.

Volunteers are key to the running of the Museum; they assist with reception duties, curatorial tasks, running the library and answering enquiries, assisting with guided tours and operating the Boats Club, which crews our sea-going vessels, and the Model Boats Club. It is important to ensure that full support and recognition is given for the invaluable help of all our volunteers. Thanks were due to Jackie Henderson who stepped down from representing their views at Board level and Roger McAslan (Boats Club, shop volunteer, guide and regular presenter of outside talks,) took on the role. A programme of training opportunities and social events took place during the year for staff and volunteers as part of the Museum's workforce development.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Admission income received in the last year was down, to £51,278 (2009 £52,903), as although there was an increase in visitor numbers from 13,957 in the previous year to 15,068 in the year to 31 October 2010, this total includes 2,715 who visited on the free open day. Internally generated income from shop sales also decreased to £51,013 (2009 £53,564), whilst Tearoom sales increased to £72,181 (2009 £70,220).

The Museum has 'Full Accreditation', 'Recognised Collection' designation for the whole collection and four-star VisitScotland status and aims to play a significant national role within the industrial museum sector. Our President, Sir Menzies Campbell MP, has continued to make political representation on our behalf and assist with information on possible areas of funding, for which we are grateful.

The Museum had its first opportunity to apply for Museums Galleries Scotland 'Recognition' grant aid through the research project 'Traditional Skills, New Technology and the Nineteenth Century Scottish Sailing Fishing Fleet', which looked at aspects of the industry in Skye (vernacular boat-building), Portsoy (steam capstans), Montrose (ropeworks) and Largo (net works), as well as helping the setting up of a boat-building partnership with Adam Smith College, a project close to the heart of David Tod who was instrumental in making this happen.

Through the commissioning of the 'St Ayles Skiff by Iain Oughtred for the boat-building project, we can take credit for kick-starting the very successful Scottish coastal rowing project which continues to flourish and grow and generate much publicity. This led to the establishment of the St Ayle's Rowing Club under the Museum banner and mention must be made of the great success of the ladies teams at the 2010 regattas. Another successful 'Recognition' grant bid allowed us to secure funding for significant improvements in 'Security and Sustainablity', including upgrading alarms, installation of CCTV, new display cases, new fire doors, an interpretation plan and a laser-survey of the 'Research'.

We are grateful to Museums Galleries Scotland and the Robertson Trust for continued grant aid to support the Learning and Access post as part of the PLAICE project. Andrea Sayer has made great strides in developing liaison opportunities with schools and creating new resources. We look forward to seeing the benefits starting to come through from this significant new education work. The new post also helped generate interest amongst sclools regarding the 'Reaper' visits to the north Forth former fishing harbours during a week long tour in May, organised by the Boats Club. Jim Main stepped down as Chair of the Boats Club, leaving an excellent legacy of professionalism and team spirit. New chairman John Firn came in with a new range of ideas and experience which will no doubt benefir the Museum as well as the Boats Club.

Scottish Government funding was invaluable and again directed to the Trust through the offices of MGS, although the government 'Think Tank' group, resulting from the Museum Summit in May, will look at the future of funding arrangements. The 'Think Tank' was set up to address the sustainable future of Scotland's industrial museums as one of its four main objectives. The Museum continued its community-based service level agreement with Fife Council and we are most grateful for their three-year funding agreement, which allows better forward planning. Thanks are due to their officers for continued help and advice. Detailed monthly figures for Statutory Performance Indicators were passed to Fife Council for submission to Audit Scotland.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The reserves of the Trust are mainly contained in the land, building and exhibits. It has limited liquid reserves and operates within overdraft facilities when required. Total reserves at the balance sheet date were £1,564,236 (2009 £1,613,044).

The museum has incurred additional salary costs in having a full time educational officer in post for the entire year. The trading deficit for the year, after charging £22,524 of depreciation, was £48,808 (2009 surplus of £5,694). External running expenses grants income for the year consisted of £75,000 from the Scottish Government and £48,996 from Fife Council.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Future plans and key objectives include meeting all the targets set by the Scottish Government within their grant conditions. These include increasing visitor numbers as a result of an improved visitor experience, improved self-generated income and playing an active lead role in the development of the new federation of industrial museums i.e. Industrial Museums Scotland. We will also continue to meet the requirements of Fife Council, including our contribution towards the Community Plan for Fife. A range of activities are planned to ensure these aims are met, including the implementation of the new Business Plan. Work will conclude on the Interpretation Plan and this will feed into developing a vision and a plan for a significant upgrading and development project. New management structures are required to assist staff and to improve communication across the museum. It is hoped to secure funding to make the appointment of a Learning and Access Officer permanent. Work is taking place on exciting and relevant education and outreach programmes, more use by community groups and enhancing and developing the collections and related interpretation for new audiences and it is anticipated that these will show evidence of coming to fruition. It is important to enhance our customer care training and provision, along with visitor facilities, to enable us to work towards five-star tourism status.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2010

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.

1.2 Incoming resources and resources expended

Incoming resources are recognised, net of VAT, when receivable. Life membership subscriptions are recognised when received.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred and include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. Costs which require allocation between different activity categories are apportioned using the method deemed most appropriate. Wages and salaries are allocated on the basis of time spent on each activity. Property-related costs are allocated on the basis of floor area. Further details are provided in note 5.

Governance costs include the general running expenses of the company and consist mainly of those relating to statutory requirements.

1.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Freehold buildings 1% per annum on straight line basis
Computer equipment 33.3% per annum on straight line basis
Exhibits, fixtures and equipment 10% per annum on reducing balance

Boats 10% per annum on reducing balance

1.4 Leasing

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.5 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

1.6 Government grants

Capital grants on capital expenditure are allocated to the Grants Fund and a transfer is made to the General Fund equivalent to the depreciation charge of the assets acquired. Grants of a revenue nature are credited to income in the period in which they are receivable.

3 Funds

The Development Fund is an Endowment Fund for the purposes of funding the Zulu Gallery. A transfer is made to the general fund equivalent to depreciation on assets acquired by development funding.

The Grants Fund is a restricted fund relating to capital grants received for the acquisition of fixed assets. A transfer is made to the General Fund equivalent to the depreciation charge on the fixed assets acquired.

The Life Membership Fund is an unrestricted designated fund for the purposes of accounting for life membership subscriptions. A transfer is made to the general fund equivalent to 10% of the opening fund balance plus any additions during the year.

The General Fund consists of non-designated unrestricted funds.

The heritable property known as St. Ayles, Harbourhead, Anstruther was purchased by Anstruther Town Council from the National Trust for Scotland in 1967 and the Town Council later sold the property to the Scotlish Fisheries Museum Trust Limited at the same price, the date of recording being 29 June 1970.

The Scottish Fisheries Museum Trust Limited then granted a Bond and Disposition in Security in favour of the Town Council for the same amount and this deed is also recorded 29 June 1970. The Bond is now vested in Fife Council as successors to Anstruther Town Council. By a Back Letter granted by the Town Clerk in favour of the Scottish Fisheries Museum Trust Limited, it is agreed that no interest shall be charged upon the loan, nor will the sum be called up unless and until steps have been initiated for the Scottish Fisheries Museum Trust Limited to be wound up voluntarily or otherwise in terms of the Companies Acts.

No value has been included under the heading of Exhibits as shown for those items either donated or loaned to the Museum. The Trustees are unable to put value on these exhibits, but for insurance purposes the total contents of the Museum have been valued at £293,927 (2009 £293,927).
