STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Glasgow Print Studio Limited (GPS) was constituted as a company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland as a charity and has no share capital. It receives financial assistance from Glasgow City Council, Creative Scotland and Esmee Fairbairn Trust.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Board of Directors hold regular meetings to review all aspects of the operation of the charity through consideration of reports from key staff, combined with assistance from consultants in relation to financial and other matters as deemed necessary. Meetings are recorded and Annual General Meetings are conducted in accordance with current legislation covering re-election of Chairperson and Secretary/Treasurer and approval of annual accounts.

The charity ensures that new directors have skills that will complement the existing structure of the Board and has the following procedures to ensure adequate training and induction is given.

New board directors are given a complete set of GPS office papers e.g. previous accounts, memorandum and articles of association, publicity, outline of activities. In addition OSCR guidance on trustee/director responsibilities is provided.

The Chair and a representative of Glasgow Print Studio staff personally meet with the new board directors.

New board members are encouraged to attend the Arts and Business Courses specifically designed for Board Directors, if they have never previously been a member of a Board.

Organisational structure

Sub-committees

Currently GPS has a number of sub-committees:

Finance and General Purposes

This meets on a bi-monthly basis: these meetings are staggered with main committee meetings to provide regular board support to the Directors.

Education

This generally meets on a bi-monthly basis. It provides support to the Education Co-ordinator and helps resource projects requiring additional membership input.

Exhibitions committee

This meets twice a year to plan the annual exhibition programme.

Marketing

This is formed as required for ad-hoc periods to address particular initiatives.

Governance

The Board recognises its responsibility for the governance of GPS, the way the Print Studio is directed and controlled. Its responsibilities include establishing the organisation's strategic aims, providing leadership to put them into effect, overseeing the responsible operation of GPS and reporting to members, our core funders, to OSCR and Companies House. Board directors acknowledge they are each equally accountable for the proper stewardship of GPS and its affairs.

Risk management

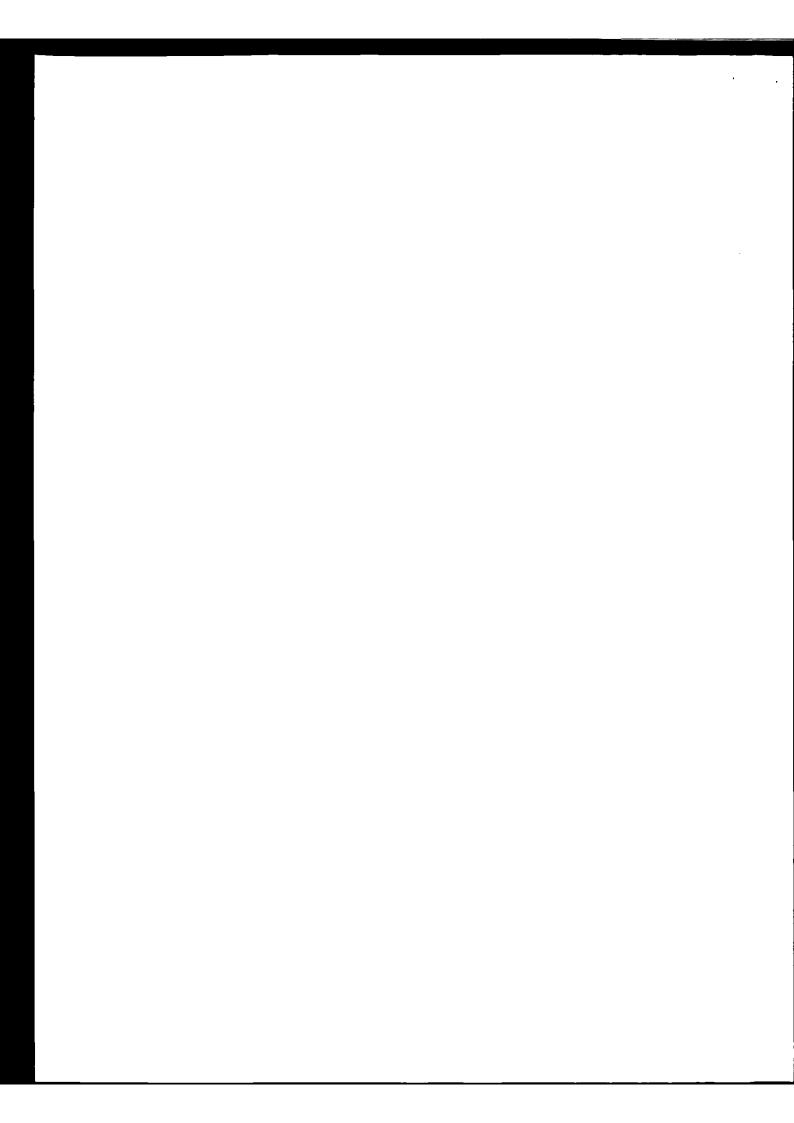

An organisation risk register has now been established; this will be reviewed on a regular basis by the board.

The current objectives of Glasgow Print Studio can be summarised as:

The promotion of excellence and innovation in printmaking, through the work of contemporary artists by practice, education, outreach, exhibitions and sales.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Glasgow Print Studio is one of the largest print workshops in the United Kingdom and is renowned for excellent production facilities and quality products. The Studio is both a custodian of traditional printmaking techniques and an innovator in the adaptation and development of fine art printmaking to meet the demands of cutting edge artistic production.

GPS attracts a flow of visitors from workshops worldwide, learning from us and using us as a model of good practice. GPS exhibitions attract a high number of visitors to its premises at Trongate 103 (T103). Approximately 279 artists were practising members and regularly used the facilities over the course of the financial year. In its excellent new premises, Glasgow Print Studio endeavours to build its profile locally, nationally and internationally. The Studio is also working with partner organisations including Glasgow Life to develop and implement exciting and inclusive strategies that increase the volume and diversity of audiences.

Workshop provision

The workshop provides excellent printmaking facilities and equipment. The staff offer superior technical support to allow ambitious and high quality works to be produced and exhibited nationally and internationally. The workshop has a growing publications and editioning programme for original prints. The Studio works in partnership with local galleries and artists to develop innovative and sophisticated printmaking skills. In its new premises the workshop has seen significant demand from artists wishing to join: the pleasant surroundings, creative environment, excellent equipment and the technical support on offer are a great draw to printmakers. As well as a steady of influx of people new to printmaking from our education streams, we have also focused on providing exceptional customer service supporting professional artists who want to work on an ambitious scale or who would like to use printmaking for a one off project. This policy has resulted in an increase in the variety and number of people using the workshop, ranging from absolute beginners to Turner Prize nominees and winners.

During the year the workshop published work with artists including Elizabeth Blackadder, Ashley Cook, Alasdair Wallace, Eileen Cooper, Ray Richardson, Adrian Wiszniewski, John Byrne and Scott Myles. The workshop editioned works with a number of clients directly and on behalf of the Modern Institute. This included works by Victoria Morton, Hayley Tompkins, Tony Swain, Kate Davies and Scott Myles.

Collaborative initiatives

GPS is a member of the Scottish Print Network that also includes, Edinburgh Printmakers Workshop, Dundee Contemporary Art, Peacock Visual Arts and Highland Printmakers. The network exists to work collaboratively with one another on specific exhibition, residency and marketing initiatives and has achieved funding of £90,000 from Creative Scotland, Creative Futures Fund, to establish an international residency programme with Commonwealth countries.

International presence

GPS has an established presence through participation in events such as Glasgow International Festival and Impact printmaking conference. Some of our members teach, exhibit and participate in overseas conferences. We have a regular dialogue with other printmakers nationally and internationally, and GPS promotes international exchanges and residencies.

Education programme

GPS is the only printmaking organisation in the UK to have a designated education room. Learning is at the core of GPS's work and takes place throughout the organisation, utilising both gallery spaces, professional workshop, Learning Zone, and our new Archive Room. In addition to our own learning programme, we have worked closely with all organisations within the building to develop a coherent joint education programme through the T103 Learning Community.

We deliver talks, demos, workshops and tours to engage with the public and take part in key events including Glasgow International, Merchant City Festival and Inspiration. We have seen a substantial increase in families, young and older people visiting.

The evening and weekend class programme offers opportunities for beginners and artists in need of a refresher course to work with established printmakers to learn the necessary skills to use the facilities independently. Intermediate Classes enable printmakers to improve their skills, increase professional practice and confidence building. Master classes for experienced and accomplished printmakers have been introduced.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Monothon event involved 14 artists producing work across a day with 50 visitors in attendance. A movie of the event can be viewed on the Glasgow Print Studio website.

During the year GPS has worked with schools across Glasgow delivering printmaking sessions in the GPS workshop and as outreach in the schools. Tinto Primary produced a series of screenprints and monoprints on display in the foyer of their school. Hyndland Secondary produced screenprints as part of a heritage trail project.

Specialist Print Archive

Our Print Archive is a resource documenting and holding examples of more than 39 years of contemporary printmaking in Scotland. This facility is still being developed with additional items being catalogued and new publications being accessioned. During the year a number of GPS workshop members donated examples of their work.

Twelve prints were lent to the National Galleries of Scotland for inclusion in the Elizabeth Blackadder exhibition.

Internships have helped with digitising new material and the archive website has been very successful in attracting online visitors.

Fundraising Activities

Retail gallery

GPS has a unique selling point in that the products are made on site. The gallery itself is unique in Glasgow as it specialises in fine art prints. Print sales are important to the company in that they generate not only income to GPS but also for Scottish artists. In the year to March 2012 GPS contributed financially to Scotland's artists through Artist share of sales and also Prints bought for resale; our work continually bolsters the Art Market in Scotland. GPS is involved in the promotion and development of Own Art, an innovative scheme opening up the art market to new buyers. In partnership with Own Art and the leading online cultural product retailer Culture Label, GPS allows buyers not only to purchase online but to purchase using interest free loans

GPS & Glasgow's Merchant City

GPS was the initiator of First Thursday, an extremely popular monthly event at Trongate 103, with visitor figures each month averaging 200. First Thursday has widened the audience for both the Studio and other arts organisations, the event has also benefited the wider Merchant City economy. GPS participates in the Merchant City Festival. This event has been successful in promoting and raising awareness of the resources and activities available to the general public by the visual arts community in T103.

External funding

GPS enjoys continued core funding support from Creative Scotland. This status is valuable to GPS and a three year funding agreement is in place through to financial year 2014/15. This investment in GPS by the government funding body demonstrates our perceived value as a national leader for art in Scotland and beyond. In the year to March 2012 £141,400 was received in core funding from Creative Scotland.

GPS also received core funding of £51,000 as well as other substantial support from Glasgow City Council.

Staffing

Staffing levels in 2011/12 were:

Full-time: 6 Fixed term: 1 Sessional: 15 (including tutors)

Part-time: 3 Interns / Work Experience: 8

GPS has a formal Intern Programme. This gives opportunities to work across the organisation, from marketing and workshop to education and the Archive. The intern programme has enabled us to introduce people with a range of experience to the organisation, and in return provide a structured six month placement with supervision and guidance. Interns are encouraged to participate fully in all aspects of GPS and gain new skills in their own areas of specialisation and through the printmaking courses we offer. We ensure that they gain valuable experience to enhance their CVs; several of our interns have moved on into employment.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

GPS participated in the Government funded Community Jobs Scotland Scheme, administered through SCVO, which allowed us to employ a Workshop Assistant and a Front of House/Admin Assistant. The two staff members employed were supported by GPS throughout their period of employment to ensure they received any necessary training. They attended courses run by GPS as well as by outside organisations, ranging from etching to first aid, to improve their prospects of employability after the end of their employment with GPS.

The Membership

Our members are at the heart of the organisation. Members are invited to participate in all aspects of GPS and five Board Directors are active, printmaking members. For example, in response to their requests, we have increased the range of classes we run to include more specialist classes and we invest heavily in the promotion of members' artwork.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

Total reserves held by the charity at the balance sheet date are £126,528 (2011 £121,381).

It is the policy of the charity to maintain the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ("the free reserves") at a level sufficient to support the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in income. The trustees are currently deciding on what that amount should be. At present the charity has £34,200 free reserves and will continue to seek and apply for additional sources of funding to ensure that there is sufficient unrestricted income to continue to fulfil its objectives and aims.

Major activities in 2011/12

Our new premises continue to be a resounding success, providing much improved access and an inviting face to the public; They have facilitated much improved delivery of educational activities, and provide the appropriate infrastructure to support the print archive. The galleries and shop are now firmly re-established, and receiving acclaim as part of a bright 'new light' in an area of Glasgow still being developed by Glasgow City Council. Sales remained generally difficult in the current financial climate, however, GPS managed to increase sales on the previous year. This was mainly through exceptional sales in respect of a few artists. Its is hoped this can be maintained in the current year. GPS continues to promote sales through the shop, which is now fully integrated with the rest of the organisation, and by taking part in selected art fairs. However, the organisation is well aware of what is currently a rather hostile environment for a 'luxury' product.

The new, well designed workshop facilities have attracted a growing membership; the organisation is generally a busy place. However, GPS continues to review its role and financial stability. The Business Planning process initiated in 2011 has been taken forward with a rolling Development Plan in place for 2012-2015.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Priorities 2012/13 and beyond

Glasgow Print Studio will continue to innovate and find creative ways to facilitate investment in talent, high quality production and audiences, access and participation; helping Scotland's creative economy and Glasgow's reputation as a creative place.

Our Business Plan is underpinned by three strategic aims:

- To be Scotland's centre of Excellence for Printmaking
- To be a champion and leader in the development and promotion of Scottish Printmaking
- To be at the heart of Glasgow's cultural offer, providing vibrant local learning events and helping build Glasgow's reputation as a cultural tourism destination.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Glasgow Print Studio Ltd for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Where possible expenditure is allocated directly to an activity.

Items of expenditure which contribute to more than one activity are apportioned on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Support costs which are not attributable to a single activity but rather provide the organisational infrastructure that enables output producing activities to take place are allocated on the same basis as expenditure incurred directly in undertaking an activity.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 10% to 25% straight line Items under £500 are not capitalised.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Stock includes artists prints, the cost of which is calculated by reference to the original cost of production with due allowance for obsolete and slow moving stock.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Operating leases
