The Directors present their annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2012.

#### Structure & Governance

Sacro is a company limited by guarantee (SC086651) and is registered as a Scottish Charity (SC016293). The management of the Company is the responsibility of a Board of Directors, who are elected by the members in general meeting, under the terms of the Articles of Association.

Directors are invited onto the Board from people who have relevant experience and expertise and a commitment to furthering the aims and objectives of Sacro. An induction programme of information, meetings with senior staff, and visits to services are arranged for each new Director.

Every member of the Company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Company in the event of its being wound up while he is a member, or within one year after he ceased to be a member, such amount as may be required not exceeding £5.

Day to day management is delegated to the Chief Executive, and senior managers responsible for Operations and Corporate Services.

### Objectives - Strategic Plan 2012-15

The Strategic Plan was reviewed during 2011/12 and launched at the March 2012 Board meeting.

Sacro's mission per the Strategic Plan 2012-15, is to be a community-based organisation that will create safe and cohesive communities by reducing conflict and offending.

Sacro's vision is for a safer Scotland, able to resolve conflict constructively and to deal effectively with offending and its consequences. To achieve this, the strategic priorities for Sacro are:

- (1) **direct provision of services -** with a focus on core services which meet the needs of and support our priority client groups;
- (2) outcome evaluation, monitoring and research of all our services to inform and provide evidence for all that we do;
- (3) **influencing policy, practice and legislation** where our priorities will be activities which chime with our principles:
- (4) meeting high standards of organisational governance and management across all Board, operational and supporting activities

### Achievements during 2011/12

Below are detailed some of the key achievements during 2011/12 that demonstrate the positive progress being made with relevance to the strategic plan:

# Direct provision of services

- Sacro provides 65 services in 22 locations throughout Scotland.
- Sacro has adopted services within a whole systems approach to Youth Justice in Aberdeen, to promote early and effective intervention.
- Sacro's Restorative Justice Transitions and Assertive Outreach services, both shortlisted for Howard League Community Programmes awards 2012.
- The Willow service, delivered in partnership by NHS Lothian, City of Edinburgh Council and Sacro, was identified as an excellent example of effective intervention and a "recommended model of service design" by Scottish Government-led Commission on Women Offenders.
- The Aberdeen Youth Justice Development Programme (YJDP)-wins-major-awards-at-Herald-Society Awards and Scottish Policing Awards. Sacro is a key partner in YJDP.
- UNICEF identifies Sacro's Fife Peer Mediation service as a prerequisite for local schools in obtaining its Rights Respecting Schools/Communities award.
- Womans mentoring services were established in Glasgow, Lanarkshire and Fife.
- Homeless Supported Accommodation and Young People's Supported Accommodation services delivered in Elgin, Moray as result of successful competitive tender.

# Outcome evaluation, monitoring and research

- Final evaluation reports on "Aberdeen Whole Systems Approach, Community Payback Orders and Perth Youth Justice" were published.
- Final report published on Scottish Government-led "Time to be Heard" forum into cases of historical institutional abuse. Sacro delivered a Restorative Justice service as an integral part of the process.
- Performance Improvement Model (PIM) self assessment tool rolled out to all Sacro services.
- National Support Manager post created to oversee Research and Evaluation.
- New collaborative post graduate research support established to Scottish Centre for Criminal Justice Research.

### Influencing policy, practice and legislation

- Sacro annual lecture given by Terry Waite MBE.
- Cabinet secretary for justice, Kenny MacAskill MSP visited staff and service users at Sacro's Edinburgh criminal justice services.
- Sacro represented at Scottish Government working group on Intensive Support Programmes.
- Sacro's Chief Executive is chair of Criminal Justice Voluntary Sector Forum.
- Significant Sacro presence at Association of Directors of Social Work conference to showcase Sacro services.
- Evidence given to Commission on Women Offenders.
- Sacro hosted seminars on the subjects of Women Offenders, Substance Misuse, Whole Systems Approach and Youth Justice with Scottish Consortium on Crime and Criminal Justice.
- Evidence given to Scottish Government Justice Committee relating to the Offensive Behaviour at Football and Threatening Communications (Scotland) Bill, and prison population and community sentencing.

# Meeting High Standards of Organisational Governance and Management

- Sacro employs 92 full-time, 81 part-time and 136 sessional staff in addition to 109 volunteers.
- IT strategy initiated to develop IT infrastructure and communication throughout organisation.
- New process developed to ensure swift and more detailed reporting of significant incidents and accidents across Sacro services.
- Sacro Strategic Plan for 2012-2015 launched.
- Review of board effectiveness including induction program for board members.
- Strategic review of philanthropic funding sources.
- National Support Manager post created to oversee Change and Quality.
- Learnpro on line learning system sourced and rolled out to whole organisation.

Continuous improvement has always been a cornerstone of Sacro's operational delivery. Ensuring Sacro meets the requirements of stakeholders is crucial to successful service delivery and this year, Sacro has worked to enshrine this culture of improvement in all activities by implementing a performance improvement framework. This will become increasingly important as services are expected to deliver ever more effective and efficient against financial constraints.

The way new and existing contracts are negotiated has changed markedly this year, with the traditional approach of negotiating directly with funders being steadily replaced by competitive tendering.

### Risk-

The Board approved a review conducted by the Audit Committee of the major risks of which the charity is aware and of the systems in place to mitigate those risks. Where appropriate, actions required to strengthen the existing systems and procedures have been identified and instigated. Progress will be monitored against the timetable agreed. An annual review of the major risks faced by the charity and the systems and procedures in place to deal with those risks will be undertaken by the Board.



### **Equal opportunities**

Sacro's key value of promoting equality of opportunity, acknowledges that all staff irrespective of gender, sexual orientation, race, religion, national origin, disability, age or offending background are entitled to work in an environment free from discrimination, intimidation, bullying or harassment. In line with its responsibilities under the Equality Act [2010], Sacro will not tolerate or condone any form of discrimination, bullying or harassment.

- Sacro will make every effort to prevent discrimination or other unfair treatment against any of its staff or service users.
- All staff will be given equality of opportunity in all aspects of recruitment, employment, training and career development.
- All staff are responsible for their own behaviour and it is incumbent upon all staff to ensure that they comply with the policies and procedures within Sacro and to highlight any instances where discrimination or harassment takes place.

### Reserves policy

The Directors have considered the requirement for General Reserves that are not designated for specific purposes or otherwise committed. In doing so they have considered the need for adequate working capital in services that have little or no reserves. They have also considered the resources necessary for National Office to deliver management and support services. The reserves policy has been agreed taking into account three months running costs that is considered necessary to arrange an organised closure of a service should funding be withdrawn. Unrestricted reserves excluding pension deficit at 31 March 2012 amounted to £1.4 million and this is considered sufficient to meet the anticipated requirements, although a watchful brief will be kept on this.

### Pension reserve

Following the implementation of FRS17 these financial statements include the impact of the most recent valuation of the Pension fund. Sacro commissioned a review of the actuarial assumptions used for the pension valuation by independent pension advisors. The revised actuarial assumptions more accurately reflect Sacro's position, and have been used in the pension valuation as at 31 March 2012 by the pension actuary. The pension fund liability of £132,000 as at 31 March 2011 has increased by £233,000 to now show a liability of £365,000 at 31 March 2012.

### Financial review

The principal sources of funding were grants and contracts with local authorities and the Scottish Government.

The Income and Expenditure Account reports a surplus of £401,391 for net incoming resources in the year, which compares to a surplus of £2,056,232 in 2011. The trading surplus, which excludes the impact of FRS17, is £114,391 for 2012 (2011 trading surplus of £176,232).

The financial environment in which Sacro operates remains challenging, and the organisation continues to adapt rapidly to its changing circumstances. Sacro has undergone a significant period of transformation over the past two financial years, designed to increase competitiveness and enable services to demonstrate their effectiveness against clearly defined performance criteria linked to outcomes. The 2012/13 financial year presents further challenges to Sacro but the actions taken during 2011/12 ensures Sacro is well placed to respond.

Sacro appreciates the support of its approximately 100 volunteers, who are mainly involved in the following activities:

- Mediation
- · Prison visiting transport
- · Prisoner and families of prisoner support
- Supported accommodation
- · Youth justice

### Connected charity

On 10 October 1994, the Board of Directors approved a Trust Deed setting up the Sacro Trust. The Trustees comprise ex-officio the Chairperson, Treasurer, Board Member and nominated Trustees. Trust assessors are appointed by the Trustees from National Office staff and Sacro Services. The affairs of the Sacro Trust are examined independently from those of the Company. The contact address is the same as the registered office of Sacro.

### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of Sacro for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practise).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of Sacro and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of Sacro for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any
  material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that Sacro will continue in business.
- · observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of Sacro and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

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- a) there is no relevant audit information of which Sacro's auditors are unaware; and
- b) the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

We have audited the financial statements of Sacro for the year ended 31 March 2012 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Summary Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and related notes set out on pages 7 to 18. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practise).

# 1. Accounting policies

### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention (as modified by the revaluation of investments), and are in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting By Charities (SORP 2005).

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

# Income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods;
   or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

#### **Pensions**

During the year, payments were made to a defined benefit scheme, Strathclyde Pension Fund, and also to a personal pension plan. The cost of pension contributions is charged to the income and expenditure account and Statement of Financial Activities in the year to which it relates.

# **Taxation**

The company is a charitable company within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the company is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

# **VAT**

The company is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure includes VAT where appropriate.

### **Legal Status**

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £5.



### Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all fixed assets from the year of acquisition at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation less estimated residual value of each asset evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Office equipment - 3 years

The acquisition of any single item with a purchase price of over £5,000 including VAT will be capitalised and depreciated in line with the above policy. This is with the exception of expenditure of a capital nature that has been directly funded in a specific period which will then be expensed through the same accounting period.

#### **Definition of funds**

Unrestricted funds comprise: designated funds, which have been set aside by the Directors to fund specific future projects in the furtherance of Sacro's objectives; and the general reserve. Restricted funds are funds subject to specific restrictions imposed by the donor or funding authority. Where services have closed with surplus funds and these are not going to be clawed back by the funder, these surpluses have been transferred from restricted funds to unrestricted funds.

### Operating leases

Lease payments under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

# Resources expended

Resources expended are charged directly to charitable activities or governance costs as appropriate. Where it is not possible to attribute costs directly, they are allocated on a basis appropriate to the nature of the expenditure. Support costs are allocated in proportion to income of each project or service.

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to
  reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others

## 14 FRS 17 Pension Adjustment

The pension is reported as a liability of £365,000 in the Balance Sheet at 31 March 2012 compared to a liability of £132,000 at 31 March 2011
