OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Fablevision's remit is to support sustainable cultural development (Cultural Planning) in Scotland.

Fablevision and Cultural Planning

In partnership with a variety of public private and voluntary sector organisations in Scotland and Europe, Fablevision's commitment to cultural planning spans three decades.

Now entering our 40th year, the charity has been testing the cultural planning model within different policy contexts since inception in 1984. Early policy areas focussed on disability and social inclusion leading to the launch of Birds of Paradise (now itself spanning more than two hugely successful decades). Since then, interventions in social policy areas include intercultural understanding, health and education to regeneration, place making heritage, public space, jobs, training, education and employment. These experimental interventions with artists and creative processes are always geographically rather than sectorally located, working with grass roots partners and linking with academic studies as well as local and international policy contexts.

In 21/22, our practice was severely impacted by the twin economic shocks of Brexit and Covid-19 which reflected in our turnover for the year. 22/23 has been a year of learning to adapt and thrive in a post Brexit landscape with new, models of international partnership working and locally based blended digital and physical manifestations in our case study models of practice.

2022/23 work has been located in Paisley which is now our official address with continuing commitments to working in Govan where partnerships with Govan Docks Regeneration Trust, Clyde Docks Preservation Initiative and UWS have facilitated working practices.

In Paisley our partners have primarily been with Creative Renfrewshire, NHSGGC, UWS and local community initiatives like Tapestry of Renfrewshire and RWH1697. The Erasmus funded project called BridgingDigital which experimented with the support digital media can offer to community aspirations worked locally with UWS students and their practice at Dunure in Ayrshire as well as Renfrewshire Witch Hunt 1697 who pivoted online since pandemic restricted live walks, talks and performances and are now operating a blended approach with their new QR coded walk at the Gallows Green. BridgingDigital happened in the frame of a European Erasmus project led by Sweden and involving Poland, Greece and ourselves and was highly acclaimed. BridgingDigital was awarded a best practice award from the European Union. (https://www.facebook.com/photo/?fbid=340717888476573&set=a.176231984925165). Sadly, this was to be the last Erasmus programme that Fablevision will be eligible to fully partner.

For the year ended 31 March 2023

Throughout Renfrewshire, a project called Woven in Renfrewshire is commencing. Building on the work of Woven in Govan, Woven in Renfrewshire will engage 4 Renfrewshire based artists to gather stories of undervalued carers (mainly women) and respond to them with pop up installations and a final exhibition in the Royal Alexandra Hospital. It will launch with a taster exhibition in the hospital and a series of workshops/events. Funded locally by Creative Scotland, the Heritage Fund, Foundation Scotland and Renfrewshire's Culture, Heritage and Events fund, the international network continues to be led by Platform Tu in who, Ukraine in spite of devastation to their cultural centre in Mariupol partners have managed to continue to operate the website. (http://wovenart.works/). We are again invited to deliver a week in the Scottish Parliament, allowing us to contribute to the consultation process around the development of a National Care Service.

Contracting Services

During 2022/2023, Fablevision contracted the services of appropriately qualified artists and cultural planners as well as financial and business development personnel to take care of business/project development, administration and finance.

Trading arm, Fablevision Studios (now StudioFV)

Our wholly owned subsidiary sister Company Limited by Shares (which has an asset lock and the charity as the sole shareholder) was established in 2009 to provide services and sustainable income for charity project development. It has now rebranded with a view to a new constitution and independent SCIO status during 2024. An application is now lodged with OSCR to move this forward to the benefit of all parties. The Charity continued in 2022/23, to contract StudioFV to deliver administrative services for the charity as an annual Service Level Agreement. In addition, StudioFV are contracted to deliver ad hoc learning programmes for people with long term conditions/long term unemployed as well as technical support, film, event management, and web/social media on all the charity projects. With a prominent position in the social enterprise world, its vision and ethos aligns with the charity in its commitment to provide apprenticeship model work experience for long term unemployed/people with longterm conditions who are unable to gain a foothold in the jobs market. The Fablevision board therefore, will continue to operate in close partnership with the new StudioFV (SCIO) going forward.

Public Benefit

The trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'. Fablevision benefits from in kind support in many areas, from local/national and international networks and partners to businesses who donate materials, equipment and other consumables.

Volunteer Investment

There are armies of volunteers who assist on projects from students on placement, volunteers on projects, artists who give consultancy and development time as well as the voluntary management committee and committees on various projects. Brexit has impacted our ability to attract interns from other countries, however and 2022/23 has been the first in our history where we have had zero placements from European partners.

Funding

Fablevision has attracted investment from several funding bodies towards activities again this year: including Creative Scotland, Renfrewshire Council, Heritage Lottery, and Foundation Scotland.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Significant activities include the successful completion and reporting on the Creative Scotland and Heritage Lottery funded Woven in Govan project which has levered funding for the new project, Woven in Renfrewshire. Woven Network activities have attracted significant press and media coverage throughout the year and developed many new, fruitful partnerships (including the NHSGGC with its new exhibition spaces, the Art Department in the Paisley Centre and National Care organisations).

Other significant activities include the Best Practice award for Bridging Digital which hosted a week of visits and seminar events with European guests in early March 2023.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

New European initiatives are still possible with third country status and a new collaboration building on the success of Memory of Water will be called Turning the Tide.

Locally, our work, going forward will continue initiatives started in Renfrewshire and Govan.

In Renfrewshire, we deliver services from our Paisley Centre home in partnership with StudioFV in support of long term unemployed/people with long term conditions as well as supporting the development of local third sector cultural organisations through Creative Renfrewshire (which our Director, Liz Gardiner co-chairs). We will continue to directly support the work of Renfrewshire Witch Hunt. with Renfrewshire Tapestry (an initiative involving creative groups focussed on textiles to create a Renfrewshire Tapestry on the scale of the great Tapestry of Scotland) and UWS.

In Govan, we will continue our partnership Govan Docks Regeneration Trust (GDRT) in support of the initiative to preserve the historic docks for the future.

Strathclyde wide, we will continue our Clyde-wide support for Clyde Docks Preservation Initiative (CDPI): in particular through its latest venture, Turning the Tide on the Clyde, a mapping and celebration of the assets of the River Clyde. Both GDRT and CDPI will be partners in the new European collaboration called Turning the Tide.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves

Fablevision Trustees aim to retain adequate reserves to cover a minimum of three months of core operating costs. As this financial year coincided with the period of recovery from the Covid19 pandemic, reserves were severely eroded at the start of the financial year.

In spite of no longer having access to Covid19 Recovery funding and in spite of Brexit, we have managed to maintain our projects and services and are building back towards previous levels of activity and turnover

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. A formal risk policy is in place, approved by the Board, covering operational risk management, disaster management and business continuity. The review processes necessary to keep it updated are being implemented.

For the year ended 31 March 2023

Principal funding sources

The core operation is funded by fees earned from our trading arm, StudioFV and partners, as well as fees from projects and donations from the general public coming into Unit 24 in the Paisley Centre. The importance of diversifying our income streams cannot be understated in such uncertain times. We will continue to develop income in three main strands: charitable foundations, project by project funding, and by continuing to invest in the people and services offered by StudioFV where operational surpluses will generate donations to the Charity until formal separation of the two organisations.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. With a focus on developing cultural interventions in collaboration with various community partners, we remain committed to providing training and employability opportunities for (primarily but not exclusively) unemployed/people with long term conditions, Fablevision continues to operate an appropriate social enterprise model for the delivery of its mission. The Fablevision Charity ensures that partners and our trading arm (StudioFV) share ethics and values.

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021.
