CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The future of Inverness and Nairn depends upon nurturing existing businesses, encouraging enterprise, attracting inward investment and enabling all parts of the area to realise their full potential.

In many cases, the constraints on these have nothing to do with the availability of finance or the quality of our workforce. We had, for example, expressed concern that the capacity of Inverness to broaden its business base was being threatened by a lack of zoned land. However, the rapid development of the 'Golden Mile' to the east of Inverness, is now opening up West Seafield for the creation of a new business park. Further sites have become available on the Longman with the completion of the road linking the harbour with the new football stadium.

As we prepare to launch an inward investment campaign targeted at the healthcare sector, the area's profile and facilities assume particular significance in helping us to compete with other major centres. That is why Inverness Caledonian Thistle's promotion to Division Two of the Scottish Football League, and the opening of the Inverness aquadome, should not be under-valued. They focus attention on the area and give us long-overdue facilities.

Nairn's profile is improving as local businesses respond to the Nairn Initiative, reversing decline and reestablishing the town as a busy and confident place. Much credit is due to INE director, Jimmy Asher, who led the initiative from 1994 to March of 1997.

While all parts of our area benefit from the performance of its key towns, some rural communities face continuing constraints on growth and opportunities. Our policies and programmes address these constraints, particularly in strengthening the resolve and ability of communities to tackle specific development problems.

The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 1997.

RESULTS

The net expenditure for the year, after taxation, amounted to £116,763.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY, REVIEW OF THE BUSINESS AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The principal activity of the company is to operate as a local enterprise company under an annual renewable operating contract with Highlands and Islands Enterprise. Under this contract the company delivers economic and social development and training services within the Inverness and Nairn area and aims to fully utilise its annual operating budget.

The working year

A recurring theme of our evolving strategies for the expansion of the Inverness and Nairn economy is the linkages between a variety of initiatives, and the relationships we have forged with a series of public and private interest to help achieve them.

This is particularly evident in the development of our Technology and Healthcare Initiative. Launched in the spring of 1996, it developed from the realisation of the importance of the healthcare sector to the local economy and clear opportunities for further economic growth.

Spearheading the initiative is the Highland Healthcare Partnership, led by INE and backed by a strong group of key players which includes Raigmore Hospital NHS Trust, Highland Communities NHS Trust, the Highland Health Board, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, the Highland Council, the University of the Highlands and Islands, Inverness College and the Highland Psychiatric Research Group.

Inverness Medical - the inward investment by the American company Selfcare Inc which is making excellent progress towards its expected staff complement of almost 400 - provided dramatic evidence of the potential. The Highland Healthcare Partnership has now identified a number of new opportunities in healthcare, and the related field of biotechnology, which offer prospects for building on this success.

One of the most exciting projects involves the ongoing work of the Highland Psychiatric Research Group, a groundbreaking unit based at Craig Dunain Hospital which is funded by Government bodies and Scotia Pharmaceuticals, the multinational drugs firm. In pioneering work on schizophrenia, the group is helping to develop a new treatment for the illness using tailor-made compounds of fatty acids. The Highland Healthcare Partnership now aims to boost the work of the group by re-housing them in INE's proposed Business Technology Centre at Beechwood, adjacent to Raigmore Hospital and Inverness Medical.

The Business Technology Centre will stimulate the growth of new start businesses by providing workspace for technology-based enterprises. Assistance packages will combine grants, loans, property, training and guidance to help new companies through the formation process. The centre will create a focus for research which will enhance the reputation of the Highlands and Islands as one of the most enterprising and appealing places in the UK for companies involved in this modern and fast-moving industry.

Science and technology-based industries will underpin future wealth generation and the long term prosperity of Inverness and Nairn, and the Highlands and Islands as a whole. A pre-requisite is greater understanding and involvement in science, particularly by young people. To develop this linkage, we are working to establish a Science Centre in Inverness, creating a platform for the promotion of science and technology within the Highland community, and particularly within the education and business sectors.

The University of the Highlands and Islands, which will remove a major brake on progress caused by the lack of higher education facilities, offers another important link to the Technology and Healthcare Initiative. Its development of high-level research facilities, for example, could make a major contribution to the successful attraction and expansion of technology-based enterprises, as well as boosting the quality of the Inverness and Nairn workforce and raising the long-term aspirations of the area.

Co-operating with a variety of public and private organisations to achieve these aspirations was not confined to the Technology and Healthcare Initiative. In the last year we have forged and extended a range of relationships with organisations which make vital contributions to the economic health and welfare of Inverness and Nairn. As a result, we have achieved considerable progress in our strategic objectives of Growing Businesses, Developing People and Strengthening Communities.

The Highland Council plays a particularly important role in every aspect of life and work in the area. The new aquadome opened in Inverness in the spring of 1997 is a perfect example of co-operating between our two organisations. INE funding for the council-led project has produced high quality indoor leisure facilities - at least equalling the best available in other parts of the country - which benefit the Inverness and Nairn community and add a significant attraction to our tourism infrastructure.

The development of a find new stadium for Inverness Caledonian Thistle Football Club - and associated road improvements which will open up further industrial land at the Longman - is another example of a highly successful multi-agency partnership. By working together, the football club, the former Inverness District Council and INE have released the full potential of Inverness on the Scottish sporting scene - potential clearly demonstrated by the club's promotion to the Second Division of the Scottish Football League.

As the tourism industry demonstrates signs of steady recovery, INE is working with various agencies to ensure that the ensuing economic gains continue to grow. We are making a strong contribution to the activities and ambitions of the Highlands of Scotland Tourist Board (HOST), whose work is of the utmost importance to securing the future of a vital industry.

Inverness Airport is a key element in tourism's continuing expansion. New London services by Air UK and easyJet have attracted new customers, stimulated more frequent trips and produced substantial increases in traffic.

Europeans are demonstrating a strong and rising interest in enjoying the unspoiled nature of the Highlands and Islands. Consequently, direct air charters from continental Europe to Inverness present major opportunities for building new business. To tap this potential, INE joined with Highlands and Islands Airports and The Highland Council to launch a marketing exercise to attract up to 10 new charter services over the next year or so. We achieved our first success when Swiss operator Falcon Travel announced a weekly charter service from Zurich to Inverness from May to September of 1997.

We assisted a series of hotel developments - in Nairn, Auldearn, Fort Augustus and Foyers - which will help deliver the quality facilities demanded by the charter market. Facilities such as these will help the area to offer the standards of service and value for money which will encourage return visits and prepare the way for more continental air charters. The Welcome Host and Scotland's Best programmes continue to help local businesses to improve the quality of their services to visitors.

As the football stadium and the aquadome give Inverness - still one of the fastest growing towns in the country -the infrastructure such a substantial Scottish community deserves, other developments have finally been triggered to add to this infrastructure and help the town's growth well into the next millennium.

Retail stores now under construction on the 'Golden Mile', to the east of Inverness, will generate considerable economic growth in themselves. The opening up of the West Scafield area will also bring an important bonus through a 40 acre business park, which will offer quality sites for new high-tech enterprises. Plans were also announced during the year for the creation of another business park at Milton of Leys.

We took considerable strides in building the knowledge, information and telecommunications sector which is essential to a growing and modern economy. Cap Gemini led with the creation of a new teleservice centre on the Longman Industrial Estate which will employ 120 people.

Our strengthened Investors in People team made excellent progress during the year, with 48 commitments and 11 recognitions. IIP a standard which builds stronger and more successful companies, continues to be one of our main business development tools.

Businesses in Nairn have demonstrated a heartening response to the Nairn Initiative, which is supported by a variety of district and local agencies and organisations. Environmental improvements to shops continue through Facelift while businesses combined their efforts to introduce Nairn 1st Choice, a retail loyalty scheme which rewards local people for shopping locally. The town is now well on the way to recovering its previous reputation for offering a special shopping experience.

In addition to the amounts dealt with in the enterprise's own income and expenditure account the enterprise's efforts and initiatives resulted in additional expenditure of £387,188 (1996 - £4,556,763) in the Inverness and Nairn area. This is dealt with in the accounts of Highlands and Islands Enterprise. The significant decrease compared to the prior year relates to funding in the prior year given to Inverness Medical Limited by Highlands and Islands Enterprise, totalling £3.6million. Similarly, Inverness and Nairn Enterprise provided funding of £2.6million to Inverness Medical Limited. The latter balance being recognised in the prior year's accounts of Inverness and Nairn Enterprise.

FIXED ASSETS

During the year the company invested £28,387 in equipment as detailed in note 9 to the accounts. As detailed in note 10 to the accounts, a total of £85,000 was invested in loans and shares during the year before £1,114 was provided in respect of a diminution in the value of loan and share investments.

DIRECTORS AND THEIR INTERESTS

The directors of the company during the year ended 31 March 1997 were those listed on page 2. Each of the directors is a member of the company and undertakes in the event of the company being wound up to contribute to the assets of the company such amount as may be required, not exceeding £1.

At the annual general meeting of the company A G Sellar, P A Thorn and E A Fraser retire by rotation, and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

DIRECTORS' AND OFFICERS' LIABILITY INSURANCE

During the year the company purchased and maintained liability insurance for its directors and officers as permitted by section 310(3) of The Companies Act 1985.

A resolution to reappoint Ernst & Young as auditors will be put to the members at the Annual General Meeting.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Accounting convention

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

(b) Basis of operations

The company contracts with Highlands and Islands Enterprise to create and deliver business and social development, training and environmental renewal programmes throughout the Inverness and Nairn area. Funding for the company's activities is provided principally by Highlands and Islands Enterprise and the annual accounts are prepared on the assumption that the company will continue to be contracted with Highlands and Islands Enterprise for the foreseeable future. Although the company is limited by guarantee and has no shareholders, in accordance with s258 of the Companies Act 1985 it is a subsidiary undertaking of Highlands and Islands Enterprise by virtue of the control exercised over it through the negotiated operating contract.

(c) Depreciation

The cost of fixed assets is depreciated by equal annual instalments over the expected useful lives of the assets as follows:

25% per annum 4% per annum

Tenant's improvements

(d) Fixed asset funding

Under the operating agreement between the company and Highlands and Islands Enterprise the proceeds arising from the disposal of any Highlands and Islands Enterprise funded assets shall be immediately returned to that entity. Accordingly, funding received in respect of capital expenditure is credited to an asset repayment provision and is released to income over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets by instalments so as to match the depreciation charge.

(e) Loans

Loans advanced by the company are shown at the amount outstanding at the balance sheet date less provisions for any anticipated losses. Where loans have been funded by Highlands and Islands Enterprise a reduction in annual funding will be made to reflect the loan repayments received by the company. Accordingly, funding received in respect of loan advances is credited to a loan repayment provision.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(f) Unquoted investments

Investments made by the company are included at cost unless, in the opinion of the directors, there has been a permanent diminution in value in which case an appropriate adjustment is made. Such investments are deemed permanently impaired where there is no prospect of improvement in fortunes of the company in the foreseeable future. Where investments have been funded by Highlands and Islands Enterprise a reduction in annual funding will be made to reflect investment realisations made by the company. Accordingly, funding received in respect of investments is credited to an investment repayment provision.

(g) Leases and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, are capitalised in the balance sheet and are depreciated over their useful lives.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

(h) Pensions

Seconded staff are members of Highlands and Islands Enterprise's defined benefit pension scheme. The scheme requires contributions to be made to a separately administered fund. Contributions to the fund are charged to the income and expenditure account so as, as far as is possible, to spread the cost of pensions over the secondees' working lives with the company.

(i) Deferred taxation

Provision is made for deferred taxation, using the liability method, on all timing differences to the extent that it is probable that the liability will crystallise.

2. INCOME

Income, which is stated net of value added tax, represents funding for continuing activities received and accrued under the operating contract with Highlands and Islands Enterprise, together with amounts received and due from third parties. Income does not include £108,379 which was received from Highlands and Islands Enterprise to fund capital assets and is credited to either the loan/investment or asset repayment provision (see note 14).

19. MAJOR NON-CASH TRANSACTIONS

20. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

Under the terms of the operating contract with Highlands and Islands Enterprise the company granted a floating charge over the whole of its assets to Highlands and Islands Enterprise.

21. CONTINGENT ASSET

A grant of £350,000 paid by the company, £275,000 in the year to 31 March 1993 and £75,000 in the year to 31 March 1994, may be repayable together with a premium thereon of £350,000, making a total repayable sum of £700,000.

The repayable sum shall be paid to the company, in instalments of £17,500 per machine if the grant obligant manufactures and assembles its product outside the Highlands and Islands area.
