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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

To provide community based learning and training, supported by quality Gaelic childcare, which enables inclusion and encourages full participation in the economic, social and cultural life of the Western Isles.

- 1. To Provide Support and Learning Opportunities for the local community.
- 2. To Develop a Sustainable Economic and Environmental Strategy for the Organisation.
- 3. To Promote the Language and Culture of our local community.
- 4. To Support the local Community to become more Resilient, Enterprising and Sustainable.

The charitable objectives of the organisation are fulfilled by individual plans for each operational area. The charity has a single document which combines these operational plans to ensure that the charity's overall objectives are being met.

Public benefit

Cothrom is a public benefit entity.

Volunteers

Cothrom benefits from a small group of dedicated volunteers who support various aspects of its work. Their contribution to the ReStore project is extremely important and ranges from driving the van, assisting with collections, deliveries and running the shop, undertaking furniture restoration - recycling and upcycling, and carrying out 'odd jobs' as required. Within the training service Volunteer Tutors are matched one-to-one with learners, provide assistance to the contracted Tutors as required, and help to make the adult learning service a flexible provision that meets the needs of all. As appropriate Volunteer Tutors also provide outreach in a particular geographical area. Volunteer gardeners are supporting the development and maintenance of the Cothrom gardens and St Peter's garden in Daliburgh: not only invaluable to the community to increase the engagement and knowledge of growing your own produce as part of Local Food for Local People, but also gaining skills and therapeutic benefits of horticulture.

Volunteers are also an important link to the wider community, helping to raise awareness of Cothrom's aims and activities. This is particularly true of the Directors who also give their time on a voluntary basis to attend Board meetings.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Summary

The period April 2017 to March 2018 has been another good year for Cothrom as the organisation has continued to thrive. Highlights were the opening of the new ReStore Centre and introduction of Foundation Apprenticeship delivery within Sgoil Lionacleit.

2017 also saw a year of change for Cothrom with Barbara MacDonald leaving the organisation for new challenges and being replaced as Manager by Kirsty MacCormick.

Funding remains a challenge however new funding streams including Ufi and Princes Countryside Fund have been secured. Turnover in the year was £476,350.

CnES Adult Literacies, Skills Development Scotland programmes and ADP service funding all remain critical to the core activities offered to learners and support for those in recovery. Funding was also secured in the year for delivery of the Access to Employment programme as a ESF Challenge Fund programme delivered in partnership with CnES. ReStore revenue funding provided by Robertson Trust, Henry Smith and Big Lottery Fund has supported the increased activity.

The organisation currently has 23 staff and various freelance staff and 6 long term volunteers. During 2017-2018 Cothrom worked with learners across our various services.

During the period numbers of children attending Cothrom Og has increased from 20 to 26.

Adult Learning: Uist and Barra:

The core of our activity within the community and has continued to provide a wide variety of adult literacies and learning opportunities in Uist and Barra.

- Number of learners per year 96
- Percentage of learners achieving one or more of the intended learning outcomes 99%
- Percentage retention (3 months or more) 90%
- Percentage accreditation 50%
- Progression information 41% into Employment; 29% into Further Learning and 12.5% into Volunteering

In partnership with UHI Lews Castle College, CnES Skills and Enterprise, e-Sgoil and CnES Education, both Foundation Apprenticeships in Social Services and Healthcare and Social Services (Children & Young People) were delivered to 8 students in Sgoil Lionacleit. These courses involved the pupils accessing work experience in the Care and Childcare Sector so many thanks to the placement providers for supporting this important aspect of the training.

The Employability Fund (EF) programme funded by Skills Development Scotland continues to be delivered in partnership with Comhairle nan Eilean Siar (Accredited Training & Skills) and Lews Castle College. Isle Work provides employability skills, work experience and sector-specific qualifications to support an individual to progress. There were 45 participants on Isle Work throughout the Western Isles with 89% achieving through accredited qualifications; progressing to employment; accessing Further Education; and/or starting a Modern Apprenticeship. A valuable and important part of the EF delivery is the work placements as it provides the young person with practical experience in a sector of their choice. We appreciate the support of employers who provide work placements for young people participating on Isle Work.

Cothrom Òg:

2017-2018 has been another fun filled, educational year in Cothrom Ög. Cothrom Ög continues to provide Gaidhlig medium education for children aged 3 months to pre-school on a full time basis. Overall numbers have increased to 26 and there has been an increase in children in the Baby Room.

Staffing has been more settled in the period with Caroline MacInnes taking the helm as the Nursery Manager in October and Natalie, Rebecca and Paula all being confirmed as permanent staff alongside Jessie.

The children have been progressing in their learning within the Curriculum for Excellence and enjoying "my world outdoors" The children participated in a very special inter-generational project with Taigh a'Chridhe Uile Naomh (TACUN) where the children and residents met weekly and prepared a sensory book.

The children are looking forward to harvesting the fruits of the labours from their planting and gardening which they been doing with the horticulture tutors. The children, staff and learners planted trees around the Cothrom Campus.

The children have also been working closely with ReStore on a weekly basis preparing crafts and learning new skills within the workshops.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The children participated in the daily mile as much as possible and have been increasing their activity through play, games, walks and cycling.

Co-op Funding:

Cothrom Òg has been chosen as one of the Co-ops local charities for allocation of local 1%. The fundraising runs until October 2018 and the funding will be used to develop the outdoor area to create an investigative play area. Families will be involved in the design and build of the outdoor area.

E--Learning:

Cothrom has now signed a contract with BT Openreach for the provision of fibre broadband later in 2018. In order to maximise the benefit of this Cothrom is building its own online learning portal. This will be a web space where learners and tutors can jointly access all the required learning materials and communications.

Cothrom with funding and support from the UFI Vochtech Seed Fund has started the process of developing the portal and planning future delivery. This funding will provide a unique opportunity for Cothrom to learn from other projects.

During the year we have employed a ScotGrad post to enhance our use of digital and social media, including a revamped website. Regular use of social media is becoming more and more part of daily working lives and we are working to refine and grow our "brand and recognition".

Cothrom has also started work on upgrading our IT systems to meet the current and future needs of the organisation. Supported by Comic Relief work is underway to review systems and upgrade where required.

Horticulture:

During the year Cothrom continued to deliver the SVQ level 1 and 2 in Horticulture with 13 students graduating in June 2017 and 12 on track for graduation in June 2018. Falachan Cothrom, our Daliburgh garden continues to flourish and is a welcoming and safe space for learners. An Open Day was held in August 2017 as part of the Toradh festival, this was very well attended and received positive feedback.

Mentorprise:

Funding has been secured from the Princes' Countryside Fund during the period for the introduction of Mentorprise a business mentoring service which has been established within the community. Fiona Bateman has been appointed to the post of Mentorprise Project Co-ordinator. The project will provide mentoring relationships, networking opportunities, learning events and opportunities for individuals looking to start up or grow a local business or third sector organisation.

Recovery:

During the period Cothrom has continued to provide support services to those individuals who are in recovery or living with the effects of alcohol or drugs misuse. Cothrom remains a partner in the Substance Misuse Partnership for Uist and Barra and on the ADP partnership sub group for Uist and Barra. Cothrom provided adult learning opportunities and diversionary activities based at ReStore and Falachan alongside 1-1 support and group activities. Cothrom provides a safe space for the relief of isolation and boredom which are often contributory factors.

Although the Support Worker post remained vacant for the duration of the financial year, services were retained utilising existing staff and volunteers, in particular Sylvia Norton and Drew Bainbridge.

ReStore:

This has been a very significant year in the operations of ReStore, our recycling social enterprise. Building work was completed in May 2017 with Chris moving to the new Centre along with newer staff Nick and Maria. The new building is a great asset, providing much needed workshop space, textile and painting areas and a much more open and welcoming retail space. New tools and equipment have been purchased including table machinery and sewing machines.

The Centre has provided a renewed focus for activity and introduced new learners and volunteers to the service. ReStore are very grateful to our volunteers who support the furniture recycling and restoration activities. 50 learners attended ReStore over the year covering a huge variety of learning, including the first session of community classes which were very popular.

Shop sales increased over the period £19,182. We anticipate this will continue to increase as recognition of the shop and services continues to grow. We have also seen increased activity and income generated from repair and return services completed to a very high standard.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Restore achieved the Revolve Quality Standard accreditation on behalf of Cothrom in 2018, which gives recognition for the standards implemented across customer care and health and safety.

SCVO Digital Skills:

Cothrom has started a programme of digital skills training within the community. Funding was received from SCVO Digital Participation Fund and staff received digital champion training which can now be rolled out to the wider community. In addition to the training Cothrom received desktop computers, laptops and iPads which can be used to share digital training in the community. 12 sessions have been held.

Staffing:

During the period staffing numbers have remained stable, we have said goodbye to Barbara, Blair, Julia, Marion, Morag and Thomas and welcomed Caroline, Emma, Fiona, James, Kirsty, Mark, and Sheena.

Reserves policy

The Trustees regularly review the level of reserves to ensure that they are suitable for the planned activity and have examined the requirement to retain free reserves, which are those unrestricted funds not invested in fixed assets, designated to a specific purpose or otherwise committed and these stood at £99,970 at 31 March 2018 (2017 - £120,830) which the directors consider adequate to maintain operational capacity for the foreseeable future.

In the view of the Trustees it is appropriate to hold at least three months running costs to protect the interests of the charity and it's employees. The Trustees therefore consider that the appropriate minimum level of reserves required to be £80,000.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a memorandum of association which constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Cothrom is a membership organisation of over 600, most of whom live in Uists and Barra. It is from this membership that Directors are elected each year at the AGM.

Organisational structure

The board of trustees are responsible for approving and reviewing budgets, developing the charity's long term strategy/policies and monitoring the charity's financial position. Employees are responsible for the day-to-day operations of the charity.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from grants, whether 'capital' or revenue grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grant have been met, it is probable that income will be recieved and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income recieved in advance of a services rendered by the charity, is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

Donated goods for resale

Donated goods for resale consist of furniture which has been donated by members of the public and then restored by the charity for resale. It would be impractical to quantify the value of each item of furniture when it is originally donated to the charity; therefore donations are recognised upon the sale of goods once the furniture has been restored.

Restore furniture sales amounted to £26,681 during the year (2017 - £14,390) and income relating to these sales has been disclosed within charitable activities, rather than income from other trading activities, as the restore project formed part of the core activities of the charity.

Donations in kind

The charity has agreed a lease of 15 years for the use of the Walled Garden at St. Peter Church, South Uist. No consideration is payable for the lease and the value attributable to the garden is unknown and therefore has not been included as a donation in kind in the financial statements.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Land and buildings Plant and machinery etc Leasehold improvements -2% on cost

-25% on reducing balance and 20% on cost

-over the lifetime of the lease, due to expire in 2028

Assets under construction are not depreciated until they are brought into use.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Stock consists of furniture that has been restored for sale to the general public. Donated stock yet to be restored is not included within stock

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

A designated fund is that part of the charity's unrestricted funds that the charity trustees have decided to earmark or designate, for a particular purpose.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Lease commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the SOFA as incurred. Lease obligations are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Public Benefit Entity Concessionary Loans

Loan classified as Public Benefit Entity Concessionary Loans are initially measured at the amount recieved, with the carrying amount subsequently adjusted to reflect any accrued interest payable.
