The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

ESTATE

Along with an extension built in 1995, the church hall and manse of Orbiston Parish Church make up the buildings of Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre and are leased to Utheo at a nominal rent by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. Within the year discussions took place with the General Trustees regarding Utheo purchasing the buildings.

OUR SPIRITUAL CORE

Utheo Ltd is an inclusive body that welcomes people of all faiths or none to benefit from its activities and participate in the organisation, including election to the Board of Directors. No post in the organisation has a Genuine Occupational Requirement (GOR) attached to it on grounds of religion and we adhere to the National Standards for Community Engagement. It is increasingly recognised the spiritual dimension of life is an important component for the wellbeing of many people. The Board of Directors approved the following statement regarding the spiritual core of the organisation.

"Our ethos and values are grounded in a compassionate concern for our local community with a respect for the importance of spirituality to the well-being of communities and individuals in accord with the Faithworks Charter."

The Board of Directors has endorsed the Faithworks Charter. Religious Care in Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre is provided by a short act of worship three times a week for all who wish to attend. Worship leaders are drawn from local churches. The Board of Directors considers that Spiritual Care in the Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre is most effectively exercised through friendships made, the spirit of service encouraged, and understanding gained.

VISION, VALUES AND GOALS

Originally devised in 1993 Utheo's Vision, Values and mission were reviewed by the trustees in 2017 with input from employees, volunteers, service users and partner agencies as part of the CommonHealth research initiative.

Vision

To bring together the communities around Bellshill to enrich the lives of the local people.

Values

Equality: We believe in the principle of inclusion, respecting differences and treating all people the same

whether they are accessing our services or contributing to the running and delivery.

Access: We support our communities by providing accessible and affordable services that meet local needs

and increase participation and engagement.

Care: We believe in the rights of all people, showing care and concern for the wellbeing and welfare of

staff, volunteers, users, visitors and partners by offering services, advice, support and

understanding thoughtful and sensitive to people's circumstances.

Openness: We work in an open and transparent manner to nurture a culture of respect, sharing and giving,

creating an environment that allows people to voice their thoughts and feelings and expect a

response based on the same principles.

Community: We maintain space and support for services and activities bringing together people of all ages and

abilities in an integrated and inclusive environment delivered through a culture of volunteering and

partnership working across generations.

MISSION

A place for people and a centre for all: Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre provides easy access to a wide range of services and activities for learning, leisure and self-improvement. We support the well-being of the people in Bellshill and the surrounding area in an open, friendly, and caring environment.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Childcare Service

Before and After School Care and Holiday Play scheme allow parents to stay in work and attend full time education. Children benefit from structured learning activities in line with national educational priorities. The service is registered with the Care Inspectorate and complies with the standards of Achieving Quality Scotland.

Older Persons Day Service

This supportive and flexible service enables older people to develop and maintain their relationships and support networks in a friendly and sociable atmosphere, allowing older persons to continue living independently and with dignity in their own homes, enjoy their older years with the company of friends and provide respite support for carers.

Theo's Café

The community cafe aims to increase access to healthy, nutritious and affordable food in an effort to improve health and wellbeing and address issues of food poverty. Theo's Café welcomes all people, including frail and elderly persons, providing a focus for Centre user groups and the wider community.

Food Coop

Orbiston Food Coop sells essential groceries at low cost, providing a vital resource for isolated individuals and those with limited incomes. The service is ran entirely by a team of volunteers in partnership with Lanarkshire Community Food and Health to promote access to a healthy diet and address issues of food poverty.

Volunteering

Volunteering allows people of all abilities and backgrounds to be involved in the community, increasing levels of participation, improving health and well-being while addressing issues of isolation and exclusion. Volunteers contribute in all Centre activities, meeting new people, learning new skills while gaining vital training and work experience.

Befriending

BeFriend in Bellshill aims to reduce the isolation of elderly people, disabled people and carers. Volunteer befrienders provide support that enables befriendees' participation in activities that increases their involvement in the community. The service provides 1:1 support, home visits, group sessions and a telephone befriending service.

Employability

Our organisation provides employment and training opportunities for young people supported by Community Jobs Scotland. Jobs are additional, designed for young people to gain work experience maximise their employability. Within the year our services provide student work placements and arranged with local colleges, schools and universities.

Computer Learning

A team of volunteers maintain a programme of digital support sessions providing support for adult learners and jobseekers. Participants bring their own devices or use equipment provided. Learners benefit from peer support, improved communications, access to online benefits, guidance with job searches, CV support and improved well-being.

Health and Social Care Integration

Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre is the third sector partner for the Locality Partnership Development Programme for Bellshill coordinating the integration of community health and care services. Local investments funded via a Locality Activity Programme are managed by a consortium of health and social agencies that includes NHS Lanarkshire; Community Learning and Development, Social Services, Lanarkshire Carers Centre, Alzheimer's Scotland, VANL.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net result for the year was a net outflow of funds of £30,963 and restricted funds have decreased by £26,690 to £68,281. The Directors continue to explore all available avenues to obtain grant funding in today's difficult economic climate.

The Directors have reviewed the reserves policy and express their desire to achieve a minimum level of three months operating costs together with other specific provisions as detailed more fully in the notes to the accounts.

Our work plans and priorities will ensure we continue to progress towards our strategic goals and objectives.

- Secure funding for Utheo to purchase and lease the buildings of Orbiston Neighbourhood Centre from the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland with continued involvement of the congregation of Bellshill Central Parish Church

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are nominated the Kirk Session of Bellshill Central Parish Church. Utheo's governing documents were updated in 2015 to allow a new membership and director structure. Membership sits at 40, made up of members, associate members and junior members. Directors are drawn from the membership with the Board having 11 places.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Staffing Structure

The average number of employees each month was 22. Employees are automatically enrolled in the "Smart Pension" Workplace Pension scheme unless opting out. All staff and volunteers participate in training and development activities.

Operations Manager

The Operations Manager's role has three aspects - strategic, operational and centre-management. Being the most senior staff member the Operations Manager is responsible for the wellbeing of individuals and user groups, overall line management of support and service staff and providing support to the Board of Directors and its working groups.

Administration

The Administrator is responsible for bookkeeping, administration, payroll and management of funds and resources.

Housekeeping

Three staff members provide housekeeping and care-taking ensuring buildings are clean, tidy and welcoming to all.

Transport

A mini bus is leased from North Lanarkshire Council Transport Department to provide daily transport support to our Older People's Services and Out of School Care. The driver is assisted by other staff as escorts and also back-up drivers.

Development Officer

The Development Officer oversees the ongoing sustainability and development of services and activities, responsible for funding and grant applications, project and business developments, financial planning, coordination of reporting and evaluation obligations with staff teams and providing support to the Board of Directors and its working groups.

Service Staff

Fifteen paid members of staff are employed in the delivery of the organisation's services and charitable activities. All staff members have appropriate qualifications and undertake training and personal development activities to maintain standards. Details of our activities this year are noted under Achievement and Performance.

Organisational Structure and Induction and training of new trustees

Meetings of the Board of Directors deal with the ongoing running of the organisation. Full board meetings are held monthly. Directors receive formal reports from the Operations Manager and the Development Officer. Monthly Accounts are scrutinised and approved and decisions on recommendations contained in reports are made. Policies and Procedures adopted by the Board are kept under review. In between full board meetings Directors and key staff members meet as 3 working groups reviewing matters concerning Finance and Governance, Human Resources and Fundraising and Promotions. Recommendations and decisions requiring Directors approval are then presented at full board meetings. The Directors engage in appropriate training opportunities to improve their skills and build board capacity. Staff members have monthly Head of Departments meetings, scheduled team meetings, monthly support and supervision meetings and annual appraisals. Board of Directors receive a summarised report from these staff meetings.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Long leasehold - 10% on cost Plant and machinery - 20% on cost

Stocks

Stock is valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
