

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MARCH 1995

OBJECTIVES AND ORGANISATION

The aim of the Notre Dame Centre is to contribute to the building up of integrated human beings capable of taking their place as members of the family and of society.

To achieve this aim the Centre undertakes

- 1. to provide assessment and treatment for emotionally and behaviourally disturbed children and young people;
- 2. to provide professional support and guidance for the families of such children and young people;
- 3. to provide consultancy and in-service training for statutory bodies within the fields of Education, Health and Social Work;
- 4. to provide training and education within the wider community on the developmental needs of children and young people; and
- 5. to undertake any other such activities to promote the psychological wellbeing of children, young people and families.

The Centre is organised in two units, one dealing with children aged from three to twelve, the other for adolescents and young adults.

The Board of Directors meets monthly and has a committee structure to enable it to achieve the objectives of the company. The committees are as follows:

FINANCE AND PROPERTY COMMITTEE

- to establish the annual budget
- to monitor income and expenditure
- to undertake financial negotiations with purchasers of service
- to initiate fundraising procedures
- to propose a budget for property maintenance
- to establish and monitor an internal maintenance programme
- to oversee all matters relating to health and safety

STAFFING COMMITTEE

- to establish and monitor a staff appraisal and development policy
- to deal with matters pertaining to contracts, discipline and grievance
- to establish recruitment policy and procedures
- to establish and implement a health and safety policy
- to establish and implement an equal opportunities policy

PUBLICITY AND MARKETING COMMITTEE

- to promote the company and its services by ensuring
- good publicity and public relations
- effective marketing and communication

PROFESSIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

- to ensure effective monitoring systems for every aspect of the work of the Centre
- to make reports and recommendations to the Board on quality of service
- to report to and consult with senior representatives of statutory bodies and purchasers of the service

The company has successfully pursued its policy of establishing contracts on a purchaser-provider basis with our main customers in the public sector. This represents the main body of the work of the Centre.

Additional work has been undertaken in the private sector for schools and other organisations, and for the legal profession.

While work with individuals is the primary activity of the Centre, there has been significant growth in the areas of consultancy and training.

DEVELOPMENT, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

During the period the staff have worked with 585 children/young people and their families. Various trends have emerged throughout the period.

- There has been an increase in the number of clients being referred by Social Work Departments. This has been primarily due to multiple referrals (i.e. several children from one family requiring therapeutic help) and from an increase in the number of requests to assess children in order to advise Social Work personnel re multiple placements.
- Education referrals are now almost exclusively filtered through to our Centre by Strathclyde Ecucational Psychologists, in line with the conditions laid down by Strathclyde Region Education Department.
- Requests for help from parents are generally re-directed via an appropriate professional referring agency (i.e. Social Work, Health, Education). Those clients who received help during this year at the request of the parents represented long-term casework carried over from previous years.
- There has been an increase in work with sexually abused children and young people. The pilot project for under-age drug users which was started in 1992 with start-up funding from Children in Need has been maintained with full uptake of all appointments offered by the consultant psychologist.
- Another innovation was the sessional employment of a counsellor/ psychologist for individual therapeutic work with older teenagers and/or parents. Again all sessions are taken up.

£25,000 was received from the Social Work Department to fund an action-research project in the G22 area of Glasgow to investigate the factors involved in under-age drug use. Strathclyde Region Education Department also gave the services of a full-time teacher and the resultant report will be completed by October 1995.

Staff have attended conferences on a number of topics related to our work such as Child Protection, Work with Sexually Abused Children and Adolescents, Adolescent Suicide/Breakdown, Children's Right and Bereavement.

In-service sessions have been given to other agencies including talks to prospective adoptive parents and their case workers, foster parents and their case workers, St Andrew's College of Education, Hospice personnel, Marriage Guidance Counsellors and staff involved in the Public Health domain.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The financial position of the company is as shown in the attached accounts. The directors are satisfied with the current position and emphasise that their intention is for the company to become financially self-sufficient within three years.

These accounts incorporate a charge for the services of the Sisters who do work for the Centre; however, they do not include charges for use of premises which are currently being assessed.

THE NOTRE DAME CENTRE DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MARCH 1995

The directors present their report and the audited accounts of the company for the period ended 31 March 1995.

DIRECTORS RESPONSIBILITIES

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Company law requires the directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing those accounts, the directors are required to:-

- 1) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- 2) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- 3) prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the company is the promotion of the welfare of children and young people in Scotland who are suffering from any type of behavioural disorder.

Although The Notre Dame Centre was incorporated on 13 April 1994, it did not operate until 1 September 1994.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

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1a. Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, and in compliance with the Statement of Recommended Practice No.2 (Accounting for Charities).

1b. Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are shown at historical cost.

Depreciation is provided, after taking account of any grants receivable, at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Furniture & equipment - 10-25% on NBV

1c. Taxation

The company is a registered charity and by reason of statute and concession there is no charge to taxation.

1d. Operating income

Income from contract services is immediately written off to the Income and Expenditure Account unless it relates to the purchase of fixed assets, when the income is taken to reserves and written off over the useful life of the asset.

1e. Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from producing a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.
