STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 18 March 1997. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law.

The directors are appointed at the Annual General Meeting under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association. One third of the directors retire at each Annual General Meeting.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 December 2012

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The main objects of the charity are to advance the education of the public in the history, production and properties of Harris Tweed.

The charity aims to achieve these objectives by:-

- assisting financially by way of grant or loan in any other appropriate manner any person undertaking a course of study relevant to the above project;
- contributing financially or otherwise to the establishment and maintenance of a Harris Tweed Centre designed to educate the public in the history, production and properties of Harris Tweed.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Throughout 2012 the Trust has been focused on project planning and development of the Harris Tweed Educational Centre within The Harris Tweed Authority offices in Stornoway Town Hall. Plans are progressing well to construct a small exhibition and a series of educational activities which will be open to the public. Design concepts have been prepared by students of The Glasgow School of Art as part of a long standing academic partnership with Harris Tweed, and it is hoped that a full design brief and project management tender will be issued early in 2013.

The Harris Tweed Authority has made a significant donation of £60,000 to the Educational Trust to realise this important project.

Following a generous donation from an ancestor of the Dunmore family, the Trustee's agreed during the year to partner with a community group in South Harris to renovate a small monument on the site of the home of the Paisley Sisters. The Paisley Sisters were two local women, who in 1864 were supported by Catherine, Countess of Dunmore, to leave the island to attend training in the town of Paisley to learn the skill of weaving. The Paisley sisters later returned to the island and cascaded their newly acquired skills to local people. It is widely considered that it was from this act that the Harris Tweed industry was born. At present the focus is on acquiring the land and improving footpath access to the remote coastal site.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

As charitable expenditure will always be restricted by available funds the charity has not yet formulated a detailed reserves policy.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Trustees expect to produce a full design brief and project management tender in early 2013, with the aim of having the Centre operational during the summer of 2013. The facility will allow groups from local schools to visit and further provide a research base for visiting fashion and textile students wishing to focus on Harris Tweed as part of their studies. The project, which will be open in the evening and on Saturday, will create 2 part time seasonal jobs.

It is anticipated also that the sale of a limited range of products, exclusively available through the Harris Tweed Educational Centre, will generate a small income for the project, which it is hoped will be sufficient to refresh elements of the centre annually.

The Trustees, together with South Harris Community Council, intend to purchase the land, obtain all the necessary planning consents, and apply for grant funding to erect the monument to the Paisley Sisters. They further hope to erect bilingual interpretation and information panels to mark this historically important site. The Trustees are aware of the delay that can arise in seeking to progress this project particularly in relation to land acquisition and planning. However every effort will be made during 2013, together with the South Harris Community Council, to expedite this important project.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE HARRIS TWEED AUTHORITY EDUCATIONAL TRUST

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2012 set out on pages five to seven.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Accounting convention

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
