STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 18 March 1997. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law.

The directors are appointed at the Annual General Meeting under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association. One third of the directors retire at each Annual General Meeting.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 December 2014

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The main objects of the charity are to advance the education of the public in the history, production and properties of Harris Tweed.

The charity aims to achieve these objectives by:-

- assisting financially by way of grant or loan in any other appropriate manner any person undertaking a course of study relevant to the above project;
- contributing financially or otherwise to the establishment and maintenance of a Harris Tweed Centre designed to educate the public in the history, production and properties of Harris Tweed.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Trust has been pleased to continue to support British Woven Textiles and Fashion Design students access Harris Tweed cloth for use in final year collections. 12 students were supported in total. In return, students provide the Harris Tweed Authority with drawings, images, story boards etc which are used in social media and in careers promotional talks in schools etc.

The Trust made 1 award of grant and 1 loan in 2014. A young weaver was supported with a grant to make improvements to his loom shed, incorporating interpretative material, heating, seating and improved lighting. This weaver regularly hosts school groups, visiting journalists and buyers on behalf of the HTA. A further loan was made to enable a local tailor to purchase improved industrial standard sewing and pressing equipment. Repayments are being received in full.

An educational book aimed at primary school children detailing the processes involved in the making of yarn and weaving of Harris Tweed cloth was purchased for every school, library and pre-school in the Outer Hebrides.

Work has continued on the interior design of the proposed Brand Room project with the appointed designers, Graven Images.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

As charitable expenditure will always be restricted by available funds the charity has not yet formulated a detailed reserves policy.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Due to its success, popularity and proven benefits to the Harris Tweed industry, the Trust will expand on the Final Year Student Fabric Bank initiative. Cloth will be offered to student at three selected international fashion colleges. It is hoped a partnership with Bejing Institute of Fashion Technology will progress in 2015.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE HARRIS TWEED AUTHORITY EDUCATIONAL TRUST

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
