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DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The Directors present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charitable company's objectives are:

- the advancement of the arts and of education in the arts and, in particular, the art of music, amongst children and adults with a physical disability, learning difficultly or sensory impairment or who are in need by reason of other disadvantage, through the use of specially developed technology or methodology and through interaction with others;
- the promotion of research into new technologies and methodologies for the advancement of the arts and of the education in the arts, and in particular the art of music, amongst children and adults and the publication of the results of such research.

About Drake Music Scotland

Drake Music Scotland is a company limited by guarantee with charitable status based in Edinburgh, working nationally throughout Scotland and with wider UK and international partners. For the last 25 years Drake Music Scotland has developed a programme of commissions, creative project, performance and career development opportunities for artists, ensembles and musicians and provided opportunities for over 19,000 disabled children to learn, create and perform. We continuous to explore and expand our specialised expertise in inclusive music making with digital technologies for those with physical barriers to playing, and develop software and other resources based on the Finnish Figurenotes notation system to simplify the process of learning music for those with additional needs.

Rooted in the social model of disability, our disabled artist-led programme Create widens opportunities for composers, performers and ensembles to develop ambitious creative projects and make an impact on the performing arts sector in Scotland and beyond. Enhanced by key partnerships with performing arts organisations, festivals and venues we aim to mainstream the work of disabled artists, diversify the music sector and lead permanent change.

As an established member of Scottish, UK and international music education networks we develop inclusive music education for young people ensuring they have equal opportunities to benefit from making music as their non-disabled peers. Our schools programme All Join In offers specialised provision in partnership with Scotland's local authority music services engaging more than 1,000 young people each year. We also provide sector-leading training and professional development for an international community of music practitioners and educators which includes disabled music leaders who are role models for the young people they work with.

Chief Executive's Report

During the 2022-23 year we launched our reconfigured artistic programme with the two key strands **Create** and **Learn** focusing on disabled artists and disabled learners respectively, forging ahead with a range of ambitious projects in conjunction with our many partners.

Create - Artist-led Programme of Creative Projects

Spear-headed by our Associate Composer **Ben Lunn** - who self-identifies as disabled and autistic - this year's Create projects included the **Echoes** concert in June 2022 featuring new works by 9 disabled composers in partnership with the Hebrides Ensemble. This fruitful partnership also led to a performance at the Hidden Door Festival in the Pianodrome at the old Royal High School on Calton Hill. The event presented the equal partnership of a disabled and non-disabled musician in **Chris Jacquin** and Gordon Bragg, giving the UK premiere of Echos II by Niculescu for violin and synthesizer introducing our approach to an enthusiastic audience previously unfamiliar with our work. **Echoes** went on to win best *New Music Project* in the prestigious 2023 New Music Scotland Awards.

To add to his success, Jacquin was awarded a place on the prestigious Sound and Music New Voices scheme with funding and other support to develop his work over the year. He is developing his exploration of electro-acoustic and sonic music practice with key collaborators Dr Tom Mudd of Edinburgh University and Professor Nick Fells of Glasgow University and will deliver a series of lectures and performances during 23-24.

Other composers and music creators supported by us during the year include Clare Johnston who continued her online collaboration with the Eegeru Ensemble based in Almaty, Kazakhstan, and Sorcha Pringle who received training through our professional development programme. She also contributed to improving the accessibility of Figurenotes software and more recently, a consultant with our Creative Access team. Ewan McKay, a composer based in the north-east was appointed as our Composer in Residence with mentoring from highly regarded pianist and composer Huw Watkin.

The Edinburgh Fringe 2022 was a busy period for us. We supported **Sean Logan** a neurodiverse keyboardist and music creator who featured in Channel 4's popular programme The Piano to create his first Fringe show also at the Pianodrome. Several of our MusicSPACE musicians performed at the EdFringe's Access Stage at St Andrew Square and a lunchtime performance at the Pianodrome. A key new group **Out of the Common** emerged from our collaboration with Intercultural Youth Scotland, a newly formed collective of disabled and BME young artists who played at Craigmillar Festival and Intercultural Youth Scotland's **Scotland in Colour** Festival.

On 30th September a concert took place at the **Cumnock Tryst** with pupils from Hillside School creating work with Sir James MacMillan, singers from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, a moving concert that confirmed again that disability is no barrier to creativity and self-expression. In October **Sound Scotland**'s new music festival based in Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire featured the premiere of **Sonia Allori's Room to Breathe** performed by Clare Johnston with members of the iPad Lab and Nevis Ensemble.

Composer **Karen Sutherland** was supported to apply for Creative Scotland Create:Inclusion funding from Creative Scotland to develop her piece **Entwine** which incorporated the MI.MU Gloves. Kris Halpin, one of the UK's main exponents of the gloves - a wearable, gestural technology for music performance art - worked with Sutherland and Jacquin on a new version of the piece first performed at Echoes for **Cryptic Nights** in March 2023. The sold-out event also expanded the audience for our music creators' work, bringing our new artist-led approach to Glasgow's Centre for Contemporary Arts.

We were delighted to learn of success with an application for PRS for Music Foundation's **Beyond Borders** funding for a collaboration between composers from England, Scotland and Wales and experimental pianist and new music champion **Siwan Rhys**, working towards a performance in autumn 2023 and later an album to be recorded by NMC Recordings.

Learn - Creative Projects in and out of School

Youth Music Initiative Projects planned for the new academic year were affected by a 'pause' at the request of the Scottish Government which caused a delay to the programme of schools projects and was a concern for some of our freelance practitioners. The situation was resolved and the year's All Join In programme went ahead successfully with more than 1,000 young people delivering 827 sessions in 59 schools in 14 local authorities. Their musical and creative skills were developed in projects led by our team of Associate Musicians. Amongst the many highlights of the year were Calaiswood School in Dunfermline performing as part of the Fife Music Festival and pupils from Pinkie Primary in Musselburgh, East Lothian writing a song about bullying.

The Learn team was joined in March 23 by new team member Caitlin Walker in the role of Learn Co-ordinator. This is allowing Emma Lines as Head of Learn to focus on implementing **Digital Orchestra: Youth** a key aspect of the Changes Plan developed over the last two years. Digital Youth Orchestra is funded through Creative Scotland's Youth Music Initiative Access fund. It started in the North-East in Aberdeen, central Scotland in Dundee and Edinburgh focusing on musical transitions for young people from school to adult life creating a safe space for them to be creative and have stability in their lives during what can often be a difficult transitional period. This includes mentoring from Digital Orchestra members. From Autumn 2023 Sorcha Pringle, visually impaired musician and project leader, will be part of the team leading the DO:Y project in her home base of Dundee; Ewan McKay a disabled composer will be joining Digital Orchestra: North East; and Clare Johnston will join Digital Orchestra: Edinburgh.

Skills Development and Training

Our work could not happen without the expertise and skilled facilitation of our valued team of Associate Musicians whose contribution is highly valued. A training event in March 2023 led by digital technology expert Ali Gillies, a long-standing member of the Associate Musician team, introduced the Digital Orchestra: Youth leaders to Ableton software and new hardware including CMPSR, BlueBoard and Roli Blocks. These devices have been purchased for the participants use with the funding from the Youth Music Initiative Access Fund.

Following the soft launch of the new Figurenotes software in May 22, the Figurenotes Team continued to work on more accessibility features for the software including Sorcha Pringle working directly with our developers on Screen reader accessibility for our software, Notate. The Figurenotes Accessible Music Hub continues to be a central point of information and resources for the inclusive music teaching community. They also delivered training as part of a team visit and knowledge exchange in the autumn to the United States at New York University and University of Bridgeport, and closer to home at the Youth Music Initiative 20th Anniversary event in Johnstone as well as online Figurenotes training, for a total of around 200 attendees.

Team Development and Support

Implementation of the Changes Plan involved extensive consultation with the staff team enabling them to have a voice and sense of ownership of the plans and effectively contribute to the change in direction and working practices. A key part of the artist-led approach was making the facilities within our base at SPACE in Craigmillar more accessible and welcoming for artists to use to work on projects. Our Flexible Working Policy extends to all team members, who can work from home as well as supporting each other to maintain activities within the building. Other initiatives to support Team Wellbeing included signing up to Health Assured's Employee Assistance Programme and the Bike2Work Scheme.

Environmental Sustainability

The Bike2Work scheme is also part of our work on Environmental Sustainability and development of targets for our Carbon Management plan. DMS Team members took part in Creative Carbon Scotland's Springboard Assembly on Climate Action and are developing new targets working towards the Scottish Government's Net Zero target by 2045. At the musicians' training event, ideas were elicited for the refreshed plan for the years ahead including environmental themes for projects and a suppliers' Sustainability Rider.

Fundraising and Income Sources

In a change of direction for our fund-raising activity this year, we developed ways of working with artists to identify appropriate opportunities and support them to apply for funding to develop their own projects. Successes include Karen Sutherland applying to Creative Scotland's Create: Inclusion Fund, Sanjeev Mann's application to the Youth Music Next Gen Fund to create an EP, and Sean Logan applying to Creative Scotland for his recording project.

Generated Funds

We receive fees from Local Authorities for the provision of music in schools in their areas and also generate income from the sale of Figurenotes resources and training. We charge nominal fees for MusicSPACE tuition making it clear that those who experience any barriers to paying are not charged.

Donations

In terms of Donations we were delighted to be approached by the **Westerton Male Voice Choir** based in Bearsden who chose us as the charity to benefit from their charitable fundraising activity for two years - and whose track-record of fundraising is excellent! Other donations were received from Broughton St Mary's Parish Church, Castlebrae School, Glasgow University Music Club, InChorus Concert at St Giles Cathedral, James Gillespie High School, Nairns Oatcakes and Southside Community Orchestra. We are very grateful to all those who organize collections and fundraising activities on our behalf.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity reported a deficit for the year of £34,806 (2022: a deficit of £25,587) as set out in the Statement of Financial Activities. This deficit comprised a surplus of £8,009 (2022: deficit of £95,293) in restricted funds and a deficit of £30,660 in general funds (2022: surplus of £5,057) and a deficit of £12,155 in designated funds (2022: surplus of £64,649).

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The reserve position shows unrestricted funds (general and designated) have decreased to £174,852 (2022: £217,667). The Board's aim is to maintain an unrestricted reserve equivalent to at least one half of the year's wages bill. The year's wage bill in 2022/23 was £252,000, so the target figure is therefore £126,000, and therefore this aim has been achieved.

The charity's principal funding sources are detailed in the Chief Executive's Report.

Investment policy

The Directors consider that where surplus funds are available, they should be held in a suitable high interestbearing bank account.

Risk Management

The Directors have reviewed the business and operational risks faced by the charitable company which are set out in the Risk Register in the following categories: Strategy, Finance, Reputation & Communications, Projects & Programmes, External Relationships, People. In 2020, a Covid tab was added as the pandemic had an impact on all other areas.

The main risks and action taken to mitigate them were:

- 1) Business Plan/Artistic Programme affected due to need to constantly adjust the programme with plans lacking in clarity, vision and being unfocused and unstrategic, leading to mission drift, with the need to regularly revise plans affecting our relationships with key partners and shifting our focus towards internal operations rather than looking outwards and building relationships. This was mitigated by addressing the future plans for the organisation robustly including developing a Changes Plan, and actively participating in sector networking online as well as initiating our own networks.
- 2) Lack of consultation with disabled stakeholders including artists leading to lack of relevance, reputational loss and difficulties retaining participants with low numbers returning in recovery period. This was mitigated by working with Ben Lunn as Associate Composer (and on the autism spectrum) to collaborate with a wider range of disabled musicians and artists including those in the Disabled Artist Network, and consulting with our core stakeholders on plans, with the new developments as part of the Changes Plan responding to the feedback received.
- 3) Shortfall in grant/trust income due to raised levels of need and higher competition for funds as a result, mitigated by accessing various Covid related additional funding.
- 4) Reductions in earned income and fees from local authorities, mitigated by the authorities agreeing to online provision which we implemented and by investing in new Figurenotes software and a new users' Hub designed to generate higher levels of income in future.
- 5) Staff and Freelance Team affected negatively by the pandemic, particularly in terms of freelancers giving up their work in music, and increased levels of stress and illness leading to lower mental and physical health mitigated by maintaining activities online allowing us to continue paying musicians and introducing various initiatives to support positive health and wellbeing of the team.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

An additional 'high level' Corporate Risks Register was created during the year providing an overview of the main risks for the Company enabling the Board to consider any steps necessary to counteract them. These strategic risks were identified as:

- 1) not being able to deliver key activities and programme with resulting loss of reputation;
- 2) actual income not matching forecasted income leading to insufficient funds and not being able to cover more costs;
- 3) duty of care to staff not being met leading to poor morale and adverse reactions;
- 4) duty of care to artists and participants not being met leading to reputational damage and loss of support from key stakeholders group, and;
- 5) scope for forming and maintaining productive relationships with partners being affected.

These Key Risks faced by the charity were re-assessed during the year as we emerged from the pandemic and the ongoing impacts became evident. Action was taken to mitigate the impact on the organisation including online and hybrid working, using online and digital delivery to our advantage and ensuring accessibility of online activity, ensuring good levels of reserves were maintained and existing and new sources of funding acquired, creating a Mental Health and Wellbeing Policy and Action Plan, and continuing with the Changes Plan; with external HR and other support, in order to continue being relevant and responsive to the needs of our stakeholders.

Plans for future periods

The Chief Executive's report contains a detailed review of the company's activities during the period and plans for the future.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company was incorporated on 24 July 1997 and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company is registered as a charity and is a company limited by guarantee, the liability of each member of the charity not exceeding £1.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The Board of Directors, which administers the charity has no maximum number of members, however the minimum number has been set at three.

The Directors meet at least quarterly at Board Meetings and, in addition, a Finance and General Purposes Group meets at least quarterly, allowing the Board to deal with the increasing amount of business. The F&GP reports back to the main Board and Minutes are shared with all Directors. Other sub-groups meet to consider specific aspects of our work from time to time.

As set out in the Articles of Association, the Board of Directors has the power at any time, by unanimous consent, to appoint any person as a Director of the charitable company.

New Board members receive induction and may access training covering governance and management issues as they wish, depending on previous experience.

The Directors consider the key management personnel to be the Board of Directors, who are the charity's trustees, the Chief Executive, the Artistic Director and the Head of Learning. The key management personnel of the charitable company are in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. All Directors give of their time freely and no Director received remuneration during the period. The pay of senior staff is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings.

None of the Directors receive remuneration of other benefit from their work with the charity but may claim out of pocket expenses. Any connection between a Director or senior manager of the charity with a funder, musician or beneficiary must be disclosed to the full board of Directors in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party. Details of related party transactions are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Statement of Directors' responsibilities

The directors, who also act as trustees for the purpose of charity law, are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company Law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that year.

In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In accordance with the company's articles, a resolution proposing that Thomson Cooper be reappointed as auditor of the charitable company will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Drake Music Scotland is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office and principal place of business is SPACE, 11 Harewood Road, Edinburgh, EH16 4NT.

The charity is limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. Each member of the charity undertakes to contribute no sum greater than £1 to the charity's assets, if it should be wound up while he or she is a member or within on year after he or she ceases to be a member.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Directors have fully considered the financial position of the charity for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approving the accounts with reference to current reserves, budgets for the forthcoming year, and future forecasts of the level of income and expenditure. The Directors have concluded that the charity is a going concern and are satisfied that it remains appropriate to continue to prepare the accounts on the going concern basis.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted General funds are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Designated funds are set aside from Directors from unrestricted funds that is earmarked for future projects or to account for particular unrestricted expenditure separate from the charity's general funds.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Donations and similar income are recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Deferred income represents amounts received for future year and is released to income in the year for which it relates.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure, which includes irrecoverable VAT, is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Costs of charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities. It includes both those costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those of an indirect nature necessary to support them including governance costs.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity can be allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis as set out in the notes.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost. Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost, less depreciation provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Fit Out	3 years
Music Studio	4 years
Fixtures and fittings	4 years
Music equipment	4 years
Bikes	3 years
Office equipment	4 years

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments (such as debtors for income and creditors for operating costs). Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

1.11 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxationof Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

1.12 Employee benefits

The charity contributes to a defined contribution scheme for its staff. The pension costs charged in the accounts represent the contributions payable by the charity during the period.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the Directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
