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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objectives of the charity are twofold; firstly to advance the heritage of the historic castles and property, including artefacts, paintings, and others historically belonging to the family of the MacDougalls of Dunollie; and secondly to advance education through public display and interpretation of the said assets; preserving and retaining the artifacts, paintings and others in Scotland.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

During 2021-22, COVID-19 unfortunately continued to be the dominant force affecting Dunollie Museum, Castle & Grounds trading and activities. Most of the staff team worked from home during the first part of the financial year, coming back gradually when appropriate, but with restrictions still in place - a full season opening was not possible.

The Trust was, therefore, enormously grateful for the support Dunollie received in emergency and recovery grants. A further £37,400 was awarded from Museums Galleries Scotland for the 2021-22 financial year. This grant enabled the Trust to carry out vital repair and remedial work in order to reopen to the public. This included, but is not limited to, installing glass doors in the Kettle Garden Café, carrying out repairs to the Laigh Biggin Roof and installing new windows, as well as putting new heaters into the office and storage rooms. A Discretionary Hardship Grant of £5,000 was awarded by Argyll and Bute Council in September 2021, and the Trust also received numerous individual donations from members of the public. All this funding was crucial for the survival of the charity during continued restrictions.

In addition, funds were received from the sale of the Horseshoe Bay Chalet on Kerrera, which in part funded the operational deficit for the year. The sale of this endowment property, allowed by the terms on which it was endowed, was agreed by the entire Board of Trustees as an emergency measure.

In December 2020, Shona Scott resigned from her position of Operations Manager, and Jane Isaacson (Business and Sustainability Manager) left in April 2021. It is hard to do justice to the work that both Jane and Shona contributed individually towards navigating the Trust through the very worst of the pandemic, but we thank them for their efforts and wish them all the best for their future endeavours. Jane and Shona's roles were replaced by a General Manager, Emma Sutcliffe, who started in June 2021.

Kylie Yap (Retail Officer), Ann McLean (Office Manager) and Vikki Robertson (Visitor Services Manager) returned from furlough during 2021 and made significant contributions towards the reopening of Dunollie Museum, Castle & Grounds. Their efforts have been much appreciated by new team members and the Board.

We were also very sad to lose Gillian Campbell after 7 years in the role of Marketing Manager, but we wish her all the best starting her own business and were delighted to welcome Florence Medard as Communications Coordinator in June 2021. Jamie MacGregor joined the Trust in January 2021 as Heritage Engagement Officer, initially on a 9-month contract as part of a National Heritage Lottery Fund Grant. Jamie's superb work has led to the extension of his contract through to March 2022, and an increase in his hours to include Tour Guiding and Piping for visitors. Finally, we said goodbye to Alice Hoon in July 2021 and wish her all the best in her new childminding venture.

With COVID restrictions easing over the summer period, the team were able to reopen Dunollie to members of the public. Initially this was concentrated on pre-bookable activities, but with further easing the core team managed a 4 day a week opening during August and September. This proved crucial in terms of gaining trading income, but also for engaging audiences. During the winter months, the team worked hard to pilot new activities and site hire, as well as reintroducing larger events such as Dunollie Makes Christmas.

Further work on the Castle Access Project was completed towards the end of 2021, and is due for completion by the end of 2022, and the Castle Phase III works were signed off by the Design Team in the autumn of 2021. There were many generous donations towards Phase III, for which we were extremely grateful, and we would like to thank the North American Clan for their contribution towards the work to improve access. Being able to access the First Floor is hugely exciting, and the team are committed to continuing conservation work on this important monument.

Through the work of Jamie MacGregor, we have been very pleased to be able to restart some of the Dunollie Links Programme. This includes welcoming the New Routes group back to Dunollie and we wish to thank them for all their hard work looking after the Grounds. The Gaelic Sessions are now being conducted online and in person, reaching a worldwide audience. We are also very pleased to have welcomed Threads and Yarns back to Dunollie and are extremely grateful for their help in the Draper's Shop.

If there is one thing that we have learnt throughout the past few years, it is that we should not underestimate the importance of digital in keeping us all connected. Several projects have ensured that this is at the forefront of what we do, and we are very pleased to say that 'Dùn Ollaigh - A Great Stronghold Film' is available to purchase from 'Explore Online' section of our website. In addition, we launched a new online version of the Draper's Shop at the end of January 2021. This venture has so far proven invaluable in generating additional revenue for the Trust. This was particularly important during the period where we were unable to open the site to the public.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Further good news arrived at the end of November 2021, when the National Heritage Lottery Fund awarded the Trust £114,854 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund for a yearlong project focused on Gardens, Links and Digital (GLAD). The project, which will cost £120,597 in total, began in March 2022. Supported through the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Dunollie GLAD will concentrate on adding to and upgrading Dunollie's Historic Woodland Grounds, providing engaging activities for the local community, as well as family days out and activities for a younger age group and identifying and capitalising on further digital opportunities, such as QR codes. Through the grant, we were pleased to welcome Caroline Boswell and Aidan McCuish as Heritage Garden Leaders, and Iris Piers as Digital Content Assistant in February 2022. These posts will be in place for the duration of the project.

Finally, the Board were delighted to welcome two new Trustees Tony Hill, former Director of the Manchester Museum of Science and Industry, and Eilidh Young, Director of the Highlanders Museum in Fort George. Tony and Eilidh were elected as Appointed Trustees at the December 2021 AGM.

The pandemic has tested Dunollie financially, however the hard work and tenacity of the team, our valued volunteers and Trustee Board, has been an invaluable resource. We wish to thank each and every one of the individuals who has come forward to help enable Dunollie to keep going. We are looking forward to collectively continuing to bring about the positive change Dunollie needs to continue to thrive.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Organisational structure

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is governed in accordance with its memorandum and articles of association. Membership of the charity is open to any individual or organisation interested in supporting the objectives of the charity, subject to the approval of the Trustees.

There are two categories of membership:

- a) voting members which includes the "MacDougall of Dunollie Members" comprising Mrs Morag MacDougall Morley and her successors as the hereditary Clan Chief, together with not less than two other members of the MacDougall of Dunollie family. This category is open to any individual residing in the UK, or any organisation a majority of whose members are resident in the UK.
- b) Non-voting members, which category is open to any other individual or organisation interested in supporting the objectives of the charity.

There must be a minimum of 3 Trustees serving on the Board, and a maximum of 11. The hereditary Chief of the Clan MacDougall, plus not more than 2 other persons nominated by the family will be entitled to be "MacDougall of Dunollie Trustees". There are also up to 6 "elected Trustees", and up to 2 Trustees selected for their particular interest in supporting the Objects, "appointed Trustees". At Trustee meetings the quorum is 5, of whom the majority shall be elected or appointed trustees, but must include at least 1 family trustee. One third of elected Trustees retire at each AGM, but are eligible for re-election. Appointed Trustees hold office only until the next AGM, but may be re-appointed. Trustees nominated by the family are exempt from the requirement to retire.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Investment powers, policy and performance.

In accordance with the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Trustees have the power to invest in such stocks and shares, investments and property in the UK as they see fit. The Trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing in funds and have retained investment managers to manage the funds and investments of the charity on a professional basis. The Trustees regularly review the performance of the investments made on behalf of the charity.

Governance and internal control

The Board of Trustees continues to assess and identify any major risks, both external and internal, to which the charity is exposes and monitors the systems set up to mitigate these risks.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

10. TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS - continued

Land and property represents a balance of £2345 in respect of a breakwater constructed in 2010, the initial costs of £40681 for constructing a holiday chalet/lodge on the Island of Kerrera in 2013, together with the initial professional and other fees of £6531 related to the development of the 1745 House and Museum. As the construction of the chalet was funded by a drawdown of funds from the endowment portfolio, the lodge was included in the endowment fund. During the year the trustees agreed to release the chalet from the endowment fund and it was transferred to the general fund before being sold. Fixtures and Fittings consist of £5000 spent in connection with the chalet.

Dunollie House and 1745 Museum

On 14th January 2014, Dunollie House, the 1745 museum wing, the North Wing and various other areas of land were leased at a nominal rent to the Preservation Trust by the MacDougall Family on a 99 year insuring and repairing lease.

Dunollie Projects Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Trust was set up to carry out the development and enhancement of these assets, to run the museum, manage events, attract funding and increase public involvement. This subsidiary is now dormant and all these responsibilities have now been taken over by the Trust.

11. HERITAGE ASSETS

Heritage Assets held by the Trust consisted of a number of assets which were gifted to the Trust in January 2000. Only the Burial Ground which was purchased in a separate transaction had been reflected in the accounts at cost. During the year the remaining assets held by Dunollie Projects Ltd, Dunollie & Gylen Castles were transferred to the Trust.

The Brooch of Lorn was revalued by The National Museum of Scotland at £175,000 and this is now reflected in Heritage Fixed Assets. The brooch is currently held by THe National Museum of Scotland.

Restricted Funds received during the year:

MGS Recovery & Resilience Fund. Has allowed the trust to continue by assisting with wages and overhead costs and allowing the team to carry out essential maintenance on site. This assistance will continue into 2021/22.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund. This was all spent during the year. It enabled the team to recreate and educate within horticulture, expand the community programme and increase the digital content for worldwide interest.
