Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Hope Connections is a charity focused on alleviating poverty of all forms for people most on the edges of society in Glasgow, especially those living in Poverty of HOPE. We bring hope, positive connections, and lasting relationships for people trapped in cycles of addiction, reoffending, homelessness, and poor mental health, helping them to stabilise, to recover, and to thrive, as no one's past should define who they are today.

The team are just there and just care, in hours and out of hours, going towards the pain as Peer Mentors, Connectors, Navigators, and Advocates; bringing the power of Changed People Changing People so that people make that critical first step into recovery, knowing they are not alone as they continue on their personal journey.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

2021 was a period of transition and growth for Hope Connections. We emerged stronger than ever from COVID, having played a vital role in ensuring that those most on the edges in Glasgow did not get missed or dropped by support agencies and services. We operated as a critical extension for Social Work and other services in reaching those who struggled to engage with services, offering practical and psycho-social supports. Indeed our work in this area was held up as exemplary in the formal evaluation of the Glasgow Overdose Response Team (GORT), where Hope Connections was the only organisation named as an onward referral partner who ensured continuity of support and relationships for people who are most at risk of harm in the city.

2021 will also be remembered as the year when we launched our partnership with HMP Barlinnie, our team working in The Hub three days per week with both General Population and Remand prisoners. The team has been doing exceptional work, simply being there and offering hope and positive connections, leading to support from the gate on liberation to help people transition and integrate into their local communities of place, interest, and shared experience - all critical to helping people settle and reduce the risk of reoffending.

The work in The Hub has included Recovery Groups, Seeking Safety Sessions, and other psycho-social interventions to keep people stay engaged in support available in the prison and be ready for connecting into different support options following release. For the Remand prisoners, we have also been scoping access to the cells in the Courts, so the Hope Connections team can carry and share a message of hope at every opportunity before the individual walks out the door and back into society - we aim to divert and promote positive choices at every opportunity.

The Hope Connections team also offer pop-up support sessions at the Glasgow Access Hub and in Recovery Cafés across the city. They are there to share the assets and connections available via our Hope Connection Network and to offer immediate support as Mentors, Connectors, Navigators, and Advocates.

The team support people into harm reduction services and have opened pathways into rehabilitation support services across the UK. This is essential as there is lack of capacity in Glasgow for the demand, and some people prefer to be in services outside the city to embark on their recovery journey.

The human and social impact of the work being completed is self-evident as lives and whole families are transformed by the support and social connections being offered. Our Stories of Hope are powerful, and these will be showcased in our new web site to be launched in 2022.

It is a privilege to be part of Hope Connections and to Chair our amazing Board of volunteers who are committed to supporting the team to maximise their impact into 2022 and beyond. One thing for sure is that the need for hope and positive connections is only going to increase in our post COVID world, so we will do our bit to ensure that Hope Connections continues to shine some light in the darkness in our prisons, crisis centres, homelessness hubs, recovery cafes, and communities across the city for many years to come.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2021

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Results

During the year to 31 December 2021, the charity had total income of £176,510 (2020:£100,330), expenditure of £67,428 (2020: £137,258) resulting in a net surplus of £109,082 (2020: deficit -£36,928).

The charity's total reserves at 31 December 2021 were £126,045 (2020: £16,963) and of these, the unrestricted reserves total £7,631 (2020: £16,693).

Principal funding sources

The principal income is that of grant income and donations. In 2021 Hope Connections received funding from: Impact Funding Partners, Zuill Charitable Trust, Robertson Trust, Foundation Scotland, Adapt & Thrive, Corra Foundation, Arnold Clark and The National Lottery.

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to have unrestricted reserves equivalent to 6 months unrestricted expenditure which amounts to £31,765 for the year ended 31 December 2021. At balance date the charity held free unrestricted reserves of £11,033. The trustees are aware that this policy is not being met and aim to build unrestricted reserves through income generation.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Hope Connections, previously Whiteinch Transformation, is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The charity follows the rules and regulations of the Companies Act 2006 and purposes and administration arrangements are set out in the memorandum and articles.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The board regularly reviews the opportunities and challenged ahead as Hope Connections seeks to develop, recruiting trustees with a blend of missional and business experience.

Organisational structure

The charitable company is managed by the trustee committee and run day to day by staff and volunteers.

Induction and training of new trustees

On the recruitment of new trustees they are given documentation on their responsibility as a trustees and an explanation of their duties and briefing from current trustees.

Key management remuneration

The trustees are deemed to be the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. All trustees give their time freely and no trustee received remuneration in the year.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant
- Investment income is included when receivable
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activities are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverable, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance
- Income is only deferred when:
 - -The donor specifies that the grant or donation must be used only in future accounting periods; or
 - The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Office & Other Equipment - 25% on cost

Taxation

Hope Connections is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
