## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

## Objectives and aims

HOPE Connections is a charity focused on alleviating poverty of all forms for people most on the edges of society in Glasgow, especially those living in Poverty of Hope. In 2022 we continued to bring hope, positive connections, and lasting relationships for people trapped in cycles of addiction, reoffending, homelessness, and poor mental health. HOPE Connections helps them to stabilise, to recover, and to thrive, because no one's past should define who they are today. We were also there for the families impacted by their loved-one's struggles - as they are often the blameless victims of the chaos that ensues when someone is trapped in a seemingly inescapable cycle of despair and apparent self-destruction.

Our amazing team continued to go towards the pain, jumping-in beside people as Peer Mentors, Connectors, Navigators and Advocates; walking-with people and bringing the power of Changed People, Changing People so they make that critical first step into recovery with hope and positive connections in their lives, knowing they are not alone as they continue on their personal journey to unlock their full potential and become whoever they want to be.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

2022 was another fantastic year for HOPE Connections, where we continued to reach and positively impact the lives of people across Glasgow who needed some hope and support the most, with our person-centred and trauma-informed work being recognised at the highest levels in a motion of thanks placed before the Scottish Parliament.

We continued to engage and build lasting relationships with people known to justice, addiction, mental health, and homelessness services to offer intensive one to one practical and psycho-social support, and critically, we also focused on reaching those not engaging with any services but who are struggling with highly complex and interdependent challenges in their lives. We believe that no one is hard to reach, only services are, which is why we assertively go into communities to build relationships and provide a bridge into the appropriate statutory and community supports, whilst continuing to walk with people on their journey and live life with them on their terms.

We consolidated our partnership with HMP Barlinnie, bringing our powerful group work sessions and one to one supports into their Resource Hub, whilst helping to plan for the launch of the new Wellbeing Hub that opened in Q1 2023. Our presence on the ground four days per week allowed for lasting relationships and trust to be developed with the general and remand populations we work with, which is vital as many of the men we support have suffered trauma in their lives, often rooted in adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), and many find it difficult to form meaningful relationships and to reach out for support.

We continued to support men on release, including making Custody to Rehab pathways a reality, giving people the best possible start by being there for them, by offering practical support, by opening doors to positive connections, and by just offering a supportive connected community to belong to. We also supported women in the new Community Custody Unit in North Glasgow that became operational in October 2022, and we continued to expand our support services for women involved in the justice system across the city.

## **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

The Outreach Team continued to take self-referrals via our 0800 number, and we continued to operate as a trusted and extended support partner for statutory bodies, commissioned services, and other charities. We maintained a visible presence in the Homelessness Access Hub in Glasgow city centre, in the daily Recovery Cafes across the city, and in homeless accommodation services, doing all we could to be there for the next person who just needed someone to jump in beside them, walk with them, and live life with them.

We continued to grow the power of our HOPE Connection Network of support organisations in and around Glasgow and we extended our network to national and UK levels in specialist areas such as addiction rehabilitation support options, where being away from the city is the best option for building someone's recovery resilience.

The human and social impact of the work we deliver is self-evident as lives and whole families are transformed by the support and social connections being offered. Our Stories of Hope are powerful, with some highlighted on our website launched in early 2022 (www.hopeconnections.scot). This impact led to requests from NHS, Council, and Scottish Prison Service partners to replicate the HOPE Connections model in their local authority areas, which we plan to progress during 2023.

It is a privilege to be part of HOPE Connections and to Chair our amazing Board of volunteers who are committed to supporting the team to maximise their impact into 2023 and beyond. On behalf of the Board, I want to thank our incredible staff team and volunteers who are out there touching and transforming lives every day, and our portfolio of partners and funders who allow us to develop and do what we do, and who share our passion for unlocking the potential in everyone, no matter where they're at today. During 2022, we were privileged to receive funding from the following sources:

- National Lottery Improving Lives Fund
- People's Postcode Trust
- CORRA Drugs Improvement Fund
- VOLANT Charitable Trust, supporting our work with women
- Bank of Scotland REACH programme
- GCVS Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund

As we continue to live life in a post COVID world where many people are struggling financially and where way too many people are battling with poor mental and emotional health, we want to continue to be there to offer support and positive connections for those who need them most. The need is sadly only increasing but we're committed to doing all we can to stand up, step out, and shine some light in the darkness in our prisons, crisis centres, homelessness hubs, recovery cafes, and communities across the city for many years to come.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Financial Results**

During the year to 31 December 2022, the charity had total income of £147,745 (2021: £176,510), expenditure of £134,070 (2021: £67,428) resulting in a net surplus of £13,675 (2021: £109,082).

The charity's total reserves at 31 December 2022 were £139,720 (2021: £126,045) and of these, the unrestricted reserves total £12,290 (2021: £7,631).

## Reserves policy

The trustees aim to have unrestricted reserves equivalent to 6 months unrestricted expenditure which amounts to £67,035 for the year ended 31 December 2022. At balance date the charity held free unrestricted reserves of £12,290. The trustees are aware that this policy is not being met and aim to build unrestricted reserves through income generation.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Hope Connections, previously Whiteinch Transformation, is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The charity follows the rules and regulations of the Companies Act 2006 and purposes and administration arrangements are set out in the memorandum and articles.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The board regularly reviews the opportunities and challenged ahead as Hope Connections seeks to develop, recruiting trustees with a blend of missional and business experience.

Organisational structure

The charitable company is managed by the trustee committee and run day to day by staff and volunteers.

Induction and training of new trustees

On the recruitment of new trustees they are given documentation on their responsibility as a trustees and an explanation of their duties and briefing from current trustees.

Key management remuneration

The trustees are deemed to be the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. All trustees give their time freely and no trustee received remuneration in the year.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Hope Connections ("the charity") is a Scottish charitable company limited by guarantee. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC028928) on 8 April 1999. Its registered address is c/o Brett Nicholls Associates, Herbert House, 24 Herbert Street, Glasgow, G20 6NB.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities:
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

#### Income

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes Unconditionally entitled to the grant
- Investment income is included when receivable
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activities are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverable, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance
- Income is only deferred when:
  - -The donor specifies that the grant or donation must be used only in future accounting periods; or
  - The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Office & Other Equipment

- 25% on cost

#### **Taxation**

Hope Connections is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
