Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016

The Trustees are pleased to present their Report together with the Consolidated Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2016.

Status of Charity and Governing Document

Cove Park ("the Charity") is a company limited by guarantee (No: SC201042, incorporated 26 October 1999) and is therefore governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is a registered Scottish charity, reference number: SC029530. The wholly owned subsidiary, Cove Park Enterprises Limited, is a company registered in Scotland (SC200626).

Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are appointed as and when required by the Charity's needs. Appointment is through a process of criteria that has been agreed upon by the current trustees, and the period of appointment is in accordance with the Articles of Association. New trustees are provided with information which aims to familiarise them with the charity's values, aims and objectives, together with its day to day operations in addition to clarifying their statutory responsibilities as directors of a company limited by guarantee and trustees of a charity.

Administrative Structure

The trustees meet around three times throughout the year to discuss the operations of the charity, while the day-to-day running of the charity is delegated to Julian Forrester, with the support of the directors.

Statement of Risk

The trustees continually review and assess the major strategic, operational and financial risks to which the Charity is exposed. From this review, the trustees continue to update and establish procedures to mitigate those risks which are identified as a result. Main risks that have been identified are:

- Direction and Forward Planning of the Charity
- Control of Charity Assets
- Personnel
- Financial Management & Controls

For each of these risks, procedures have been put in place to mitigate and reduce the associated risk.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016 (cont)

Charitable Objectives

The primary aims of the Charity are to advance the education of the public in all aspects of contemporary artistic practice by:

- providing residencies for individuals and collaborating groups which offer them the time, space and freedom to undertake significant research, to make new work and to find new ways of working.
- facilitating collaboration, the exchange of ideas and dialogue among resident artists.
- encouraging participation by the public in the process of making new work by means of events, workshops, special projects and public occasions.

Achievements and Performance

Cove Park's new artists centre, the Jacobs Building, opened in July 2016 following nine-months of construction. Designed by CameronWebster architects and named after Founders Peter and Eileen Jacobs, the building doubles the space we have for both resident artists and for activities, public and private, which accompany their residencies.

The building is modest and as such very effective, a statement more about the dramatic scenery that surrounds it than about itself. It echoes a traditional Scottish homestead with larch cladding, a black corrugated iron roof and internal exposed roof timbers. It is open inside, fostering a sense of community which is of course central to our work with artists.

Three organisations gave significant sums of money which transformed our campaign for capital funds: Creative Scotland, the Monument Trust and the Robertson Trust. A complete list of supporters, individuals as well as organisations, is at the end of this Report. We are grateful to them all.

We are also grateful to the team which managed the construction of the new building. Clarks Contracts completed it almost within schedule and in spite of January weather damaging the building and delaying construction. We are grateful to the work of the whole team, including QS Doig & Smith, Engineers ATK and Max Fordham and Catharine Kidd our Project Manager.

The building enhances our work in four different ways:

- 1) We can use the facility 12 months a year. The former centre was not weather-proof.
- 2) We have three distinct work/meeting spaces and a library/IT area which means that for the first time more than one activity can happen at the same time. The former centre had one large communal space.
- 3) We have two more bedrooms (both disabled accessible), from ten to twelve, increasing both our capacity for residents and our earnings from income-generating self-funded and partnership residencies.
- 4) In combination, these points a) transform our offer to artists from across the UK and abroad; b) allow us to attract partner organisations with first rate facilities through which to collaborate on projects of mutual interest across all the art forms and c) enable us to run a comprehensive community and education programme, Hands-On Cove Park.

Hands-On is built upon the community and education projects we have run since 2004, programmes such as Artists in Schools and After School Art Clubs. Thanks to the new facilities and to the generosity of the Paul Hamlyn Foundation we have added a year-round programme of such activities that are led by and respond to the work of our artists. This programme now also includes workshops, masterclasses and other public events for all ages and for our wider community throughout Argyll and Bute. In addition, and thanks to the Robertson Trust, we have taken on additional staff to run this programme.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016 (cont)

A Summary of Activities in 2016:

Craft and Design included textile designer Jennifer Kent, developing new work for an exhibition at the Lighthouse in Glasgow; Silversmith Max Warren and textile artist Celia Pym, whose work will feature at the V&A in October 2017. Dutch architect Erno Langenberg was the International Craft resident working on 3D printed ceramics. The RCA, Design Products department graduate residency went to designer Thomas Leech and a pilot Emerging Architecture residency was run in collaboration with NVA and was awarded to Glasgow based architect Andy Campbell. We also took part in the Craft Scotland Meet Your Maker programme in association with the Year of Architecture, Innovation and Design, presenting Jennifer Kent and Andy Campbell.

Literature saw the first year of the Publishing Scotland – funded Translation Programme in partnership with Norwich Writers Centre which we brought two translators for four weeks each. Anne Brauner from Germany and Clara Pezzuto from Italy worked on commissions for Scottish books, bringing Scottish literature to an international audience. The UK writers who came covered a range of genres, including biography (Rachel Holmes); memoir (Marion Coutts) and poetry (Susan Wicks). Susan Wicks is also a distinguished translator and came during the translation programme, giving a very interesting amplification to both programmes. Our emerging writer programme was also very strong, with three strands: a poet/artist from Royal Holloway, Zillah Bowes; a fiction writer from Birkbeck and our Scottish Emerging Writer, Lindsay May.

Visual Arts awarded residencies to 8 artists in 2016. From Scotland, artists Laura Aldridge and Douglas Morland both developed significant bodies of new work leading towards solo presentations. With support from the Bridge Awards, the Emerging Artist in Scotland residency was awarded to the Glasgow-based artist Sarah Wright. Following intensive periods of exhibitions and public projects, the UK-based artists Simon Bedwell and Jess Wiesner both joined us for one month. Our One-to-One residency, for those collaborating on new projects, went to curator Padraic E. Moore and visual artist Ian Whittlesea. Finally, the international residency was undertaken by the New Zealand sculptor Dane Mitchell.

Performing Arts selected Scottish-based projects for performing arts residencies which are funded by the Jerwood Charitable Foundation. Their funding made possible a total of four group residencies led by 1) Ross McKay developing combined storytelling, puppetry, magic and theatre; 2) Tim Cooper, re-imagining his practice with new collaborators; 3) Ellie Griffiths finding a starting point for a multi-disciplinary performance piece for neurodiverse audiences; 4) Simone Kenyon working within performance, somatic education and eco-psychology.

Hands-On Cove Park. The launch of Cove Park's new Artists Centre made possible Hands-On Cove Park: a new participatory and educational programme informed by and connected to our annual residency programme. Aimed at Cove Park's local community in Argyll & Bute, but also welcoming participants from throughout Scotland, a number of new initiatives and projects took place in the latter part of the year. These include a Holiday Art Club 'Prints of Play' led by textile designer Laura Spring; the Masterclass 'Developing Your Design Process through Drawing, Colour and Pattern', led by kinitwear designer Jennifer Kent, and '1973: Dance and Movement Workshop' led by choreographer Janice Parker (and produced in partnership with Luminate, Scotland's Creative Ageing Festival). These projects were all devised and led by our former residents. In the autumn, Cove Park also launched its Saturday Art Clubs for children aged between 8-11 and 12-18, led by professional artists. The Club for older children is the first National Art & Design Saturday Club in Scotland, part of a UK network organised by the Saturday Club Trust.

Future plans

2017 will be the first full year of our occupancy of the Jacobs Building. During it and over future years we will expand the number and variety of artists we work with as well as build new partnerships, not only to earn additional revenues from increased use of the residency accommodation but also to explore projects and subjects of mutual interest with other arts, creative industries and higher education organisations, here and abroad.

We will embed residencies in architecture and film and maintain our long-standing residencies in crafts, literature, performing and visual arts; we plan to expand our programme of complimentary residencies - for example, a relationship with the BBC Writers Room, a hothouse for script writers; we will continue the Literature Translation programme, residencies for translators of Scottish literature; we will launch new residencies for those artists specialising in printmaking and moving image and develop new partnerships to support this. Our performing arts programme will grow to include new partnerships with national and London-based theatre organisations and we will devise a new annual programme of interdisciplinary residencies, as well as those for musicians and composers in particular.

Hands-On Cove Park is embedded in our work and discussions are underway for a continuation for up to two more years from 2018 of the generous funding from both the Paul Hamlyn and Robertson Trusts. As our programme develops, so too will our work in this area, maximising opportunities to bring musicians, composers, filmmakers, playwrights and producers to work alongside our local community in Argyll and Bute. We look forward to working with the Bridge Awards again in 2017 and to organising future creative excursions to Edinburgh and London for members of Cove Park's NADSC.

Our Business Plan 2018-2020 covers in particular and in some detail our plans for mentored and themed residencies and masterclasses, curatorial residencies, professional and creative development events - all designed to intensify the experience of anyone on a residency.

Having served as Trustee almost since the company's formation, John Dover resigned in March 2017. We are grateful for his always wise financial advice and oversight over many years. In March 2017 we welcomed two new trustees: Roberta Doyle and Max Carruthers. Max provides consultancy services to the insurance industry, technology companies and private equity houses and Roberta's background is in marketing and PR, retiring as Director of External Affairs with National Theatre of Scotland in March 2017.

Financial Review

The consolidated gross income for the year was £958,445 (2015: £782,710) with £38,592 (2015: £28,895) coming from charitable and trading activities, which arose in the wholly owned subsidiary Cove Park Enterprises Limited. There was a consolidated net surplus for the year of £669,285 (2015: £191,696) and a breakdown of this between the funds is detailed on page 10.

The financial statements show a consolidated position of funds totalling £1,593,035 (2015: £923,750), which is split between restricted and unrestricted funds as detailed further in notes 19 and 20.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The charity trustees (who are also directors of Cove Park for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue its activities.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, as issued by the Financial Reporting Council (effective 1 January 2016) ("FRS 102"), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (as amended by Update Bulletin 1).

The company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transition value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary Cove Park Enterprises Limited on a line-by-line basis.

Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty or receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations, are recognised when they have been communicated is received in writing with notification of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Legacy gifts are recognised on a case by case basis following the granting of probate when the administrator/ executor for the estate has communicated in writing both the amount and settlement date. In the event that the gift is in the form of an asset other than cash or a financial asset traded on a recognised stock exchange, recognition is subject to the value of the gift being reliable measurable with a degree of reasonable accuracy and the title to the asset has been transferred to the charity.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the statement of financial activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2016

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:-

Buildings	-	2% on cost
Leasehold property improvements	-	10% on cost
Computer equipment	-	15% on cost
Fixtures & fittings	-	15% on cost
Plant & machinery	- .	20% on cost
Motor vehicles	-	25% on cost

The construction of a new artists centre continued in the current year and the costs have been capitalised as assets under construction. As the centre construction was not complete at the balance sheet date, no depreciation has been provided.

Land is not depreciated.

Stock

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Fund Structure

Unrestricted income funds comprise those funds which the trustees are free to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objects. Unrestricted funds include designated funds where the trustees, at their discretion, have created a fund for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor or trust deed.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in notes 19 and 20.

Donated Assets

All receipts of fixed assets by way of gift are capitalised and included in the balance sheet. The market value of the gifted asset is credited to the unrestricted fund, against which depreciation is charged in accordance with the relevant accounting policy.
