Report of the Directors For the Year Ended 31 March 2014

The Directors are pleased to present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2014.

Structure, Governance and Management

Edinburgh Young Carers Project is a company limited by guarantee, with the liability of members limited to £1 (one pound) each. It is governed by the terms of its Memorandum & Articles of Association and is a registered Scottish charity.

The powers of the company are exercised by the "Council of Management", which comprises the Directors of the company and other persons co-opted by the Council in accordance with the Articles. Since all present members of the Council are also directors, they are referred to as "the Board of Directors" in this report and the financial statements. The directors are also trustees of the charity.

Directors are appointed through a formal application to the Board and an interview with Board members. All prospective members are required to meet criteria outlined in the Directors' role description and three satisfactory references and a satisfactory criminal records disclosure are also required. Final appointment is made at a meeting of the Board of Directors.

All Directors receive an induction to Edinburgh Young Carers Project to familiarise them with the role and organisation. New Directors are provided with relevant papers, reports and organisational policies. Access to ongoing training and development opportunities are provided on a needs-led basis.

Strategic decisions are taken by the Board of Directors and day to day management is delegated to the Head of Service. Where appropriate, detailed briefs are produced and presented to the Board by the Head of Service or other members of staff within their specific areas of expertise.

The names of those who served on the Board of Directors during the year and other general information are listed on page 2.

Risk Management

The directors are aware of the major risks, financial and otherwise, affecting the charity and consider that appropriate procedures are in place to mitigate those risks. They are committed to an ongoing quality assurance process and continued monitoring of risk.

Objectives & Activities

Objects and Aims of the Project

The principal objects of the charitable company are to relieve the poverty and distress, increase the health and welfare, and advance the education of young people with caring responsibilities in Edinburgh. The objects and powers are set out in more detail in the company's memorandum.

The mission of Edinburgh Young Carers Project is:

- To make a positive and demonstrable difference in the lives and futures of young carers and their families across Edinburgh;
- To provide support for young carers which meets their individual and collective needs and fosters their confidence and self esteem;
- To work in cooperation with other agencies, such as education, social work and health for the benefit of young carers and their families.

Report of the Directors (continued)

Objectives & Activities (continued)

In furtherance of its objectives in the year 2013-14 the service set out the following priorities:

- 1. to enable greater identification of, and support to, young carers in Edinburgh through working directly with primary and secondary schools to develop awareness raising and whole school approaches in line with Getting it Right for Every Child (GIRFEC);
- 2. to provide tailored support to 150 young carers through group and individual work;
- to provide specialist support to 25 young carers who are caring for a parent with substance addiction issues;
- 4. to provide the opportunity to take part in a variety of residential trips to over 40 young carers across the 5-20 age group;
- 5. to further develop opportunities to use young carers to promote work in schools and to set up and run satellite groups, based around schools, in local youth clubs;
- 6. to improve the 'moving on' of young carers as their need for support reduces particular attention should be given to supporting this group to make the transition beyond EYCP's provision;
- 7. to update our website and social networking sites on a regular basis and include information for young carers.

Achievements & Performance

There have been some significant developments across Edinburgh Young Carers Project (EYCP) over the last year.

These key developments include significant improvements to how the organisation is viewed externally and the expansion of our remit to new areas such as working with local employers to open up work experience and employment opportunities for young carers who are leaving school. There have also been changes in the organisation's referral and assessment process which helps ensure that young carers get access to support that meets their specific needs. EYCP is continuing to enhance its monitoring and evaluation system to enable it to better track the support provided to young carers and identify progress and outcomes achieved. It has also been able to improve its ability to engage with young carers in school with funding from NHS Carers' support and the Big Lottery Fund.

An external evaluation was carried out during May to September 2013 with the resultant report "Who do you belong to" being published in October 2013. The overwhelming message from the evaluation was that "EYCP is highly rated and valued by young carers, their families and key stakeholders. It is delivering an excellent service that responds to individual needs and which young carers themselves play a key role in shaping. EYCP is clearly addressing a gap in provision for a very isolated and vulnerable target group, with only a small number of the young carers interviewed receiving support from another organisation".

It was apparent throughout the evaluation that EYCP is delivering high quality and valuable support and services that make a hugely positive contribution to the lives of young carers, their families and society.

The value of the support provided by young carers to their families is immense, both in personal terms and cost savings to NHS Lothian, Edinburgh City Council and the tax payer in general. It is undeniable these young people are providing invaluable caring services at no cost, for which society is indebted to them and owes a duty of care for their welfare. Without organisations such as EYCP most young carers would continue to remain unidentified. They would not have access to important services that can help improve their wellbeing, safety, personal development and ability to enjoy as normal a childhood as possible. It is therefore vital that the value of young carers to society is communicated effectively so that we can all better acknowledge the important role they play. This includes working with statutory funders and other partners so that additional funding can be secured for this work.

Report of the Directors (continued)

Achievements & performance (continued)

For 2013-14 the charity reports the following achievements against objectives:

- 1. We have provided tailored support to 200 young carers (138 in 2013).
- 2. 50 schools in Edinburgh are now directly involved with the Schools Awareness Raising Project: 'In-school' provision that has been implemented over the last year includes:
 - a. identifying 110 hidden young carers through our schools project;
 - b. breakfast clubs;
 - c. lunch clubs;
 - d. 6-8 week 'After-School' clubs have been delivered in some primary schools;
 - e. 1:1 support is available to pupils in school.
- 3. We have provided support to 40 young carers who are caring for a parent with substance addiction issues.
- 42 young carers took part in a variety of residential trips across the 5-20 age-group.
- 5. We ran 2 peer support sessions in schools. 16+ young carers took part in training and then codelivered sessions to S3 & S4 pupils.
- 6. 'Moving on' and additional support has developed over the year, which means that when young people are ready to leave there is transitional support to other agencies within the community.
- 7. We have improved the use of our website and social media channels to communicate relevant information to young carers.

Plans for the future

Edinburgh Young Carers Project has developed a 3 year Strategic plan (2014-17) which sets out our vision for the next 3 years, how we will fund and deliver it, and how we will make a difference in the lives of the young carers who use our services. The 5 Strategic areas we will focus on are:

- 1. to provide specialist services to Young Carers across Edinburgh;
- 2. to sustainably develop EYCP's capacity to deliver growth in volume and quality of support to young carers (this will include the increased engagement of volunteers in the delivery of activities);
- 3. to promote the development of support for young carers;
- 4. to work effectively and collaboratively with relevant partner agencies across the sector;
- 5. to inform Policy and Practice.

It is estimated that there are over 5,000 young people in Edinburgh, aged between 5 and 18 years old, providing varying levels of care for other family members, of which only 200 (4%) are being currently supported.

We are committed to growing the service over the next 3 years and will secure the funding to allow us to do this. By 2017 EYCP will be a sustainable voluntary organisation making a positive and demonstrable difference in the lives and futures of over 500 young carers. We will employ a full-time development worker to work with our 5-9 year old young carers and develop our support to families. This will allow the 16+ development worker to dedicate time to the transitional support required in progressing from being a young carer to being a young adult carer. Furthermore we will respond to the significant increase in referrals for young carers caring for a parent(s) with problematic drug and/or alcohol issues, by employing an additional part-time drugs and alcohol worker.

We will continue to align our aims and objectives to relevant Scottish Government and local authority policies and strategies that are relevant to young carers and their families such as the 'Getting it Right for Young Carers – The Young carers Strategy for Scotland 2010-2015' and the Edinburgh Joint Carers Strategy – 2014-2017.

Report of the Directors (continued)

Financial Review

There were net outgoing resources of £4,017 during the year comprising a net decrease of £19,517 in restricted funds and a net increase of £15,500 in unrestricted funds, as detailed in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) on page 8. This compares to net outgoing resources of £29,701 in the previous year.

Details of the movements on each fund and explanation of its purpose are shown in note 7 on page 14. Total funds carried forward amount to £120,233, of which £7,308 is restricted and £83,249 is designated with the remaining balance of £26,676 in the general fund. In view of the net increase in unrestricted funds it has been possible to add £10,000 to the contingency reserve to bring this closer to the reserves policy, as outlined below.

Details of grants receivable and other voluntary income are shown in note 2 on page 11, which shows an overall increase of 33% over the previous year. Due to the additional funds received the charity has been able to extend its activities to identify and work with young carers who were previously hidden and had very little, if any, support.

Expenditure in the SOFA has been classified according to the cost of each charitable activity and an alternative breakdown by type of expenditure is given in note 3 on page 12. There has been an overall increase of 20% in expenditure, largely due to an increase of some £50,000 in direct charitable expenditure on project worker costs and activity costs, in line with the increased funding received in the year, as noted above. There was also a one-off cost for evaluation fees of £9,990 in connection with the development of a Big Lottery bid, largely funded by a grant from the Big Lottery Development Fund.

Reserves Policy

The policy of the Board is to maintain reserves at a level of at least 3 months' expenditure. The present amount in the designated contingency reserve is £80,000, which is equivalent to between 2 and 3 months' expenditure at present levels. There is also an amount of £29,676 in the general fund but this is considered necessary to fund the day to day needs of the charity.

Small Company Provisions

This report of the directors has been prepared taking advantage of the small companies exemption of section 415A of the Companies Act 2006.

Report of the Independent Examiner To the Directors of the Edinburgh Young Carers Project

I report on the accounts of the Edinburgh Young Carers Project for the year ended 31 March 2014, which are set out on pages 8 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of directors (trustees) and examiner

The directors, as trustees of the charity, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 (the 2005 Act) and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year ended 31 March 2014

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities, issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

The accounts are prepared on the going concern basis which assumes the charity will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The charity's ability to continue in operational existence depends on continuing and sufficient funding support.

Core funding has been granted by the City of Edinburgh Council, NHS Lothian, Big Lottery and other bodies. On the basis of these income streams, the charity's current reserves and cash position, the Board believes there are sufficient resources to enable it to meet operational expenditure over the next 12 months. Applications for additional funding sources have been submitted and the charity will continue to seek funding for the following 12 months. The going concern basis of preparation is therefore considered to be appropriate.

Grants and Donations

Income from annual grants is recognised in the period to which the grant relates. Any grants received in advance are included as deferred grants in creditors.

Income from other grants and donations is recognised on receipt. Where a grant or donation is received for a specific purpose, it is included in restricted income and any unexpended portion carried forward as a restricted fund.

Resources Expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. As far as possible costs are attributed directly to the various categories of charitable expenditure. Staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent on each activity by employees and other overheads according to estimated usage.

Governance costs are those associated with the general running of the charitable company rather than the charitable activity; they include the cost of preparing and independently examining the annual accounts and a proportion of staff costs and overheads associated with meetings of the trustees.

Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives at the following rates:

Computer equipment:

33% per annum

Other equipment & furniture:

20-25% per annum

Pensions

The company contributes defined contributions to personal pension plans for certain employees. Contributions are charged to expenditure as they become payable.

Taxation

The company is a recognised charitable body and is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activity. It is not registered for VAT and expenditure includes VAT where appropriate.

Funds

Unrestricted general funds are funds which can be used in accordance with any of the charitable objects of the charity at the discretion of the directors

Designated funds are funds set aside by the directors out of unrestricted general funds for specific purposes or projects.

Restricted funds are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when use of the funds is specified by the donor or when the funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Notes on Funds:

- (1) The CEC Drugs & Alcohol Team has continued to provide funding on a yearly basis, at present until the end of March 2015. The restricted fund also includes a grant of £8,616 from the R.S. Macdonald Trust, which is the first of 2 years' funding for work with young carers affected by the substance abuse of a parent.
- (2) The schools awareness raising project is funded by the Big Lottery Third Sector Early Intervention Fund, over 2 years, and by various Trusts.
- (3) Income for *residentials* includes £5,000 from NHS Lothian and £15,504 from trust funds and other sources.
- (4) Young carer development worker posts for various age groups have been part-funded by BBC Children in Need (£68,895 spread over 3 years to November 2015), the Robertson Trust (£14,000 p.a. for a further 2 years), CEC Self Directed Innovation Fund (£29,152 over the year to December 2014), the Gannochy Trust (£7,000 spread over 3 years to March 2016) and EVOC Early Years Change fund (£2,735).
- (5) The Friday Drop-in group and the Music group have received funding from trust funds.
- (6) The Big Lottery has provided a development grant for evaluation work in developing a stage 2 application for 5-year funding for work providing respite and support for young carers.
- (7) Grants for individual young carers are applied for and received on their behalf and paid out to them directly.
- (8) The Contingency Reserve fund has been set aside in accordance with the charity's reserves policy which is set out in the annual report on page 5.
- (9) The Fixed Asset Fund corresponds to the net book value of the fixed assets. Annual depreciation is charged to the fund and the cost of fixed assets purchased is transferred in.
