# Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

# OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The company's objects are to:

- Address the issues associated with disadvantage and inequality
- Improve access to health improvement opportunities
- Promote a community development approach to community capacity building in the local area.

Our current business plan commits us to develop services and activities, on the following social objectives, aiming to support:

- People with poor mental or physical health to raise their aspirations, make informed lifestyle choices, and improve their life chances;
- Older people facing social isolation to enable them to reconnect with their local communities, participate in positive activities, and improve their life chances;
- Families, in particular carers, to counter disadvantage and influence decisions that affect them, their health and well-being, their relations, and neighbourhoods;
- Local volunteers, to build their capacity to make a positive difference in their lives and communities.

When it is complementary to the charity's objects, the charity is guided by both local and national policy.

# Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

Action Plans are set out for the year in separate documents and detail the activities and services of the charity which include: healthy eating cafe, health improvement services, such as healthy cooking classes, complementary therapies, physical exercise activities, community events and art and cultural activities. The successful Connects2 project, funded by Big Lottery Fund to develop activities and services for older people, is now in its third year of its second phase and has funding in place until October 2019. In the past year the project exceeded its targets and worked directly with 294 older people, delivering 24 hours of positive social interaction per week for 40 weeks per year and involving around 23 older volunteers. The impact of the project is significant - our evaluations indicate the project has a positive effect on the health and wellbeing of older people, who report they experience a more positive outlook on life, increased friendships and social networks and better able to cope with life circumstances.

This year saw the fourth and final year of a contract with the NHSGCC to deliver community health initiatives in north west and north east Glasgow - in partnership with another Glasgow based healthy living centre. Fortunately our recent tender to renew the NHS contract was successful. Axis Health Hubs has a further five year contract - with a set core budget and additional optional annual budgets. Annexe Communities therefore continues to operate Axis Health Hubs initiatives in Easterhouse and Drumchapel, working with around 100 residents in each neighbourhood and supporting local volunteers.

Facilities hire - occupancy rates remain high for the prime day time slots. Evening slots and weekends are hired to external groups on an ad-hoc basis to meet demand.

To ensure stakeholders are kept up to date with current events and programmes, we regularly update our website and Facebook pages and publish quarterly information leaflets and brochures.

A total of 11,161 attendances (footfall) were recorded utilising all activities and programmes from April 2016 to March 2017, including outreach activities.

A total of 757 individual beneficiaries registered and participated in healthy living interventions, including, community development activities, health improvement activities, learning programmes and art activities. We actively encourage referrals from partners to enable their clients to access our services such as health walks, one-to-one support, healthy eating workshops, complementary therapies and exercise programmes. We are pleased that by working with our partners we can offer a holistic approach to the issues arising from poor health, poverty and disadvantage.

The purpose of the Annexe cafe is to provide a community focal point, bringing people together in a welcoming and inclusive environment to eat and socialise in a facility which promotes healthy eating. The footfall above does not include the community cafe, however we estimate an annual cafe footfall of 8,000 - with around 300 unique customers. During 2016-17 the cafe had a turnover of £22,318. This year the Fareshare supermarket surplus scheme was introduced, which meant lower operating costs. As a result the cafe's deficit is reducing - this year only £752 compared to a deficit of £3,000 in 2015/16. The board is committed to subsidising the cafe, if necessary, in order to maintain the essential cafe services which benefit the most vulnerable members of our community. A full annual report detaining all activities is published each year in October to launch our Annual General meeting.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Principal funding sources

Next year (2017/18) our core costs will amount to around £125,000, including building and café costs. We anticipate raising this amount from earned income, recovered overheads from projects and contracts and we anticipate make a small surplus.

#### Reserves policy

The Board has examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy to designate funds as follows: £50,000 for redundancy costs and £20,000 for specific strategic purposes including future business growth and improvements to the ground floor of the Annexe building. A further £10,000 has been set aside for replacement of essential equipment.

This year £5,000 of the equipment fund was used to purchase a replacement vehicle, essential for transporting equipment and café supplies, however this fund has now been topped up from our year end surplus. The Board is confident that at this level they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity. In the short term the Board has also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure could be curtailed, should such circumstances arise. In the long term the strategy is to continue to build reserves through increasing social enterprise opportunities and planned operating surpluses:

#### Results

Finances have been fairly stable this year, although it is still difficult to plan or develop services long term. This year we raised £14,339 rental income and recovered a further £27,537 costs for premises. The charity continues to operate a full cost recovery financial model. And, we are pleased that due to robust financial management, the charity, with the support of funders retained a steady turnover, with a net increase in core funds of £23,966

#### **Summary**

The Charity generated income of £402,637 (2016: £418,963) and expenditure of £367,396 (2016: £401,866) resulting in a surplus of £35,241 (2016: £17,097).

At balance date the Charity's reserves stood at £380,743 (2016: £345,502) with £373,892 of these being unrestricted (2016: £335,042).

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

In the next year we plan to seek funding for phase two of our building refurbishment plans: improvements to the ground floor and café space. Our stairlift has recently been condemned and a replacement has been estimated at £22,000. This is essential for ensuring the building is accessible and therefore a replacement will be priority. We will continue to develop and deliver the activities and services outlined in the action plans in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding and contract arrangements. We have recently secured one year funding from the climate Challenge Fund to run a community food waste initiative which will utilise surplus supermarket stock to provide twice weekly lunch clubs for older people.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 19th January 2001 and registered as a charity on 28th March 2001. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. Under the requirement of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the two directors who have been longest in office shall retire from office each year. The company may at any general meeting re-elect any member director who retires from office. Due to the community based nature of the charity's work, The Board seeks to ensure that the wider community is appropriately represented through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool of trustees, the charity has actively encouraged user groups and beneficiaries of our services and through networking with local community partners and organisations, sought to identify those willing to become members of the organisation and use their own experience to assist the charity.

#### Organisational structure

Annexe Communities Board may have of up to 12 directors of which nine should be member directors and up to three Appointed Directors, who meet as a full board or as a designated sub group of the board at least 10 times per year.

The board of directors is responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. During 2016-17 the board had nine directors from a variety of backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the general manager.

The general manager is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that work-plans are carried out. The general manager is also responsible for the day to day operational management of the organisation and its services including outreach services and individual supervision of the staff team. The general manager also has a responsibility for driving the strategic development of the charity along with the business development sub-group of the board. The general manager and the staffing sub-group of the board work to ensure that staff develop their skills and working practices in line with current good practice. Other short term sub groups are created on an ad hoc basis as the need arises:

## Induction and training of new trustees

Directors are familiar with the practical work of the charity and are regularly kept up to date through reports and background information. Directors are encouraged to attend information and training sessions pertaining to the services of the charity and any external training which may be appropriate.

#### Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is one member of key management, the General Manager. The gross salary paid to this post in 2016-17 was £39,021.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Risk management

The Board has conducted a review of the major external risks to which the charity is exposed; these are outlined in the current business plan. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. External risks to funding have led to our strategic objective to increase our self-generated income and to recover overhead costs on a full cost recovery basis from grant and contracts. In the current economic climate we are aware of the continuing challenges facing voluntary organisations and we anticipate cut backs to public spending and subsequent reduction in grant funding.

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, and visitors to the centre. The Annexe cafe has once again renewed its Scottish Healthy Living Award to demonstrate our commitment to offering healthy and affordable food locally. Indeed, this year the cafe achieved the Healthyliving Plus Award, indicating further commitment to serving a healthy menu.

This year the board opened a savings account with the Charity Bank, thus ensuring the risk of exceeding the FSCS current compensation limit of £85,000 per authorised bank is mitigated. This deposit will also generate a small sum in interest. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.
