



THE DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31 MARCH 2021

The directors of Cove Burgh Hall present their annual report and accounts for the year ending 31 March 2021.

Cove Burgh Hall was established as a company under a Memorandum of Association to promote the benefit of the Cove and Kilcreggan community by the provision of facilities for recreation or leisure time occupation for use by local organisations or individuals, with the object of improving the conditions of life of such persons.

The members of the company are established under Articles of Association that set out the rights and obligations of such members, how directors are appointed/removed and how such directors are required to manage the company. The company established "Friends" of Cove Burgh Hall as a means of encouraging more active participation in the running of the company. Any person may become a Friend on the payment of a nominal sum, and while a Friend, is deemed to be a member of the company.

Cove Burgh Hall was incorporated as a private company limited by guarantee on 22 March 2001. No share capital is authorised or issued. The original six subscribing members of the company, who were all directors, are limited in the event of a winding up of the company, to their guarantee of £1 each. This guarantee has been paid in full.

Cove Burgh Hall was registered as a charity on 22 March 2001 with the object as set out above in the Memorandum of Association.

DIRECTORS AND THEIR INTERESTS:

The directors as at 31 March 2021 are Mr C Morrison; Mr G Bell; Mrs M Morton; Mr C Donnelly; Ms R Grierson, Mrs S Edwards; Mr N Isaacs; Ms A Morrison (Chairperson); Mr R Reeve, Ms R Wishart; and Mr J Webb. No director has received any remuneration for services to the company as a director.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Basis of Preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), including the provisions of Section 1A relevant to Small Entities; Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities; the Companies Act 2006; the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention

Going Concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for at least the next 12 months. Thus, the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.



Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are those which can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds are funds which can only be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the relevant restricted fund.

Income

All income, including revenue and capital grants receivable, is recognised in the Income and Expenditure account when there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay, when it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will arise and when the amount can be measured reliably.

In accordance with the provisions of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, a qualified independent examiner has examined the accounts, and that the examiner's report is attached hereto.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES:

All the activities of the company during the year were in the furtherance of the charitable objectives set out in the Memorandum of Association. In particular, activities centred on operating, maintaining and upgrading the Hall to provide a clean, warm and secure place for the local community to use. To keep the costs of hiring the Hall by the community as low as possible, and so encourage community use, the company sought sources of income, other than hire income, through such activities as fundraising.



REVIEW OF THE YEAR TO 31 MARCH 2021

Income:

Income for the year was £34,599. It has been an unusual year due to the restriction presented by the Covid Pandemic, with no revenue from our regular users and only a virtual Book Festival to contribute to our usual healthy entertainment calendar. In difficult circumstances we have managed to secure grant funding from Energy Saving Trust, Creative Scotland, National Lottery Awards for All and The Corra Foundation to the sum of £31,903 for the installation of and new Electric Vehicle Charge unit, Book Festival, remedial works to the façade and replacement of the oil tank.

Fundraising is an important source of funds and contributes to the company's mission in adding value to the social fabric of the community through provision of high-quality productions in music, drama and concert. The ongoing fundraising through Live@CBH was reduced to only a virtual Book Festival this year which was well received. This was due to the closure of all halls and venues across the UK. We will hopefully see the reopening of the hall this summer and an exciting new calendar of events in the coming year.

There were no Hall lets with regular user groups and private hire activity being halted due to closure and Covid restrictions in place

Friends showed a decline this year probably due to the current climate and uncertainty. Friends overall remain a major resource to the company, not just in income terms, but, as members of the company, they play a key role in the success of the Hall as volunteers, promoters, and potential directors. They will also, be important to bring the Hall back to life once the restrictions are removed.

Expenditure:

Expenditure for the year was £41882. The bulk appears under Major Projects relating to final completion of Phase 1 of the façade, remedial works, EVC, replacement of the oil tank and professional fees amounting to £21358. This has been a complex management process over a two-year period. Phase 1 is now complete and all funding from LEADER and HES now received. The EVC has been funded through a grant from Energy Saving Trust and sees the Hall moving forward with green solution for the community. We have also received support from The Corra Foundation with the replacement of the oil tank. Exemption for Water charges was again secured for the year. We maintain a tight control of our general running cost under difficult circumstance showing regard for the safety of the building and personnel.

Balance Sheet:

Net current assets as of 31 March 2021 stood at £45,549. This is represented entirely by the cumulative Profit and Loss account. We are showing a loss of £7,283 for the year, this is due unforeseen exceptional circumstances, yet we have managed to move forward maintaining the Hall and managing our financial resources. The company has no significant debts, continues to move forward cautiously, and it sits in a good position regarding reserves. That said, it is increasingly challenged by the current situation into the coming year. There will probably be very little activity until the second half of the year, that said we will strive to reopen and maintain a safe community hub for the future.

That said, it is essential that income streams from hires, Friends and Gold Friends, Live@CBH events, donations, and grants revitalised to ensure continuing financial stability. At the heart is re-engaging the energies of our invaluable volunteers, along with renewal to include the many new residents who have recently moved into the community.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Directors of Cove Burgh Hall, Scottish Charity Number SC031296

I report on the attached accounts of the charity, Cove Burgh Hall, for the year ended 31 March 2021.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by Cove Burgh Hall and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Independent Examiner's Statement
