Structure, Governance and Management

The management committee of the charity are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees. As set out in the constitution, the management committee will consist of six collective members including a minimum of chairperson, secretary and treasurer, plus three external members shall be appointed from outwith the organisation who will have an advisory role. Appointments from the membership of the treasurer, secretary and chairperson can be made at the annual general meeting and these appointments should be for one year and may only be renewed for two subsequent years.

Objectives and Activities

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee, and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association.

The objective of the charity is to provide a long term service to women and girls who have been raped, or in any way sexually assaulted. In furtherance of this objective, the charity shall have the following aims:-

- i. To support women and girls who have been raped and/or sexually abused at any time in their lives and to provide them with information on legal and medical matters.
- ii. To obtain help and support, where needed, from such agencies that are sympathetic to the stated aims.
- iii. To encourage research into the causes of rape and sexual abuse, and into any ways of preventing or relieving the suffering caused by the sexual assault, provided such research is compatible with the other aims of the organisation.
- iv. To keep statistics and basic reports that will facilitate that research.
- v. To ensure that information which could identify individuals is accessible only to members of the organisation.
- vi. To raise awareness of the general public and professional bodies about the nature and the extent of rape and sexual abuse and to encourage their support and understanding.
- vii. To establish links with any charitable group whose purposes are in keeping with the aims of the charity.
- viii. To do all other things that properly attain the above aims and objectives of the charity.

Achievements and Performance

The charity is committed to maintaining the high standards of the services it provides to vulnerable women that it has achieved during the year and is committed to continuing to provide support to raped and sexually abused women. It will continue to liaise with other organisations in order to maintain its ability to maximise the services it provides.

Results and Financial Review

The results for the year and the charity's financial position at the end of the year are shown in the attached financial statements. The Statements of Financial Activities, incorporating the Income and Expenditure Account, shows a net deficit for the year of £24,576 (2013: net surplus of £10,326) with total reserves of £84,056 (2013: £108,632).

A Word from our Board of Governors

It's been a challenging year for WRASAC with more and more women and young girls coming forward to report their experiences of sexual abuse. The media coverage of many high profile sexual abuse cases during 2013-14 and the resulting convictions, no doubt encouraged many survivors to come forward, sometimes decades later, to report the abuse. The increase put our service under considerable pressure. However, we rose to the challenge and adapted and developed in an effort to meet the demand on our service.

Operation Yewtree and subsequent investigations will without doubt continue to reverberate throughout the coming years, and impact on services. As an organisation, WRASAC needs to be ready to respond, as does society as a whole. Any encouragement for survivors to report the abuse they have experienced is an absolute positive, but statistically the conviction rate remains extremely low and there is much still to be done in order for them to receive justice.

Organisationally, it has also been a year of huge change for WRASAC which saw us putting our aspirations into practice, and moving from a collective to a managed structure. The transition has been relatively smooth and we would like to take this opportunity to thank our stakeholders for their cooperation, and everyone within WRASAC for their support and patience throughout the period of change.

As always, The Board of Governors would like to take this opportunity to thank all workers paid and unpaid who have been involved with WRASAC over the last twelve months for their hard work, commitment and continuing enthusiasm which ensures that the service we provide to women and the work we do in challenging attitudes and informing change, continues at the highest level.

Who used and benefitted from our service?

It's been another incredibly busy, eventful and challenging year for our service. Trying to succinctly outline the main achievements is quite a challenge. We are just 9 months into our new management structure. The whole team has been extremely supportive and open to the many, many changes that have come as a result of this. In consultation with our staff, volunteers, trustees and service users we have now developed our strategic plan for the next 3 years. We have done a lot of work to improve how we monitor and evaluate our service to ensure continued improvement, including, the introduction of OASIS case management system, which Rape Crisis Scotland and its network will be using next year. This has revolutionised our ability to ensure consistency of service and to monitor the quality of our service provision...it also enables us to produce our lovely charts at the click of a button.

Women's Support Service

The demands on our service continue to grow – we've had a 52% increase in the numbers of new women looking for support in the last year. We have supported 350 women, 238 of them were new referrals. Our dedicated team of support workers and volunteers continue to amaze with their endless enthusiasm for the work we do and their commitment to supporting survivors. It's not been easy – we lost a full time support post whilst at the same time, for another year running, seen a sharp increase in the numbers of new referrals to our service.

We have had some bold initiatives to try to do more with less, for example:

- Time limited support
- Alterations to our helpline
- Introduction of more group work

Our hope is that by varying the ways we provide support – we can reach more women. This has helped – \underline{BUT} – we still have significant waiting lists – with many women waiting for more than 6 months for support.

Vice Versa

We provided support to 27 women who are involved in prostitution. We've made some excellent strides through the building of real partnership working with the Women's Criminal Justice Team. We co facilitated a 'Women's Feel Good Group', which supports women with Independent Living Skills.

Prevention & Young People

This has been an extremely exciting and successful development for us. We are working towards delivering the Rape Crisis Scotland 'Prevention Pack' into all schools and among young people across the city. This work is about changing attitudes early, but it has also brought us into contact with new agencies and services – resulting in increasing referrals from young people.

We are now in the process of developing an independent young people's service – our aim is to have this up and running within the next year....watch this space!!!

Volunteers

We are extremely lucky to have a highly skilled and diverse group of volunteers. They have taken the lead in some exciting group work with survivors. We have also seen the introduction of the Befriending project – which is proving to be very popular!

Research into Childhood Sexual Exploitation

We are very excited by the prospect of managing this unique research into Childhood Sexual Exploitation in Dundee. The research is a partnership project with Barnardos, Dundee University, Dundee City Council, Police Scotland and Abertay University. The findings will inform the future planning and monitoring of services to young people who have experienced, or are at risk, of Childhood Sexual Exploitation.

Partnership Working

We continue to work in partnership with organisations and bodies across Dundee and Angus. This has been essential to us raising awareness, at front line and strategic levels, about rape, sexual abuse and exploitation

Reserves Policy

The charity's policy is to hold sufficient funds in reserve to cover the cost of closing down the charity's operations. Specifically, these costs would involve the redundancy costs of its staff, and remaining obligations under the terms of the lease, and three months running cost such as the provision of telephone support cover for a short period of time. The Trustees have assessed the minimum level of reserves required for such closure costs as £70,000, and are happy to report that the charity has sufficient reserves in relation to the policy.

Plans for the Future

We have developed a 3 year strategic plan with ambitious targets and goals and we aim to achieve some of these in the coming year.

Investment Powers

The Trustees have the power to retain, accept, purchase, sell, lease, hold and invest any property, heritable and moveable, real and personal of whatever kind and wherever situated.

Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that the systems are in place to manage exposure to the major risks.

Recruitment & Appointment of New Trustees

Trustees review the skills and composition of the board of Trustees required from time to time. Where new or replacement Trustees are required, a list of potential candidates are to submit a curriculum vitae for consideration by the Board of Trustees, which will then select the most suitable candidates for appointment as Trustees.

Induction and Training of Trustees

New Trustees receive a comprehensive induction pack which includes details of the activities of the charity together with information about their legal responsibilities as charity Trustees, and information relating to the financial and procedural matters of the charity.

Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees

Charity law requires the Board of Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the Board of Trustees should follow best practice and

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed; subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue on that basis.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for maintaining proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 March 2014

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and Regulation 8 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Incoming resources

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:-

- when donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- when donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources in restricted funds when receivable.

Interest

Interest is included when receivable by the charity

Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered as the charity is not VAT registered.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Individual fixed assets costing £100 or more are capitalised at cost.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:-

Equipment

- 25% straight line

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pensions

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the charity during the year. The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme in respect of its employees. The scheme and its assets are held independently. The pension charge represents contributions from the charity and amounted to £18,612 (2013: £17,012).

Unrestricted Funds

These are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees. They are the free funds of the charity that are available to be spent on the direct support of the charitable activities.

Restricted Funds

These are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
