### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 April 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 April 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Significant activities

The charitable purpose and aims of Parkinson's Self Help Group ("PSHG") as agreed by the management group are:

"To create a unique, happy and sustainable atmosphere for people with Parkinson's, their carers and their families. Where they are safe, secure, supported and can be themselves. Exchange and share experiences and problems in a friendly "relaxing environment".

This aim is supported by the following more detailed objectives:

- 1. To provide a range of specific support services to Parkinson's sufferers and their carers, including a range of centre based and external activities for members; outreach services; and provision of a respite service to carers.
- 2. To develop all provision based on the operation of ongoing systems to record and respond to customer needs.
- 3. To ensure appropriate access to services for all potential user groups.
- 4. To promote wider community and public agency understanding of Parkinson's disease, and its implications for sufferers and carers.
- 5. To develop and continually support a user led Board of Directors, and to operate the highest standards of company governance.
- 6. To robustly record and monitor all aspects of company performance.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

The two Activity Days, Respite visits, Befriending, Therapy Services, Welfare and Health advice Outreach & Information service, Hall hire and Weaver's Kitchen are the main services the Charity offers. The Weaver's Kitchen expended its opening days to include a Saturday opening. This was helped by receiving pilot funding for three months from the Airdrie Locality.

#### **Development & Funding**

We continued to work towards our building extension, by obtaining a building warrant, but unfortunately this was followed by our BIG Lottery funding application being unsuccessful. Although a shock to everyone involved with the Group, we turned this into an activity and made a film about how important this Group is to our Members, with James Fagan and the @ Home Centre Youth Group. Simultaneously, Staff carried out dilapidations on No.27 prior to vacating it and moved everything into the Weavers Cottages. This was an extended period of additional work both manually through DIY and mentally through renegotiation of contracts and cost cutting exercises and we thank everyone who helped by taking on extra duties during this time, especially the Local Community Payback Team, run by Jim & Kirsty. We did gain funding through successful application to Lloyds/Henry Duncan, Reshaping Care, NLC Carers Development, NLC GAP funding and Councillors Grants. We also entered into new discussions early this year with Eimear Cassidy, North Lanarkshire Grants officer from BIG Lottery.

#### **Personnel**

Following last summer's funding disappointment, our 5-year BIG Lottery project came to an end and from August we had a much reduced staff, from 7 to 4. Margaret Houston & Billy Irving continued to work with the Group as Volunteers following the end of their contracts. Remaining staff agreed to large reductions in salary to allow volunteers, Kirsty Allen & John Deacon help out, as well as our regular volunteers two Respite Staff and Kitchen Staff/Volunteers. Losing our Volunteer Bus Driver, our other Volunteer Driver, John Mooney also retired at the beginning of this year, through ill-health, following 27 years' service with PSHG.

#### **Activity Days**

To incorporate time for Staff and Volunteers to have Annual Leave, the Board introduced four closure periods during the year. To raise Group spirits Drew and Staff at the Fourways held a Tea Dance to cheer us all up, we held our 27th birthday party there also and had Xmas events for Carers, Group Members and the Rotary Club also held a Xmas lunch for some of our Members. For the first time ever, our Burn's Lunch was cancelled, due to low numbers and we sold our beloved bus to a Glasgow family for days out. We held our Awareness Games with PSHG Motherwell Area during Parkinson's Awareness Week and also held two Tulip Teas in the Weaver's Kitchen which raised awareness of PSHG and raise over £300.

#### PSHG Income Generation- Weaver's Kitchen, Therapy Service & Hall Hires

We welcomes a new Complimentary Therapist to PSHG, Vicki Duffie and were gifted a new Therapy treatment bed by some of our Members. Hall Hires continued on a reduced scale from having No.27 Regular clients from: Moira Anderson Foundation, Cornerstone, Dystonia Society, Wellwynd Art Group, RCA Counselling Services and private hires have assisted in supporting the Charity, staff cover these on a voluntary basis (unpaid).

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

The Weavers Kitchen Cafe introduced a new menu to offer more choice to customers, in addition to providing more support to the Charity, we continued to work customers, in addition to providing more support to the Charity, we continued to work with Tesco Foodshare. Saturday opening was introduced with Pilot funding from Reshaping Care. We passed our Hygiene inspections, Kirsty attained her Rehis Certificate, Shannon passed her City and Guilds- Modern apprenticeship Course at the Bentley Hotel, to become a Comis Chef, we also held monthly Carer's Pamper Lunches.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Financial position**

The charity generated a net deficit of -£59,324 for the year ended 30 April 2017 (2016: surplus £26,271).

At balance date, reserves stood at £17,209 (2016: £76,533), with £10,763 of these being unrestricted, free reserves (2016: £27,680).

#### Reserves policy

Parkinson's Self Help Group (North Lanarkshire) is currently dependant on Project funding to sustain its activities, earned income alone would not allow PSHG to continue operating. This means that if there were to be a gap in Project funding, it is likely that PSHG would have to reduce its main operations and staffing levels. To avoid closure, if funding difficulties were to happen, the PSHG Board has agreed to work towards a reserve target figure of £54,771 to ensure that main operations can continue for a period of 3 - 4 months.

When funding is below this level the Reserves Policy would be implemented.

At the end of the financial year the level of reserves was £17,209, which is below the target.

At this time the main concerns of the Board were to ensure:

- 1. That staff can continue working, primarily to secure funding
- 2. That members/Service Users are supported to move to other services (should it become necessary)/

The level of reserves is monitored every month by Staff & the PSHG Board of Directors.

The gap in Project funding required to be addressed to enable PSHG to increase its income generation over a 3 year period to achieve its target of Reserved Income.

This policy will be reviewed annually and whenever there are significant changes in funding or staffing levels.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document a memorandum and articles of association as a company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the director's there is one member of key management, the centre coordinator. the gross salary paid to this post in 2016-17 was £28,500.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Equipment - 20% on cost Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
