Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 April 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 April 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

The charitable purpose and aims of Parkinson's Self Help Group ("PSHG") as agreed by the management group are:

"To create a unique, happy and sustainable atmosphere for people with Parkinson's, their carers and their families. Where they are safe, secure, supported and can be themselves. Exchange and share experiences and problems in a friendly "relaxing environment".

This aim is supported by the following more detailed objectives:

- 1. To provide a range of specific support services to Parkinson's sufferers and their carers, including a range of centre based and external activities for members; outreach services; and provision of a respite service to carers.
- 2. To develop all provision based on the operation of ongoing systems to record and respond to customer needs.
- 3. To ensure appropriate access to services for all potential user groups.
- 4. To promote wider community and public agency understanding of Parkinson's disease, and its implications for sufferers and carers.
- 5. To develop and continually support a user led Board of Directors, and to operate the highest standards of company governance.
- 6. To robustly record and monitor all aspects of company performance.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

As is now customary, I would like you all to take a few moments of silence, as we remember ALL, of our friends who have passed away, both over the past year and years gone by.

<u>Overview</u>

Parkinson's Self Help Group has a long history of improving the lives of individuals, carers, families and communities, who experience negative physical health, mental health, emotional challenges and barriers due to a neurological diagnosis. Our past and current projects have served to break down these barriers, having a significant, positive impact on individual's happiness, wellbeing and quality of life.

As the only charity in Lanarkshire that offers regular neurological support, 5 days a week, the service is vital to support individuals with a diagnosis and carers. Recognising the importance and experience of early intervention and following a person centred approach, which contributes to self-management and gives control back to people to cope better with the condition they are living with.

The services we provide have been established through consultation with individuals with a diagnosis, carers, individuals, families and communities. This is both written and verbal and helps make sure we learn from each other in relation to difficulties experienced and managing these.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The need for our services has never been greater:

- Waiting lists have greatly increased, impacting on the length of time an individual is waiting to access specialist support and treatments, also the frequency of appointments has decreased significantly since Covid19.
- Around one in six people in the UK have a neurological condition. With the DALY for Lanarkshire being 9.4% higher than the Scottish rate.
- Our members not only have difficulties physically, but they also face daily stigma and discrimination in their community they lose friends, confidence and have a much greater risk of depression. We have seen a decline in both physical and mental health following the pandemic clients are telling us they are more anxious; they have trouble sleeping and we have seen an increase in memory problems (mainly dementia) and decrease in mobility.
- Unpaid carers play a vital role in our society, these demands have increased due to a crisis of resources and funding faced by health and social carer partnerships. This can lead to social isolation, impact on physical and mental health, loneliness, loss of social relationships and lack of support.

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees are aware of their collective responsibility and accountability for the proper governance of the charity. Together with the duty of transparency and accountability. With the overall responsibility to ensure the safeguarding of all who come in contact with the charity, finances and resources.

Services

The charity works to the social model of disability helping us recognise barriers that make life harder for individuals with a diagnosis. These barriers are identified as being the physical environment, people's attitudes, the way people communicate. Removing these barriers creates equality and offers individuals more independence, choice and control.

Our long term aim is to improve the quality of lives of individuals, carers, families and communities who experience negative physical and mental health, social isolation and barriers due to a diagnosis of a neurological condition. Our clients need to know they have somewhere they can feel safe, make friends and who can be given support specific to their circumstances.

Currently we provide a variety of services and activities:

- Complementary Therapies
- Activity days
- Social outings and events
- Guest speakers
- Cafe
- Welfare advice
- Information is given 1-1 but also through our newsletter and social media
- We advocate for our members, making referrals to statutory, charity and community organisations
- Support groups
- Practical and emotional support

We support our members to pursue their interests and hobbies in addition to building natural networks of support. All our services are user-led and will continue to develop. We know that what individuals were looking for in relation to services and supports is different to how we ran 10 years ago.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

We help members by sharing ongoing learning and keeping abreast of research and findings in several areas, not solely condition specific. We continually look at practices and interventions to support a move towards improved physical and mental health.

Our staff and volunteers come from a variety of career backgrounds including social work and health, carer organisation, mental health services, charity, banking. All staff and volunteers strive to establish a trusting and supportive relationship with all members.

<u>Aims</u>

Improving the lives of individuals, carers, families and communities, who experience negative physical health, mental health, social isolation, challenges and barriers due to a diagnosis of a neurological condition.

Outcomes

- Individuals with a neurological diagnosis "feel" more independent.
- Individuals have an increased understanding of a diagnosis.
- Individuals have an increased sense of purpose and belonging.
- Individuals with a neurological diagnosis feel more socially connected.
- Individuals have the opportunity to improve their physical health.
- Individuals have the support to improve their mental health and wellbeing.
- Individuals, carers and families feel less stressed about living with a diagnosis.
- Individuals are better able to manage physical symptoms in day to day life.
- Carers and families will be better able to cope with their caring role.

Evidence

We regularly use a number of evidence collection methods, including verbal feedback from members, staff and volunteer observations, 5 point rating scale and attendance levels.

We distribute a service form to our members annually, where they evaluate the services, we provide.

Third party verbal feedback from carers, families, other services and community.

We strive to develop close and supporting relationships with all members to enable them to be comfortable in providing feedback.

All of the above is recorded and evaluated, in order to evidence the success, achievement of outcomes or proposed changes re services and activities.

Outreach

One of the key areas identified as a need, by Staff, Volunteers and the Board of Trustees, is to increase our efforts and resources in relation to outreach work to ensure that all of those who would benefit from the services and activities are aware of the charity. Establishing and growing close working relationships with statutory, voluntary and community organisations and the wider community and individuals. Being part of the consortium and other groups allows us to benefit from the knowledge and experience of others and to promote our services. Referrals are received through these established networks and individuals signposted to our services.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Funding

We are currently funded through a number of different funding streams both national and local. RS MacDonald, National Lottery Community Fund, North Lanarkshire Council, BOS Foundation, and the Community Solutions framework. We would like to thank these funders for their on-going support. As you will appreciate funding is an on-going challenge for the group, the Board of Trustees and staff continue to strive to ensure financial security for the coming years.

Fundraising/Donations

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I would like to thank those individuals and groups who have made donations over the past year.

A number of fundraising events have taken place over the last financial year. We would like to thank those that gave their time to organise, attend and help us raise some funds.

Future Sustainability

We generate, annually, income via Hall Hires, our café, therapy room rent, fundraising and donations. The Board of Trustees and staff have worked to develop a 3 year financial plan. This sets out how we will ensure our future running costs can be met and ensures strong financial governance.

Along with income generation and our donations, we will identify a broad base of funders.

We plan to hold interagency and intergenerational projects to reduce expenditure, sharing of expertise, knowledge, resources and strengthening partnerships.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The charity generated a net surplus of £56,429 for the year ended 30 April 2023 (2022: deficit of £3,032).

At the balance sheet date, reserves totalled £92,961 (2022: £36,532), which comprises unrestricted free reserves of £32,295 (2022: £21,090) and restricted funds of £60,666 (2022: £15,442).

Reserves policy

Parkinson's Self Help Group (North Lanarkshire) is currently dependant on Project funding to sustain its activities, earned income alone would not allow PSHG to continue operating. This means that if there were to be a gap in Project funding, it is likely that PSHG would have to reduce its main operations and staffing levels. To avoid closure, if funding difficulties were to happen, the PSHG Board has agreed to work towards a reserve target figure of £38,000 to ensure that main operations can continue for a period of 3 - 4 months.

At the end of the financial year the level of free reserves was £32,295, which is below the target.

At this time the main concerns of the Board were to ensure:

- 1. That staff can continue working, primarily to secure funding
- 2. That members/Service Users are supported to move to other services (should it become necessary)

The level of reserves is monitored every month by Staff & the PSHG Board of Directors.

The gap in Project funding required to be addressed to enable PSHG to increase its income generation over a 3 year period to achieve its target of Reserved Income.

This policy will be reviewed annually and whenever there are significant changes in funding or staffing levels.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a memorandum and articles of association as a company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New Trustees are identified in two ways, either they approach the Board of Trustees registering their interest or the Board of Trustees approach an individual to gauge their interest.

A meeting then takes place with the individual the Chairperson and either the Secretary or Treasurer to discuss further. The suitability of the candidate is decided at this time.

If suitable they are invited to attend a Board Meeting, to gain a greater understanding of the running of the Board of Trustees and meetings. They are made aware of the responsibilities and the personal liability that the position holds. It is then decided by the Board if the appointment is approved and seconded.

If appointed, the new Trustee receives a copy of our Constitution and all relevant policy documents together with the Board of Trustees confidentiality document, which requires to be signed.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the directors the member of key management is the centre coordinator. The total employer cost paid to this post in 2022-23 was £27,540 (2022: £27,358).

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Parkinson's Self Help Group (North Lanarkshire) ("the charity") is Scottish charitable incorporated organisation governed by its constitution dated 3 April 2003. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC034256) on 3 April 2003. Its registered address is 23-25 Wellwynd, Airdrie, ML6 OBN.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities;
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer Equipment

20% on cost

Office & Other Equipment

20% on cost

Tangible fixed assets

It is the policy of the trustees to capitalise any tangible fixed assets purchased where the cost exceeds . £1,000.

Taxation

Parkinson's Self Help Group is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
