TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Forth Environment Link (the company) for the year ended 31 March 2016. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

OBJECTIVES

The objectives are namely the advancement of education, learning and behaviour change in matters relating to the natural world, sustainable and active living.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers support a range of activities within the organisation from attendance at events to participation in led rides. Providing structured and relevant volunteering opportunities is fundamental to the operation of the charity and FEL is constantly looking to improve upon and review the volunteering experience. The Board of Trustees gratefully acknowledges the support and commitment of our volunteers across all FEL work streams.

Achievements and performance

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

Zero Waste Volunteer Community Advocate Programme (VCAP funded by Zero Waste Scotland)

The Zero Waste VCAP project is funded by Zero Waste Scotland and continues to develop the work undertaken in previous years to stimulate awareness and motivate positive behaviour change around waste and reuse. The project involves working closely with targeted communities across the Forth Valley from July 2015 through to June 2016, focusing on encouraging and supporting communities to reduce waste and increase recycling and reuse rates.

Over the last twelve months FEL has attended 98 events, engaged with over 16,000 people (1,893 face to face + 14,712 online) and trained 25 volunteers to deliver cascade training. Strong partnership working has been a key element of this work and has involved partnerships with: University of Stirling, Stirling Council, Start Up Stirling, Tullibody Community Garden; Braehead Community Garden, Sunlite Café Community Garden and many others.

- 2. The Forth Valley Orchards Initiative (funded by the Central Scotland Green Network)
 The Fruit Futures Project aimed to work with projects operating in areas within the lowest 15% in the Scotlish Index of Multiple Deprivation and / or located in or near areas of derelict or vacant land. The project set out to:
 - 1. Train and support community and Eco-school leaders to design, develop and support their community orchards through a series of workshops, events and networking opportunities.
 - 2. Identify and seek to develop a demonstration project with a hope of identifying other sites which might be used to showcase best practice within the sector.

An additional four schools were supported as part of the Tullibody Orchard development funded by the CSGN Orchard Futures Fund (Abercromby, St Bernadettes, Banchory and St Serfs primary schools).

The Master Orchardist Volunteer Programme - A funding contribution to the Fruit Future Project was made by Helping Britain Blossom through The Urban Orchard Project, and funded by Heineken UK Ltd and The Bulmer Foundation, to launch and deliver the Master Orchardist Volunteer Programme (MOVP), the first of its kind in Scotland. Eight Master Orchardist Volunteers (MOVs) were recruited from across the CSGN area.

Although not directly connected to the Fruit Futures Project, FEL became the Local Facilitator for the National Orchard Inventory Survey in Forth Valley, a collaborative project between Orchard Research & Enterprise, CW Hayes Associates, Scottish Natural Heritage and other local partners to research and record orchards across Scotland as a foundation for the wider aim of an orchard revival.

FEL was funded by CSGNT to deliver a series of Continuing Professional Development (CPD) sessions based on FEL's Teachers' Resource Pack©, to teachers in the Inner Forth Landscape Initiative (IFLI) area. CSGNT also funded FEL to deliver three public orchard workshops aimed at people with no tree maintenance experience.

Orchard Collective Scotland (OCS) - Membership of this Facebook group continued to yield benefits, through sharing online information, and attendance at the OCS gathering at the Seed & Tree Festival in February, where the FVO team, MO volunteers and FFP projects gave input to the discussions on the future direction of the OCS in Scotland.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

3. Grow Forth Local Food Network (funded by Climate Challenge Fund)

The aims of the Grow Forth local food network are to help connect and support communities across Forth Valley to grow their own food, to help people source local food and to encourage more people to eat local food.

Grow Forth received Climate Challenge Funding to run a one year food project called Get Ready for Local, from April 2015 until March 2016. The principal aims of the project were to:

- help communities in and around Stirling adapt to a less secure food future by becoming more resilient and creating a local food culture and legacy
- encourage and enable communities to mitigate carbon emissions via food waste reduction

The project engaged and supported 354 people on the food waste challenge, saved 63.86 tonnes of C02e lifetime and saved 3.2 tonnes of food waste. FEL delivered 67 workshops across a range of food topics in communities and held 21 events. Three bespoke training sessions for business ambassadors were held and a pilot local and fresh vending machine study was run in Forth Valley College. 43 people volunteered their time for the project and 5 people received qualifications.

4. Cycle Stirling

Cycle Stirling is a network of cyclists and cycling interest groups who promote safe cycling for all ages and abilities to everyday destinations. Cycle Stirling aims to reduce car journeys and create a healthier population and a more sustainable environment. The work of Cycle Stirling is coordinated through FEL.

Cycle Stirling co-ordinated a series of stakeholder meetings and a cycle ride for key local influencers to look at cycling and walking infrastructure locally.

Stirling Cycle Hub (funded by Transport Scotland, in partnership with Abellio ScotRail Ltd)
Stirling Cycle Hub is a national pilot project which aims to promote and increase cycling. Based at
Stirling Train Station, the Hub provides information and resources about cycling and active travel,
organises community events and activities, and develops partnerships in the local community.
The Hub celebrated its second birthday with Cabinet Secretary for Infrastructure, Investment and
Cities, Keith Brown in May 2015. The Hub welcomed a total of 12,673 visitors, delivered 254 events
and handled 2,236 route planning enquiries. Partnership projects with Recyke-a-bike and Edinburgh
Bike Station saw the delivery of an outreach programme delivered as part of the Cycle Friendly
Stirling Partnership and funding secured from Stirling Council's Smarter Choices Smarter Places fund
allowed the development of a tailored employer engagement programme with three large local
employers as well as the launch of a Festival of Cycling for Stirling.

Transport Scotland and SUSTRANS funded the expansion of the Stirling bike share scheme planned for Autumn 2016. Additional investment from Transport Scotland saw the development of a small electric bike fleet to support the development of Hub Meander rides and the employer engagement work.

6. Consulting

FEL undertook a small range of contracts to support local communities with consultations, business planning, network development, funding proposals and the delivery of workshops.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

Investment income is insignificant and no objectives were set.

Financial review

GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The main financial risk is that if insufficient funding is secured there will be implications on the continuing ability of the organisation to deliver its objectives at the current level.

RESERVES POLICY

It is the policy of the organisation to build up reserves by running a surplus if possible. The intention is to build up sufficient reserves to fund at least 6 month's ongoing activities. At 31 March 2016, the level of reserves falls short of this target.

Ongoing funds were secured through Zero Waste Scotland for the Volunteer and Community Advocate Programme through to June 2017.

Structure, governance and management

CONSTITUTION

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Incorporation

The entire activities of the unincorporated body were transferred to the company on 1 April 2006. Membership is open to all persons aged over 18 and living locally. On 10th September 1991 the Inland Revenue in Scotland accepted it as a charity for tax purposes.

Capital structure

On 1 August 2008 the entire assets and undertaking of Forth Valley Food Links a charity and company limited by guarantee, were transferred to the company. The objects of the company were expanded to include awareness of health education as part of its commitment to encouraging good environmental practice.

Principal activities and objects of the company

The objects of the organisation are to advance education with particular emphasis on matters relating to the Natural World. In furtherance of these objects the organisation encourages commitment to good environmental practice by raising awareness of important issues and gathers funds by way of contributions, donations, subscriptions and grants.

The Executive Committee consists of the Trustees and the Executive Director and meets regularly to implement the policy of the organisation as outlined above. The Trustees are unpaid but determine the remuneration of the Executive Director. It is the responsibility of the Executive Director to carry out decisions of the Executive Committee and generally run the day to day affairs of the organisation.

METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

Trustees are appointed by co-option initially and subsequently by election at an Annual General Meeting.

POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

Induction support and a Trustee/Staff handbook are provided to new trustees by the staff team and Chair. The handbook includes a copy of relevant policies, procedures, governance information and role descriptions. New Trustees are inducted through a series of meetings with staff and existing Trustees at Forth Environment Link. During the course of their term, the Trustees are offered the opportunity of gaining understanding of FEL's work during regular project updates and annual organisational training days.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF

The FEL Board consider the board of directors, who are the Charity's Trustees and the Executive Director, comprise the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating FEL on a day to day basis. All Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee received remuneration in the year. The pay policy of the Executive Director is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with inflation. In view of the nature of the charity, the directors benchmark against pay levels in other similar sized and operationally relevant charitable organisations.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

There are no unusual risks that employees are exposed to and insurance is taken out to cover any possible liabilities arising. The main risk to the organisation is financial, since it is dependent on fixed-term project funding for most of its activities. Employees are subject to term contracts, which reflect the period for which funding is available.

Plans for future periods

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Key objectives are to:

- Continue to promote sustainable living through a variety of projects and initiatives
- Expand outreach to target specific groups of people within the community
- Development of new funding streams and new projects to decrease the reliance on core funders
- Ensure the long term economic sustainability of the organisation

Factors that could affect performance are:

- Ability to secure additional funding
- Long term illness/absence of staff
- Changes in core funders' funding strategies

The board and management of FEL continue to work together in order to further the objectives of the organisation whilst minimising exposure to the above risks.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006

Forth Environment Link meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The comparative figures for the year ended 31 March 2015 were unaudited.

1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing these accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatements were required.

1.3 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.4 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.5 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activity on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

1.7 Going concern

In common with other charitable organisations, Forth Environment Link is dependent on income from its donors, grant givers and other supporters to ensure its objectives continue to be achieved for the longer term. The accounts have been prepared on the basis that the charity has the continued support of its funders in the current and future years.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and equipment

25% on reducing balance

Office equipment

25% on reducing balance

Bicycles

25% on reducing balance

1.9 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.10 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.11 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.12 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.13 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.14 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.
