TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purpose of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Forth Environment Link (the company) for the year ended 31 March 2017. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

OBJECTIVES

The objectives are namely the advancement of education, learning and behaviour change in matters relating to the natural world, sustainable and active living.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers support a range of activities within the organisation from attendance at events to participation in led rides. Providing structured and relevant volunteering opportunities is fundamental to the operation of the charity and FEL is constantly looking to improve upon and review the volunteering experience. The Board of Trustees gratefully acknowledges the support and commitment of our volunteers across all FEL work streams.

Achievements and performance

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

1. Circular Economy

Zero Waste Volunteer Community Advocate Programme (VCAP funded by Zero Waste Scotland)

The Zero Waste VCAP project is funded by Zero Waste Scotland and continues to promote product reuse and waste minimisation through a range of direct and indirect behaviour change programmes. The programme of activity operates under three core VCAP principles: 1. Engaging with the public; 2. Promoting and supporting effective recycling behaviour; and 3. Decreasing the amount of food waste produced.

Over the last twelve months FEL has attended 174 events, engaged with over 44,000 people (over 5000 face to face with the remainder online) and trained 30 volunteers to deliver cascade training. Partnerships continue to thrive with the project connecting and working with a variety of local organisations. Each partnership has provided event support; skill sharing; and community advocates and volunteers to the project, which has been highly beneficial to achieving all that we have over the last year.

Partnerships to highlight include: Falkirk Community Trust, Forth Valley College, Tullibody Community Garden, Start Up Stirling, and Recyke-a-bike.

2. Food & Growing

Grow Forth Local Food Network (funded by Climate Challenge Fund)

The aims of the Grow Forth local food network are to help connect and support communities across Forth Valley to grow their own food, to help people source local food and to encourage more people to eat local food. Grow Forth received Climate Challenge Funding to run a one year food project called Stirling Food Hub, from April 2016 until March 2017. The Stirling Food Hub project was developed in response to the learning and legacy of our Get Ready for Local Food Project (GRLF), 2015-2016.

The project focussed on delivering:

- 1. Pilot Food Hub at Stirling Cycle Hub providing a central and recognisable point of information on and access to local food, enabling a range of local food activities to be tested over the course of the year.
- 2. Project Outreach and Support; School Engagement; Business Support and Community Engagement
- 3. Local Food System research project this piece of research identified the components and movement of our local food system from field to fork and was delivered by Nourish Scotland.
- 1,754 people were actively involved with the project with over 2,500 people engaged at events. 1,667 pupils and teachers took part in the food waste challenge with 119.47 tonnes of CO2e saved over the project lifetime. 15 people volunteered their time for the project, 20 people received qualifications in elementary food hygiene and first aid and FEL set up Stirling Food Assembly.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Forth Valley Orchards Initiative (funded by the Central Scotland Green Network Trust and the Inner Forth Landscape Initiative)

The Fruitful Communities Project aimed to support communities to create, manage, care for, use and learn about orchards, through a year-long calendar of learning events and activities, across two key areas:

- 1. Orchard creation, management, care and culture.
- Orchard skill development, training & recording. The project delivered a range of workshops, events, training and information sessions to a variety of community groups, schools and landowners associated with orchards and orchard management.

Fifteen new orchards/habitats were created and over 700 school pupils got involved with the project.

CSGNT provided funding to continue the delivery of a series of Continuing Professional Development (CPD) sessions based on FEL's Teachers' Resource Pack©, to teachers in the Inner Forth Landscape Initiative (IFLI) area.

FEL also continued its role as Local Facilitator for the National Orchard Inventory Survey in Forth Valley, a collaborative project between Orchard Research & Enterprise, CW Hayes Associates, Scottish Natural Heritage and other local partners to research and record orchards across Scotland as a foundation for the wider aim of an orchard revival.

The Master Orchardist Volunteer Programme

Helping Britain Blossom continued their support towards our orchard activity through The Urban Orchard Project. The project, funded by Heineken UK Ltd and The Bulmer Foundation, supported the training and development of a number of Master Orchardist Volunteers. Eight Master Orchardist Volunteers (MOVs) were recruited from across the central belt.

Orchard Collective Scotland (OCS)

Membership of this Facebook group continued to provide on-going promotion, networking and opportunities to connect to the wider orchard community in Scotland.

3. Active Travel

Stirling Cycle Hub (funded by Transport Scotland, in partnership with Abellio ScotRail Ltd)

Stirling Cycle Hub is a national pilot project which aims to promote and increase cycling and active travel. Based at Stirling Train Station, the Hub provides information and resources about cycling and active travel, organises community events and activities, and develops partnerships in the local community. Since opening, The Hub has welcomed 17,565 visitors and held 314 events. Funding secured from The Bike Station Edinburgh continued to support Cycle Hub outreach activity, through the Cycle Friendly Stirling Partnership. Funding was secured from Callander Community Hydro Fund in February 2017 to help deliver a pilot active travel Hub in Callander during the summer of 2017. Smarter Choices, Smarter Places funding continued to support the development of our employer engagement programme in Stirling and Clackmannanshire Councils, with The Hub team working with 14 employers across the regions. Another Festival of Cycling was held in partnership with Parkinsons UK and supported by Stirling Council's Smarter Choices, Smarter Places programme.

The Nextbike bikeshare scheme was expanded in November through additional funding secured from SUSTRANS in partnership with Transport Scotland, which saw the scheme double in size and the usage figures increase by over 300%.

Development of an Active Travel Hub in Falkirk High Street got underway with FEL securing a Licence to Occupy on a town centre premises from Falkirk Council and submitting a funding package to support this work.

Cycle Stirling

Cycle Stirling is a network of cyclists, cycling and active travel interest groups and organisations who promote safe cycling for all ages and abilities to everyday destinations. Cycle Stirling aims to reduce car journeys and create a healthier population and a more sustainable environment. The work of Cycle Stirling is coordinated through FEL.

Cycle Stirling continues to co-ordinate a series of stakeholder meetings which aims to bring cycling and active travel activity together in the area. The group also supported the submission of a number of consultation responses on cycling and active travel issues.

4. Consulting Services

FEL undertook a small range of contracts to support local communities with consultations, business planning, network development, funding proposals and the delivery of workshops. FEL supported the delivery of a community growing feasibility study on behalf of Communities Along the Carron Association (CATCA). North Ayrshire school catering teams were supported in delivering a food waste toolkit in collaboration with and funded by Zero Waste Scotland.

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

We have no material financial investments. All funds are held as cash with UK banks.

Financial review

GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The main financial risk is that if insufficient funding is secured there will be implications on the continuing ability of the organisation to deliver its objectives at the current level.

The Trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks facing the charity and can confirm that appropriate reporting procedures have been put in place to ensure any risks are identified and steps can be taken to lessen their impact.

The Trustees have given special consideration to any risks associated with sustainability of funding, governance, loss of leadership, succession planning, financial management and reputational risk. All of these are managed and reported through the strategic risk register. The risk register is reviewed annually by Trustees in consultation with staff. There are policies, procedures and contingencies in place to minimise any risks identified.

RESERVES POLICY

It is the policy of the organisation to build up reserves by running a surplus if possible. The intention is to build up sufficient reserves to fund at least 6 month's ongoing activities. By the 31 March 2017, the level of reserves falls short of this target.

Funds were secured for FEL to deliver a Reuse programme in Falkirk – Falkirk Revive – from Climate Challenge Fund until March 2018.

Funds were secured from Inner Forth Landscape Initiative (IFLI) for the Forth Valley Orchards' Fruitful Communities project through to June 2017.

Ongoing funds were secured from Transport Scotland in partnership with Abellio ScotRail Ltd for Stirling Cycle Hub through to March 2018.

On-going funds were secured from Bike Station, Edinburgh and Transport Scotland for delivery of the Cycle Friendly Stirling Partnership through to March 2018.

Ongoing funds were secured for Grow Forth (FEL Food) from Climate Challenge Fund through to March 2018.

Ongoing funds were secured through Smarter Choices, Smarter Places for the delivery of an active travel employer engagement programme and a Festival of Cycling until March 2018.

Funds were secured from Callander Community Hydro Fund for a pilot Callander Active Travel Hub.

Structure, governance and management

CONSTITUTION

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Incorporation

The entire activities of the unincorporated body were transferred to the company on 1 April 2006. Membership is open to all persons aged over 18 and living locally. On 10 September 1991 the Inland Revenue in Scotland accepted it as a charity for tax purposes.

Capital Structure

On 1 August 2008 the entire assets and undertaking of Forth Valley Food Links a charity and company limited by guarantee, were transferred to the company. The objectives of the company were expanded to include awareness of health education as part of its commitment to encouraging good environmental practice.

Principal activities and objectives of the company

The objectives of the organisation are to advance education with particular emphasis on matters relating to the natural world, sustainable and active living. In furtherance of these objectives the organisation encourages commitment to good environmental practice by raising awareness of important issues and gathers funds by ways of contributions, donations, subscriptions and grants.

The Executive Committee consists of the Trustees and the Executive Director and meets regularly to implement the policy of the organisation as outlined above. The Trustees are unpaid but determine the remuneration of the Executive Director. It is the responsibility of the Executive Director to carry out decisions of the Executive Committee and generally run the day to day affairs of the organisation.

METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

Trustees are appointed by co-option initially and subsequently by election at an Annual General Meeting.

POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

Induction support and a Trustee/Staff handbook are provided to new trustees by the staff team and Chair. The handbook includes a copy of relevant policies, procedure, governance information and role descriptions. New Trustees are inducted through a series of meetings with staff and existing Trustees at Forth Environment Link. During the course of their term, the Trustees are offered the opportunity of gaining understanding of FEL's work during regular project updates and annual organisational training days.

PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF

The FEL Board consider the board of directors, who are the Charity's Trustees and the Executive Director, comprise the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating FEL on a day to day basis. All Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee received remuneration in the year. The pay policy of the Executive Director is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with inflation. In view of the nature of the charity, the directors benchmark against pay levels in other similar sized and operationally relevant charitable organisations.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

RELATED PARTY RELATIONSHIPS

We are not part of a wider network and have no related parties or subsidiary undertakings.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

There are no unusual risks that employees are exposed to and insurance is taken out to cover any possible liabilities arising. The main risk to the organisation is financial, since it is dependent on fixed-term project funding for most of its activities. Employees are subject to fixed term contracts, which reflect the period for which funding is available.

Plans for future periods

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Key objectives are to:

- Continue to promote sustainable living through a variety of projects and initiatives with a focus on active travel, food & growing and the circular economy.
- Expand outreach to target specific groups of people within the community
- Development of new funding streams, new projects and income generation opportunities to decrease the reliance on core funders
- Ensure the long term economic sustainability of the organisation

Factors that could affect performance are:

- Ability to secure additional funding
- Long term illness/absence of staff
- Changes in core funders' funding strategies

The board and management of FEL work together in order to further the objectives of the organisation whilst minimising exposure to the above risks.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Forth Environment Link meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of financial activity on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

1.6 Going concern

In common with other charitable organisations, Forth Environment Link is dependent on income from its donors, grant givers, and other supporters to ensure its objectives continue to be achieved for the longer term. the accounts have been prepared on the basis that the charity has continued support of its funders in the current and future years.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and equipment - 25% on reducing balance
Motor vehicles - 25% on reducing balance
Office equipment - 25% on reducing balance
Bicycles - 25% on reducing balance

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities Incorporating Income and Expenditure Account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.10 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.11 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.12 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.13 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

11. STATEMENT OF FUNDS (continued)

The general funds are those funds which the trustees are free to use in accordance with the charitable objectives.

The capital fund reflects the net book value of tangible fixed assets and a transfer was made during the year from the restricted and unrestricted funds to achieve this. The fund will be reduced over the useful economic life of the assets in line with depreciation.

The restricted funds are those funds which the trustees use for specific projects as follows;

Cycle Hub - Delivering active travel advice, information and engagement activities at Stirling Train Station.

Zero Waste Community Initiative - Supporting community skills, training and learning around waste, recycling and reuse.

Bike Share - Increasing the number of day to day journeys by bike through an affordable bike share scheme for Stirling.

Grow Forth - Helping connect and educate communities on growing, cooking, eating and buying local food.

Forth Valley Orchards Initiative - Helping develop and introduce new community orchards and supporting their on-going sustainability.
