### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

To operate a public garden and community resource for the benefit of the general public.

To advance education, promote training and encourage volunteering.

#### **Our Vision**

#### **Our Mission**

The Hidden Gardens is an inspirational and accessible greenspace that exists to provide a safe place of sanctuary, learning and participation. It works to promote community integration and intercultural dialogue, and to build trust and understanding between people of all cultures, faiths and backgrounds through horticulture, nature, creativity, and collaboration.

In 2018 our board adopted a 5-year strategic plan. The plan identifies 8 ongoing priorities for the charity:

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable Activities The Year in the Gardens

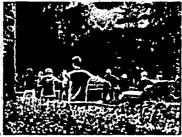
If 2021 was the year we learnt to live with coronavirus, 2022 was the year of developing resilience, as we supported community to once again build trust and confidence that it was safe to engage in face-to-face offers. Thanks to the flexibility and commitment of the community, our trustees, staff, volunteers, and stakeholders, funders and donors, The Hidden Gardens charity has continued to flourish. As the custodians of a beautiful garden and greenspace, we were fortunate to be able to offer visitors, volunteers, learners, and community programme participants support and a safe outdoor environment throughout the year.

The Gardening Volunteering, Learning and Community Programmes steadily adapted to post-pandemic conditions (slightly larger groups, more frequent and for longer sessions) and, together with the Head Gardener, successfully delivered all annual maintenance plan and some garden development projects. The Xylotheque also underwent some maintenance, keeping it safe for the 20 years anniversary in 2023. We were delighted to be able to deliver the first phase of our capital development project this year. As part of a larger ambition to increase our capacity in The Hidden Gardens, we completed an extension to our Boilerhouse community room. Working with Abbot Architecture and Queen's Park Builders, we added a meeting room, kitchenette and cloak area.

A second capital project has been completed now, with a new sheltered workspace outdoors for groups to use. Both of these developments provide a more functional space, allowing us to deliver different programme work simultaneously. A third and final capital development, The Bothy Project, will commence in 2023, and is expected to be completed by early 2024 all being well.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Events, Offers and Activities delivering the strategic priorities, outcomes and

Our main aim is to build trust and understanding between people of all cultures, faiths and backgrounds and our offers are all a means to that end. We target the local communities of the Southside of Glasgow, particularly the immediate neighbourhoods of Govanhill and Pollokshields with our marketing, as well as groups of individuals with specific needs, and we welcome participants and visitors from all over the city and beyond. Our annual programme, co-designed with local people in our advisory group to respond to local needs, aims to contribute to health and wellbeing, to build relationships, to bring communities together, to facilitate learning and to encourage participation and engagement. Beneficiaries face a complexity of challenges in daily life. Most have experienced destitution, or trauma or poverty; mental health, isolation or loneliness. Many live in densely populated tenements with a severe lack of greenspace that feels safe or accessible. The Gardens were created with local community consultation to be safe, neutral, and accessible for all. Over the year we supported more than 4,000 people through delivering the following offers free to the public:

- Gentle exercise for wellbeing (based on Tai Chi movements) on the Lawn
- Gardening Volunteering sessions
- Biodiversity, horticulture and sustainability learning workshops to schools and community groups
- Off-site participant trips
- A series of Cultural Cookery Classes for women
- Men's groupwork support for those who need support sessions delivered using a blended approach of outdoors and indoors.
- Volunteer-led and staff-led tours of The Gardens delivered to community groups
- Events including partnership events, large scale offers and smaller more intimate activities

We delivered these opportunities through building on and establishing new partnerships with other organisations and networks. This work is a model of good practice in community integration, exemplifies socially engaged practice, and strengthens community engagement. A fabulous film created with thanks by a team of young people from GMAC, really sums up how volunteering in a greenspace is so good for our mental health and wellbeing. 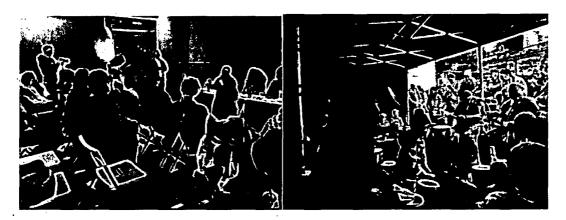

#### Wider benefits / impact

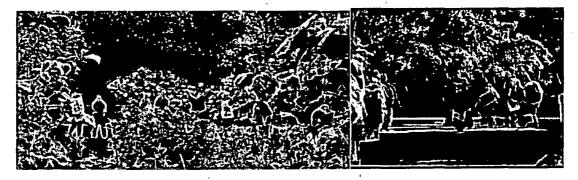
The Gardens were the space of choice to host a number of activities for those seeking solace; supporting key workers during the pandemic. The Sikh community (who assisted families in need during the pandemic) took a moment to remember those who lost their lives, and NHS held a development and relaxation day for their senior nurses. Communities across Glasgow and beyond benefit from The Hidden Gardens expertise - Our plants are also in demand from community groups; further greening the local area. Many local community groups (like Govanhill Baths) and local schools as well as organisations working across the city (like Urban Roots) come to The Hidden Gardens for advice and inspiration about the greening of Glasgow. They look to The Hidden Gardens for plants and ideas and it is lovely to see increased involvement and interest in the local environment.







A key Glasgow visitor and tourist attraction, the Gardens is utilised by all local schools, families, universities, and colleges and other organisations and community groups for many diverse activities and a conservative estimate of 10,000 people visit the space annually, on top of everything else we do. Local people and a breath of organisations also hire the space, and make good use of this resource, contributing towards delivering our vision and mission, and we generate funds from hires, that contributes towards the running costs of staying open and staffed for free for the public to enjoy 6 days a week. As a small charity, raising 100% of funds needed each year to keep the gardens open for free to the public, this is a win win; In total 5,800 people enjoyed the space, between 22 children's parties, 79 learning workshops, 4 meetings, 21 festivals/ events, 1 baby shower, 5 art exhibition / temp installations, 11 music lessons/recitals, 2 conferences, 2 fashion shows, 1 wedding and 1 filming crew.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial position

The charity incurred a deficit for the year of £27,760 (2022: deficit of £12,970).

In total, the accounts show reserves of £95,014 (2022: £122,774), which comprises unrestricted funds of £53,884 (2022: £76,452), designated funds of £17,416 (2022: £12,754) and restricted funds of £23,714 (2022: £33,568).

The trustees are satisfied with these results as the charity is still working to develop the gardens.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Reserves policy.

In so far as cash resources permit the policy of the trustees is to hold in reserve a sum of money equivalent to six months' running costs, the trustees estimate that this equates to approx. £68,815. At 31 March 2023 unrestricted general reserves stood at £53,884 (2022: £76,452), the trustees are aware this policy is not being met and seek ways to generate additional unrestricted funds.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The company is limited by guarantee, incorporated and registered as a charity on 25 August 2005. The company is established under a Memorandum of Association that established the objectives and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. The liability of members is limited to £1 each.

The Board of Directors set the policies of the company and the day to day running of the company is controlled by the management team.

The governing document was reviewed in 2020. A written resolution, dated 25 May 2021, was signed by all members to formally approve and adopt the new Articles of Association.

#### The Hidden Gardens Advisory Group

The Hidden Gardens Advisory Group members are all people who use and care for the garden. Two members are elected to sit on the Board (currently Malcolm and Nicola). Meetings of the Advisory group have taken place and the chair (currently Nicola) reports directly to board meetings. The group makes a valuable contribution to the board's development of the gardens.

#### Trustee recruitment, induction and training

Applicants must submit a standard application form and then are invited to interview.

All board members receive an induction session which includes discussion of the key aims of the organisation, business plan goals, their role and responsibilities as a board member. Additional training is provided as identified by the board or individuals within it.

#### Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees, there is one member of key management, the Chief Executive (post is a job share). The total employer costs relating to this post in 2022-23 were £44,536 (2022: £53,363).

#### Lease with Glasgow City Council

The lease of the land to The Hidden Gardens Trust will be reviewed prior to 31 March 2032.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

The Hidden Gardens ("the charity") is a Scottish charitable company governed by its Articles of Association. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC036881) on 25 August 2005. Its registered address is 25a Albert Drive, Glasgow, G41 2PE.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005:
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities;
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 10% on cost Fixtures & Fittings - 20% on cost Computer Equipment - 20% on cost

#### **Taxation**

The Hidden Gardens Trust is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
