Report of the Trustees
For The Year Ended 31 March 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable Purposes

The object of the charity is to provide a community transport service for such of the residents of South West Ross and its neighbourhood who are in need of such a service, because of age, sickness or disability (mental or physical), or poverty, or because of a lack of availability of adequate and safe public transport services.

The Charity is organised by a part-time coordinator; local volunteers, comprising 11 telephonists and 42 drivers, forming the bedrock of the scheme supporting the isolated communities of Wester Ross by providing transport to local medical appointments, transport links, dentists, social events and local shops and also to providing transport to hospital appointments across the Highlands. Volunteers provide the major "in kind" contribution to the charity. From March 2020 and continuing during 2021/22, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the activities of South West Ross Community Car Scheme (SWRCCS) have responded to new imperatives and constraints and put in place operational changes, working within the objects of the charity and ensuring the safety of service users and volunteers.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable Activities

Charitable Activities

Drivers have undertaken a range of runs:

- delivering prescriptions from the three medical practices
- undertaking passenger runs to the GP surgeries for vaccinations and essential face to face medical treatment with health professionals
- transporting residents to hospitals in Inverness, Broadford and other more distant centres
- transporting residents to centres outside the scheme's catchment area for essential dental and optical appointments
- delivering lunches to vulnerable residents in Applecross
- undertaking runs for exceptional circumstances such as visiting elderly relatives in care homes and other essential journeys.

Volunteer telephonists play an invaluable role in the scheme :

- covering enquiries and bookings from Monday to Friday
- booking drivers for the majority of passenger runs
- keeping in touch with service users through regular telephone calls

In 2021/22 volunteer drivers covering 21,788 miles, undertook 419 runs delivering 1666 prescriptions, and 114 hospital runs, resulting in a percentage increase in organised runs of 4.7% from 2020/21. In addition, the telephonists made 195 call to service users alleviating loneliness and isolation.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Linking with other Organisations

SWRCCS continues to work closely with other organisations and maintains good relationships with their main funders, Highland Council and NHS Highland, providing regular reports on finance and activity. The trustees welcomed the NHS Strategy and Transformation Officer to a Board meeting in February 2022. The Scheme liaises closely with the three medical practices, all of whom have welcomed the prescription delivery service and the transportation of residents for vaccine appointments.

Covid-19

From March 2020, SWRCCS has adapted to changing requirements guided by legislation and safe practice. We have been fortunate to retain many of our new volunteers and, as restrictions have eased during 2021/22, the service has opened up within agreed safety protocols. Online trustee and officer meetings are continuing, however meetings in person and hybrid gatherings now occur as appropriate.

In May 2021, SWRCCS received a commendation from the Lord Lieutenant of Ross & Cromarty in recognition for all the valuable work done by our volunteers over the Covid-19 Pandemic, delivering prescriptions, getting people to hospital and other medical appointments and maintaining contact with service users to alleviate loneliness and isolation.

Strategy

The officers and trustees continued to monitor the operations of the charity and agree an ongoing route map to a more familiar environment as Covid restrictions ease and a more normal service provision is considered safe. The charity is still operating a restricted service but continues to show resilience and flexibility in delivering safe, appropriate and responsive services.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Performance

SWRCCS derives its main income through grants received from Highland Council and from NHS Highland. Income from donations has been the major contributory factor to a budget surplus, as opposed to the small deficit agreed in March 2021. We are extremely grateful to our drivers, the Lochcarron Medical Centre for their grant towards the prescription runs, Applecross Luncheon Club, and to the estate of our founder and long time Chairman, Alastair McCowan. Budget variances are reported to the officers and trustees on the budget statement and are accompanied by explanatory notes. The detailed financial information is shown in the financial statements.

Reserves policy

The Reserves Policy was approved by the trustees in 2019 and, as with other policies and procedures is reviewed regularly. SWRCCS holds sufficient reserves to operate for a period of two years and can be used, with the agreement of trustees, to protect against an unforeseen drop in income, to respond to emergencies, to address an unforeseen situation or to fund a specific purpose. A review of the Financial Controls and Authorisation Policy and the Expenses policy was undertaken and revisions were approved by the trustees in February 2022.

Donated facilities and services

The trustees and volunteers donate their time in order to achieve the primary objective of the trust.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is a registered Scottish charity; it is regulated by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The trustees were elected at the AGM and, from their number the trustees elect three honorary officers: a chair, a secretary and a treasurer. The board and the honorary officers meet during the year and are responsible for the governance and strategic management of the charity.

The charity employs a part-time coordinator for three days a week, who is responsible for coordinating the activities of the charity forwarding the objectives of the scheme and for the operational management and administration of the charity. The charity operates from a small office in Torridon, Wester Ross.

The charity is compliant with General Data Protection Regulations.

The Board have worked hard over the year to ensure that the charity and the company adheres to all statutory requirements, and fulfils the objectives of the organisation laid down in the Memorandum and Articles of Association. This document, drawn up in 2006, has been reviewed by the trustees and a working group has been set up to address the need to change the form of the charity from an unincorporated body to a SCIO. The working party met at the end of the financial year; they are taking advice on the process and are developing a new constitution.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Recruitment of new trustees

One trustee resigned at the November AGM and two new trustees were recruited. The trustees are appointed by the members at the annual general meeting.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of South West Ross Community Car Scheme

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2022 set out on pages six to thirteen.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ircland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ircland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

- 25% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is included in the expense or asset account to which it relates.
