Trustees' report for the year ended 31 March 2011

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2011.

Objectives, organisation and activities

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The charity's object and its principal activity is that of providing help and advice to young people with regard to substance misuse, group work programmes and drop-in facilities.

The directors of the company are trustees for the purposes of charity law. New trustees are appointed to the Board on the basis that they meet certain conditions and criteria including the expertise that they may bring and any personal recommendation from other trustees. Policies and procedures are in place for the induction and training of trustees.

The charity's trustees meet regularly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity.

Development, activities and achievements

This has been an interesting year for Clued Up Project, with the set up and establishment of our service provision in the Dunfermline and South West Fife area. This venture has proved to be a great success and funding has been secured from FAPP (Fife Alcohol Partnership Project) and The Robertson Trust to continue the work for another year. Clued Up Project was also involved in a scoping exercise to see what the needs were of young people living in the West Fife villages. Through this, it was identified that interventions such as MAIT (Mobile Alcohol Intervention Team) and one to one support to name a few, would be beneficial to the young people from that area, the next steps will be to secure the finances to deliver on this.

Group work undertaken by Clued Up Project during this period included a second successful 'Rite of Passage' programme. The initiative aimed to challenge a group of young people, who were all under-25 years of age and affected by substance misuse. Sufficient funding was identified and secured from Awards For All. Rite of Passage was a combination of the theoretical aspects of the Pacific Institute's PX2 programme together with one on self-esteem and the challenges of outdoor education. As well as using local facilities the group were taken out of their normal environment for an intensive six-day residential stay in Glen Doll.

The M.A.I.T. (Mobile Alcohol Intervention Team), which was established last year has continued to provide young people with Alcohol Brief Interventions and has expanded outwith Kirkcaldy to the Rosyth area. The long term plan for this initiative is to be able to provide it for young people across the whole of Fife.

The drop-in at Clued Up Project has provided a variety of different activities for young people to occupy their time with this year. These include beauty therapy; alternative therapies; Art; and Adult Basic Education. The activities on offer have proved a success with young people and provided them with alternatives as well as a diversion from their substance misuse.

Clued Up Project's volunteering opportunities have expanded this year with a core group of ten volunteers. They have participated in a number of training courses such as, An Introduction to Volunteering, Overdose Prevention and Goals Training. Volunteers are also actively involved in delivering pieces of work such as the Art Group and the Cook Club.

Next year, working in partnership with CVS Fife and Kirkcaldy YMCA, funding has been secured for a part-time Employability Worker. Clued Up's Employability Worker will be supporting young people who are affected by substance misuse to assist them to achieve their employment goals through the provision of job coaching, training, support and advice and working in partnership with employment specialists. There are specific barriers to employment for people affected by substance abuse including literacy and numeracy problems, lack of educational and occupational qualifications, no work experience or interrupted work histories, CV gaps, requirements to disclose health problems and criminal records as well as fear of relapse. We aim to provide young people with the relevant support to overcome these and ultimately to improve their life chances.

Also in the coming year, Clued Up, in partnership with NHS Fife, will be producing a training for trainers resource on delivering Alcohol Brief Interventions with young people. A training pack has been developed along with a DVD which shows examples of staff delivering alcohol brief interventions to young people in different settings such as M.A.I.T; detached youth work; youth club and in a HUB. The first training sessions will be delivered in October and future training will be available through the NHS Health Improvement Training Programme.

Looking further ahead to the Spring of 2012, a collaborative project between Lochore Meadows Outdoor Education Centre and Clued Up will see four young people (two from each organisation) as well as staff, cycling from Lands End to John O'Groats. In the intervening period all participants will undergo intensive physical and mental training in preparation. The aim is to raise awareness of how vital the services are that support our young people and use this cycle as a catalyst to raise funds to enable the possibility of a further four projects.

Clued Up Project's eminent reputation has continued and it has now expanded to new areas of Fife. It hopes to broaden this even further to include other young people and professionals who would benefit from the type of sustainable, unique and specialist support that Clued Up can offer.

Partnership working is very important to Clued Up Project and it is one ethos that remains very high on the agenda, therefore it will continue to embrace the new and support the old.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2011

1. Accounting policies

1.1. Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (the SORP) issued in March 2005.

1.2. Pensions

The regular cost of providing pensions and related benefits is charged to the income and expenditure account over the employees' service lives on the basis of a constant percentage of earnings.

1.3. Incoming resources

Income consists of grants, donations, client charges, placement fees and income from investments and related income tax recoverable and is credited in the year in which it is receivable except when received in advance, when it is credited in the year in which it falls due. Investment income relates wholly to interest received on bank deposits.

1.4. Resources expended

Resorces expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of VAT which is an irrecoverable cost for the charity.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in those cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of those resources.

Charitable activities includes expenditure directly relating to the objects of the charity, including such support costs identifiable as an integral part of the carrying out of those charitable activities.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements compliance.
