## Trustees' report for the year ended 31 March 2010

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2010.

#### Objectives, organisation and activities

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The charity's object and its principal activity is that of providing help and advice to young people with regard to substance misuse, group work programmes and drop-in facilities.

The directors of the company are trustees for the purposes of charity law. New trustees are appointed to the Board on the basis that they meet certain conditions and criteria including the expertise that they may bring and any personal recommendation from other trustees. Policies and procedures are in place for the induction and training of trustees.

The charity's trustees meet regularly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity.

#### Development, activities and achievements

This year lots of new exciting pieces of work have been developed and older interventions have been reviewed and revamped. Intensive group work undertaken by Clued Up Project during this period was 'Rite of Passage'. The programme consisted of two ideas brought together some time ago. The programme aimed to challenge a group of young people, who were all under 25 years of age and affected by substance misuse. Sufficient funding was identified and secured from Fife Community Safety Partnership, Active Communities, Kirkcaldy and Levenmouth Mental Health Partnership as well as a donation from Trust in Fife. Rite of Passage was a combination of the theoretical aspects of the Pacific Institute's PX2 programme together with one on self-esteem and the challenges of outdoor education. Participants were also offered the opportunity to gain certificates in Food Hygiene and First Aid. As well as using local facilities the group were taken out of their normal environment for an intensive six-day residential stay in Glen Doll.

An exciting new initiative Clued Up Project became involved with this year was MAIT (Mobile Alcohol Intervention Team), which was introduced due to reports of anti-social behaviour in young people when they had been drinking and is part of the Equally Well test site in the Templehall area of Kirkcaldy. It was felt that delivering early interventions might help to reduce this. Partners involved in MAIT include, Fife Constabulary, Community Safety Partnership, NHS Fife, Equally Well, Community Wardens and Clued Up Project. MAIT is a street based initiative aimed at engaging with young people under the age of 16 who are drinking when out on the streets in the area. The team provides alcohol screening and brief interventions as well as follow up support if required. Training in alcohol brief interventions was provided for all staff and the initiative was piloted from September to December 2009. The team is out in the area two Fridays a month between the hours of 7.00pm and 11.00pm and it is easily contacted by telephone for early response.

Several pieces of funding have been secured during this time including a grant from CashBack to Communities, which allowed us to plan and prepare for street based initiatives during both Easter and Summer school holiday periods. Street based activities are very important in that they enable Clued Up Project staff to engage with young people who would not otherwise access services. They also allow us to build trusting relationships and break down barriers.

The drop-in at Clued Up Project's base has provided a variety of different activities for the young people to occupy their time this year, which have included Beauty Therapy, Alternative Therapies and Adult Basic Education. This provision has proved a success with the young people and given them alternatives and a diversion from their substance misuse. The Cook Club has gone from strength to strength this year. It is held every Thursday afternoon and is run in 6-week blocks. Those involved get together and plan the menus and budget in advance, they are not only using recipes from books and the Internet but they are adding their own twist to them and producing some quality meals for those lucky enough to be visiting the drop-in that day. Food Hygiene courses are also on offer and one young male has gone back to college to restart his studies in hospitality, as a result of his involvement in the Cook Club.

Clued Up's specialist detached youth work service was reviewed this year. It is concentrating on those involved in substance misuse and its associated high-risk behaviour. Fife Council's Community Learning and Development in Kirkcaldy run a generic detached youth work service for the area, thus creating an enhanced partnership that is equipped to address the issues identified not only by young people but the wider community also. Clued Up Project also underwent an in-house review of the management structure, which was necessary in order for us to reach our future goal of expanding all of our services on a Fife-wide basis and to address an increased workload. Progress towards this goal has been made this year in that Clued Up Project now has a full-time Deputy Manager and a part-time Administrator

A full-time alcohol worker is also in place in the Benarty area working in partnership with a local organisation, The Zone. We are very proud to be involved in this piece of work and believe that this partnership will be of great benefit to the community of Benarty. Clued Up Project has secured funding from The Robertson Trust and the Fife Alcohol Partnership Project to expand into Dunfermline and South West Fife. This is another exciting partnership we have created enabling us to employ a full-time Development Worker for the area. We look forward to updating you on the success of this partnership next year. The majority of initiatives Clued Up Project is involved in highlight the fact that partnership working is very important to our organisation and it is one ethos that stays very high on our agenda. Therefore we will continue to embrace the new and support the old.

One of the new Deputy Manager's roles has been to develop the volunteering aspect of Clued Up Project and this year we have reviewed and improved processes to put in place the appropriate support so young people we work with can become involved in volunteering. This year we have recruited three new young people and have continued to support our two volunteers from last year.

During this year the organisation's excellent reputation has continued and broadened into new areas of Fife and in the coming year we intend to expand this even further to enable young people and professionals to benefit from the truly professional, unique and sustainable support that Clued Up Project can offer. As mentioned previously in this report, a review of the charity's management structure has been undertaken to accommodate the expansion of its services to other parts of Fife. A provision of £16,042.26 generated from unrestricted funds has been made to allow us to retain the current staffing levels and maintain our three-month running costs.

## Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2010

### 1. Accounting policies

#### 1.1. Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (the SORP) issued in March 2005.

#### 1.2. Pensions

The regular cost of providing pensions and related benefits is charged to the income and expenditure account over the employees' service lives on the basis of a constant percentage of earnings.

#### 1.3. Incoming resources

Income consists of grants, donations, client charges, placement fees and income from investments and related income tax recoverable and is credited in the year in which it is receivable except when received in advance, when it is credited in the year in which it falls due. Investment income relates wholly to interest received on bank deposits.

#### 1.4. Resources expended

Resorces expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of VAT which is an irrecoverable cost for the charity.

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in those cost categories. Where costs are attributable to more than one activity, they have been apportioned across the cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of those resources.

Charitable activities includes expenditure directly relating to the objects of the charity, including such support costs identifiable as an integral part of the carrying out of those charitable activities.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements compliance.
